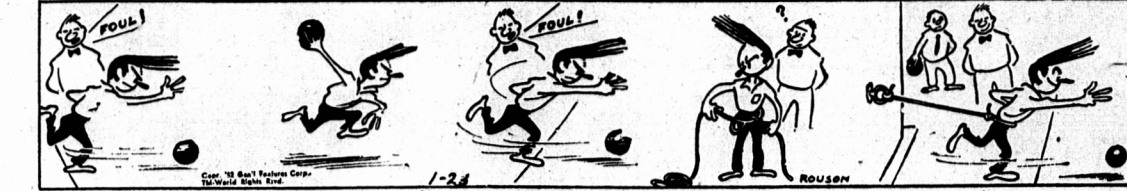

Next year the teams in the Maritime Major Hockey League should take a tip from the Halifax St. Mary's and use the two platoon system, a set-up somewhat different to that in use by football teams. The hockey platoon system for a 90 game schedule as used by Halifax calls for one team to start the season, a rebuilding job about a month later, and then another new team for the play-off drive. In that way it is possible to have a strong team at all times provided there is a Col. Oland around to keep the wheels turning.

This may be exaggerating the point a bit but nevertheless those who sat in on last night's game saw what appeared to be two very tired teams in action and as a result they witnessed one of the worst games of the year. The Millionaires with only twelve men and playing their fourth game in five nights played the game the smartest way they knew how in hopes of obtaining a draw or maybe even a win. They laid back and played defensively, checking their men closely and hoping for the breaks.

As a matter of fact he had the first shot on the opposing net. Early in the third period he "diked" Bill Dinning on a rush around the Mills defense and looked pretty good in doing it. He had one fairly good scoring opportunity but shot at the covered short side.

"Bucko" Traifor may not make the trip to Saint John today with the team, it was stated last night by coach Leo Lamoureux. Wes has not been feeling up to par for the past few days and will probably be given a well deserved short rest. The Islanders planned to leave by plane but may change their plans this morning depending upon the weather.

Much is being written these days about the work of Will Fields in rebuilding the Halifax Saints. For his efforts Fields deserves commendation. He also should be given a pretty good rating for his ability to keep signing players in view of the fact that each club was issued with only 25 playing cards at the start of the season. # Islanders In 2-1 Win Over Sydney To Tighten Grip On Second Place

Leo Lamoureux's Islanders kept their nose above the second place water line here last night as they came out on the long end of a 2-1 score against the Sydney Millionaires in a game which produced little in the way of action or hockey.

Bob Gray's goal with eight minutes left in the third period proved to be the winning counter and this along with the snappy goaltending of Ray Frederick was one of the few redeeming features of the dull contest.

For over two and a half periods the teams waltzed through their motions on the ice, taking an occasional time-out to toss a good pass or make an inoffensive run. Most of the action consisted in throwing the puck into the corner from near the centre line.

Play opened up following Gray's goal as the Millionaires abandoned their defensive style of play and attempted to get back in the game. Gray received a tripping penalty less than a minute after he scored and the Millionaires showed power on their pressure attacks.

### Goalie Brilliant

The shot staffed Millionaires, playing their fourth game in five nights, put up a close checking defensive game all the way. Their close checking kept the Islanders off balance and like the dog in the manger, while they couldn't score themselves, they wouldn't let the Islanders score either.

The visitors iced only 12 men, two complete lines and three defencemen. Joe Levandoski, with a hip injury which he received in Saint John, Whip Whelan, Don MacRae and Eddy Marineau were missing from their lineup.

The Islanders win, their fifth in their last seven starts, strengthens their hold on second place. They have 58 points, four more than the third place Halifax from is not quite clear.

At the start of the season each club was issued with 25 playing cards. The clubs were only allowed to register 18 men and this was to be done by Dec. 15 according to a league agreement. The December 15 deadline was extended a month to January 15. In the meantime Halifax kept changing players faster than a hockey coach changing lines. Yesterday we recalled at least 32 players who had played for a half dozen or more games with the Saints this season and if we had dug deeper we could probably find a number more. All of these players should have signed cards.

By a recent vote of the M. M. H. L. members the clubs have been given until February 1 to sign re-instated pros. This will allow the Saints to bring in the new men they are seeking. The Islanders may also obtain the services of a professional player. Last night coach Leo Lamoureux stated that he was going to try and reinforce the club with at least another wingman. They can be obtained if you have the money to buy them.

# U. S. Permits Baseball Ticket Ceiling Increase

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22—(AP)—Baseball got a cost of living price increase today—specific boosts in ticket ceiling prices for six big league clubs and 8 per cent for all the minors.

The Office of Price Stabilization said the major league outfits affected by the order are clubs which have not raised the tariffs in recent years. The raises were granted to cover cost increases in such items as player pay, travelling expenses and park maintenance.

The increases range up to a top of 50 cents a seat, granted to the two Chicago teams on both reserved and box seats. For both the Cubs and the White Sox that would permit a box seat charge of \$2.50 and a reserved seat rate of \$2.00. Their general admissions could go up 25 cents to \$1.50.

It is up to the teams themselves whether they apply the boosts, and the Chicago managements indicated they were undecided.

## Figure Skating Championships Are Decided

OSHAWA, Ont., Jan. 22—(CP)—The Canadian figure skating championships wound up Saturday night and five of the top performers were picked to represent this country at the Olympic winter games next month. A sixth was named last month.

The Canadian Figure Skating Association said it will send skating artists Marlene Smith, Peter Firstbrook, Frances Dafeo, Norris Dowden and Vevi Smith to the Olympic games at Oslo, Norway. All are from Toronto.

Susanne Morrow, 21, three-time winner of the senior event, was named to Canada's Olympic team last month and is training in Germany.

Miss Smith, 20, won the ladies title during the three-day championships here. Miss Dafeo and Bowden won the senior pairs crown Saturday, while Firstbrook successfully defended his senior men's title.

Although Vevi Smith, 19, didn't win an event she won a berth on the select team on the strength of her second-place showing in the senior ladies' event.

A blonde beauty from Winnipeg, Rosemary Henderson, 19, took a close win over Ann Johnston, 15, of Toronto, in the junior ladies' championship Friday.

Miss Henderson, who placed 8th in a field of 10 entries in the senior competition, was the only girl to enter both classes.

Charlie Snelling, 14, of Toronto, walked off with the junior men's crown.

Patricia Spray and Norm Walker, of Vancouver, who placed poorly in the junior singles, won the Canadian junior pairs championship.

Miss Dafeo and Bowden took the senior pairs title as they outpointed the only other contenders, Audrey Downie and Brian Power of Vancouver.

## Threaten To Take Title From Joe Walcott

NEW YORK, Jan. 22—(AP)—Bob Christenberry, chairman of the New York State Athletic Commission, said tonight heavyweight champion Jersey Joe Walcott will have his title taken from him "unless he agrees within 15 days to meet a legitimate contender."

The New York boxing boss said he considered former heavyweight champion Ezzard Charles and undefeated Rocky Marciano of Brockton, Mass., as the "foremost contenders."

Christenberry made the statement after he had been asked if he planned action similar to that of the Louisiana State Boxing Commission, which withdrew recognition from Walcott today.

The Louisiana commission said the action was taken because Walcott failed to defend his title within six months as requested by the National Boxing Association.

Walcott won the title by knocking out Charles in the seventh round at Pittsburgh last July 18 in Holyoke, Mass., where Walcott was scheduled to box an exhibition tonight, Jersey Joe's manager, Felix Bocchicchio, declined to comment on the action of the Louisiana commission.

# Rangers Come From Behind For 3-All Tie With Boston Bruins

BOSTON, Jan. 22—(CP)—Rookie Herb Dickenson and Wally Hergesheimer scored third-period goals tonight to move New York Rangers into a 3-3 tie with Boston Bruins. The deadlock enabled Rangers to retain fourth place in the National Hockey League.

Paul Ronly, a former Bruin, set up both Dickenson and Hergesheimer to ruin the Boston hopes of moving into the circuit's fourth playoff berth, which Rangers hold by a one-point margin.

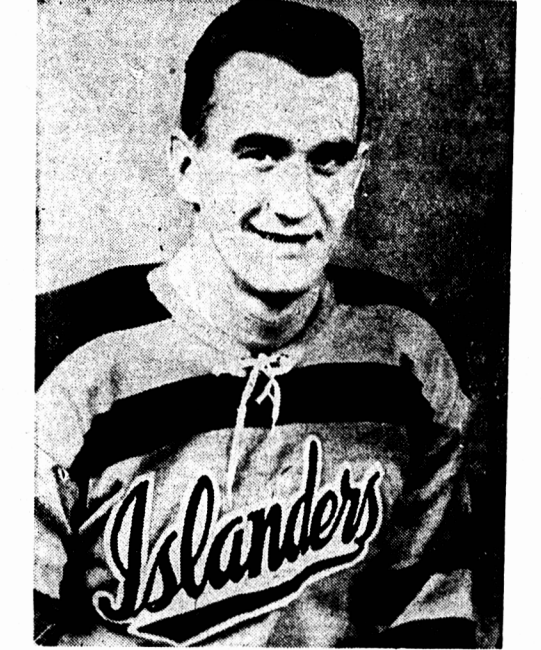
