FOOTBALL.—Football at the Park tomorrow afternoon, at 4 o'clock, weather permitting.
SMALL DEBT COURT.—The City Small Debt Court was in session this forenoon, and adjourned till this day week.

OPEN AGAIN.—The Stamp Vendor's wicket, in the Post Office corridor, has been opened for business again. Mr. John Dillon is the vendor. His business hours are from 9 a. m. till 8 p. m.
APPEALED.—William Preeper, who was convicted for murder, at Halifax, in the early part of the year, for the killing of Peter Doyle, has entered an appeal at the Supreme Court of Canada.
A GOOD PRICE.—Mr. Jas. G. Gibson, of Brooklyn, Hants County, N. S., has purchased the well known grey trotting stallion Highland Chief, from its owner, Mr. Charles L. Road, of Pictou. The price is said to have been \$1,000.

RAISING THE PRICE.—Many retail bread dealers in Chicago have raised the price one cent per loaf owing to continued advances in wheat and the consequent increase in the price of flour. The probabilities are that the price will be put up another notch.
FIRE.—There was a big blaze in Bedford Row, Halifax, on Tuesday morning. The stores of Messrs. Fader, Hubley, and Thompson were totally destroyed. Some of the inmates had narrow escapes from death. The loss will probably reach \$30,000.

THE NEW STEAMER.—The S. S. Halifax sailed from Glasgow yesterday for Halifax and Port Hawkesbury, with a full cargo. She will be due here about the 18th inst., and will then go on the route between here and Boston. Full particulars of sailing, &c., will appear by advt. this week.
A LIVELY BLOW.—In the hurricane which swept over Turks Island on Sunday, the 2nd September, more than 250 houses of the peasantry were entirely destroyed, and nearly every house left standing was more or less damaged. Over twenty-one lives were lost, and over 400,000 bushels of salt destroyed.

SNOW IN SEPTEMBER.—Passengers on the Intercolonial train which arrived at Quebec Saturday night report the ground covered with snow for some distance west of River du Loup, and in some of the parishes amongst the mountains north of Quebec the ground was mantled on Sunday with the same covering.—Moncton Times.
SUCCESSFUL AT KINGSTON.—Messrs. Goff Brothers, of this city, received, last evening, a diploma from the Commissioners of the Exhibition at Kingston, Ont., for the excellence of the boots of their manufacture. Our readers will all be glad to learn that the Island manufacturers are carrying the war into Egypt and competing successfully with the manufacturers of the Upper Provinces. We trust that Messrs. Goff Bros. will ere long be able to sell boots and shoes of their manufacture in the large markets of Ontario.

PORT OF MONCTON.—The imports at the port of Moncton in September amounted in value to \$63,144, as compared with \$66,400 in the same month of last year—increase \$3,256. Duty collected \$43,266, against \$38,433—increase \$4,833. The exports for the month amounted to \$29,109, decrease of \$6,292 as compared with the same month last year.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

Halifax News.
HALIFAX, Oct. 2.
The gunboat Ready arrived to-day from Port au Prince, via Provincetown, Mass., where she put in for coal. She landed two men at Jamaica en route, who died of yellow fever, but the health officers gave her a clear bill of health on her arrival here.
H. M. S. Wrangler, four guns, left Jamaica for Halifax at the same time as the Ready, and nothing has since been heard of her. Fears are entertained for her safety and it is said warships will be sent from this port to search for her.
Word was received to-day that Lieut. Edmunds, formerly stationed with the Royal Artillery on this garrison, has suicided at Plymouth, Eng.
A young man died at Port George, Annapolis Co., from the swallowing of plum stones.
A fire broke out at 1 o'clock this morning and gutted the business establishments of Joseph Fader & Co., butchers, B. J. Hubley & Son's feed store, and Thompson's broom factory. The loss is about \$20,000, insurance \$8,500. Several accidents happened, and Thos. Bartelow and a marine named Ellis were seriously injured.

Toronto Tidings.
TORONTO, Oct. 2.
The faculty of Trinity Medical College to-day decided to strike the names of the students who disgraced themselves yesterday off the register of the college and summarily expel them. The cases of several others are still under consideration.
A severe storm occurred this morning along a considerable portion of the lake shore, and several disasters are reported. A despatch from Owen Sound states that it was the worst storm of the season and was accompanied by a heavy fall of snow.

Late Ottawa News.
OTTAWA, Oct. 2.
A special cable states that some comment is aroused by the orders just issued by the Imperial War Office for increased strength to the Eighteenth Company of the Royal Engineers now serving at Halifax, by a strong draft from the sub-marine section of the Royal Engineers and the depot companies from Chatham.
Senator J. G. Ross, of Quebec, is dead. This makes the eighth vacancy in the Senate.

Will Probably Decline.
HALIFAX, Oct. 2.
It is generally understood here that Hon. Thos. Johnston will decline the Liberal nomination for Shelburne for the House of Commons. The nature of his business makes it convenient for him to attend to his duties in the Local House, but make it impossible for him to go to Ottawa just when his vessels would be fitting out for the Banks.

Released from Jail.
DUBLIN, Oct. 2.
Patrick O'Brien, Nationalist member of Parliament, was released from Killybegs jail to-day. He has been in prison for several months for an offence under the Crimes Act. He looks worn and pale. He was given an enthusiastic reception by the priests and people of the place.

The Supreme Court.
HALIFAX, Oct. 2.
The Mail says that private letters received from Ottawa say that Judge Osler of the Ontario bench will, without doubt, receive the vacant appointment to the Supreme Court bench.

Army Officer Arrested.
LONDON, Oct. 2.
An engineer Captain has been arrested at Portsmouth for showing an American over the secret parts of Spithhead Forts.

Typhoid Fever.
MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Oct. 2.
A special from Duluth says: "There are 450 cases of typhoid fever in Duluth, and the epidemic appears to be growing."

Prof. Neumayr, of the Hamburg Marine Observatory, is organizing an expedition to go to the South Pole. All previous explorers agree in ascribing to the Antarctic regions an intense cold, and a bleak aspect than the Arctic. There are no warm currents to mitigate the severity of the Southern Continents and former travellers record having passed beyond all vegetable life, while northern navigators have never got beyond lichens and weeds. Sir James Ross is said to have been within 700 miles of the South Pole, and it is enough to startle even the coal merchant to learn that "even in the height of summer the temperature of the air in Antarctic regions is always below the freezing point of sea water, and bitter tempestuous winds and fogs and blinding snow storms are all but incessant."
