THE SPORTS.

RESULT OF THE DIFFERENT EVENTS YESTERDAY AFTERNOON.

The different events were keenly contested, and the bicycle races brought out a new rider—Mr. A. G. Cameron, of Montague, who won both events in good time. He gives promise of great things in the future.

The first event was 100 yards run for boys under 16. It was won by Harry Toombs, Williams second, and Peters third. Time 11 3-5.

The quarter mile run handicap had Duffy on scratch alone, McIntyre and Mitchell on the 25 yard mark, Toombs, Eoman and Williams in the 30 yard march. Duffy made a gallant attempt on the last stretch but the effort was too great and he was unable to sustain the pace. The event was won by Toombs, Mitchell second, McIntyre third. Time 53 4-5.

The mile run had Duffy, Mitchell and McIntyre all on scratch. They ran around the track at a fat man's pace until the last quarter when they began to move faster. The race went to Duffy, with Mitchell second and McIntyre third. Time 5 minutes and 49 seconds.

The quarter mile bicycle race, flying start, was contested in heats, best two in three. Brown won the first heat in 31 3-5 seconds, Cameron second and Doyle third.

The second heat went to Cameron, who rode the distance in 31 seconds, equalling the Maritime record held by Brown. Brown 2nd, Doyle 3rd. Cameron won the final with Brown second. Time 37 2-5.

The starters in the two mile bicycle race were Cameron and Doyle. The race was slow as usual until the last quarter when Cameron started his spurt and won in 7:40.

The track was heavy and the corners treacherous. Arthur Cameron will go to Halifax with the Aegweit team and will doubtless prove a valuable addition. Brown was apparently not in his usual form yesterday.

THE SHOOTING AT OTTAWA.

Hon. Mr. Borden Gives Valuable Cup.

ACCIDENT TO SERGT. HAYHURST, QUEEN'S PRIZE MAN.

Particulars of Prizes Won in the Different Matches.

OTTAWA, August 28.—It is announced that a cup valued at \$500 has been presented to the Dominion Rifle Association by Hon. Mr. Borden, Minister of Militia, as a memorial to his son, the late Lieut. Borden.

A special committee was appointed of one man from each province to arrange for the disposition of the cup for this year only.

Next year, the match committee will arrange for it. Dr. Borden has also given \$100 to go with the cup.

Sergt. Hayhurst, 13th Regt, winner of the Queen's prize at Bisley three year ago, met with an accident yesterday, by the bursting of a ginger ale bottle, that will in all probability prevent him from shooting again during the rest of the meet.

It appears that while opening a bottle it accidentally burst, inflicting a nasty gash over eye, which will necessitate the putting in of several stitches. Eminent oculists will hold a consultation today to determine whether Hayhurst must leave for home.

Among the tyro prizes Corporal George Blue, Ch'town, won \$4 with 60 points.

The Tyro match was won by Pte. E. Parker, Royal Grenadiers, Toronto.

Pte. A. C. Lawson, Charlottetown, won \$5 with 31 points.

In the Bankers' match Corp. H. Kerr, Highlanders, and Pte. W. Latimer, Grenadiers, both of Toronto, tied for first place with possibles, winning \$19 each. Lieut. V. L. Beer, R. A., and Pte. E. M. Nichols, Q. O. R., tied for second place with scores of 34.

Lieut. J. H. C. Acorn, Charlottetown, won \$4 with 31 points.

ANOTHER DISPATCH.

OTTAWA, Aug. 27.—In the Tyro match, 600 yards, Private A. C. Lawson, of the 82nd Regt. made 31 points and won \$5. Lieut. V. L. Beer, R. A., made 29 points and won \$3.

In the Bankers' Match, at 400 yards Lieut. V. L. Beer, R. A., wins third prize, \$13 50, making the best possible, 34, with eight shot.

Carl Owen, 4th Regiment, C A, made 32 points, winning \$2.

Lieut J H C Acorn, 82nd Regt, made 31 points, capturing \$4.

Sergt J A Moore made 31 points, winning \$4.

Several thirty-ones were counted out. The team is shooting splendidly. The weather is fine, but excessively hot.
