## "The Colonel" Denies It.

HE DID NOT WRITE MURDERER BIRCHALL A LETTER.

A cable from London, received in New York on Friday morning last, conveyed the information that "the colonel" who figured as the alleged writer of the letter from Jackson, Mich., of October 5, to Reginald Birchall, now in Woodstock jail, awaiting hanging for the murder of F. C. Benwell, in which it is implied that "the colonel" was the slayer of young Benwell, is J. E. Lewis, of 11 Wall street, that city.

The cables further say that Col. Lewis met Birchall and Benwell in Morley's hotel, London, and that he had invited Birchall to dine with him.

A reporter found J. E. Lewis at his office, room 43, Mortimer building, 11 Wall street.

Mr. Lewis is a man of imposing personality, and was attired in the most fashionable apparel. He is, perhaps, 45 years old, stout and rosy-cheeked. Divining the reporter's mission instantly, Mr. Lewis exclaimed, with a pleasing smile:—

"This is utterly absurd—my writing such a letter as Birchall is said to have received. It is true I did meet the fellow at Morley's hotel in London, but it was only a smoking room acquaintance. I did not meet Benwell, or if I did, it has passed entirely from my mind.

"So little impression did my casual meeting with Birchall make on me that I cannot recall now who it was that introduced us. I remember that he was presented to me as the son-in-law of Mr. Stephenson, of the London & North-western railway, and beyond the fact that I remember him as an intelligent young Englishman, socially inclined, there is nothing I know of him at all that would be interesting in the slightest degree to the public.

"You see the smoking room at Morley's was the common resort of all, the gentlemen guests of the hotel after dinner to enjoy their cigars. Birchall was simply an acquaintance, like a hundred others I have made, and which are made by all travellers. Had it not been for this Benwell murder, I should never probably have thought or heard of Birchall after I left London.

"It was in January, last that I was stopping at Morley's, and I remained abroad six months returning then to America. I was called 'Col. Lewis' in London, and the title is only one by courtesy, as they have a habit in London of prefixing Americans 'colonel,' 'major' or 'judge.' However, I served in the rebellion, but had not reached the colonel's epaulettes.

"I dislike the notoriety which has brought my name before the public in this way, but my standing in the community I know cannot be impaired in the slightest by the fanciful and absurd story of my letter writing. I cannot conceive how or why Birchall should have brought me into this affair, for, as I understand it, the letter is now said to be in his own handwriting.

We were never intimate, only, as I say, on pleasant speaking terms; and it is incorrect to say I ever invited him to dine with me.

"My business is the promotion of various engineering enterprises, waterworks and the like, and it was the furtherance of such projects that sent me to London last winter.

### Miminigash Notes.

The fishing at Miminigash Harbor is not closed for the season yet, as Mr. Thibideau, one of the old fishermen, caught two hundred large codfish last Wednesday.

Capt. P. Costain, of this place, has just finished loading his new schooner Wild Brier with produce for the N. B. market.

The repairs of the Miminigash break-water, under the competent inspection of Mr. McElroy, are progressing rapidly, notwithstanding the unfavorable weather. He will soon have the work completed.

We are sorry to say that Mr. D. Thompson's schooner is ashore at this place, and we fear the fall's gales will injure her.

The school of this vicinity is fast progressing under the attentive management of Miss Murphy, who, without doubt, deserves great credit for the advancement of her scholars.

### Northwest Assembly.

The Northwest Assembly was, a few days ago, opened at Regina by Lieut.-Governor Royal. In the speech from the throne he referred to the abundant harvest, to the railway development of the country, and to the visit of the Duke and Duchess of Connaught. He favored the vigorous immigration policy that had been pursued, expressing the hope that the visit of the British farmers' delegates would prove beneficial. He intimated that statistics would be presented combating the assertion made that crime was increasing in the territories. Reference was made to the gopher pest, to the formation of a territorial library, and to the liberality of President Van Horn in granting free passes over the C. P. R. to immigration agents. Credit was given the mounted police for their services in suppressing illegal liquor traffic and in other ways. Educational matters were referred to. There are 195 schools in operation, with 294 teachers and 5,398 pupils, an increase of 31 schools and 824 pupils. Allusion was also made to the public works and water supply of the territories.

### Trade in British Columbia.

The Board of Trade of British Columbia reports that the establishment of flour mills of modern type, and of large producing capacity, has given an impetus to agriculture and to the consequent settlement of large tracts of land suitable for wheat growing which were previously of comparatively small value. The immense timber resources of the province have during the past year continued to attract attention of Eastern lumbermen, and several new mills, some of them of very large capacity, have been constructed within the period in question. In the city of Victoria the value of real estate has advanced nearly 100 per cent. within the past twelve months, a fact which attests sufficiently the flourishing of its trade. Several new enterprises, notably the construction and successful operation of an electric street railway, a large flour mill and other industries, have largely contributed to the present encouraging prospects of the port.
