THE COVENANT OF GOD

God and man are bound together by the terms of an inescapable Covenant which is revealed throughout the Bible. It is the Covenant which really constitutes the shaping, directing, driving force of all history. The Covenant enshrines a promise of supreme blessedness from God upon the performance of certain conditions by man. The dictionary distinguishes "secular history" which deals with the events in the Bible narrative from "secular history" which deals with events since Bible times. "In secular history" the Covenant is dropped. God is no longer dominant, acting the major part of the story, as all powerful, the judge and arbiter of men and kings and nations, who rewards or punishes according to His own Will and determination. On the contrary, events are estimated on a purely human basis. Neglect to seek and act according to the Covenant results in the disappearance of the fear of God as a deterrent from wrong action. 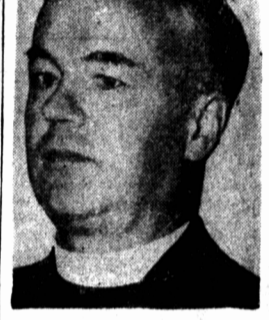
St. Veronica's Guild Held Annual Meeting

Dr. Corston is a native of Halifax who graduated from Dalhousie University in 1931 and from Pine Hill Divinity Hall in 1935 winning a scholarship to Edinburgh where he received his Doctorate at New College. In 1937 Dr. Corston was appointed to the staff of Saint Andrew's Theological College, Saskatoon and in 1950 became the Principal. He served with the Royal Canadian Navy during the war as Senior Protestant Chaplain at H.M.C.S. Stadacona, Halifax. Last year he was appointed to the faculty of Pine Hill Divinity Hall as Professor of New Testament.

Dr. Corston is well known throughout the Maritimes having been the Devotional Speaker at the Maritime Conference, and on several occasions the Bible Study leader at Berwick Camp. A gracious personality and an outstanding speaker, Dr. Corston will preach the sermon both morning and evening at the 93rd anniversary of Trinity United Church tomorrow.
