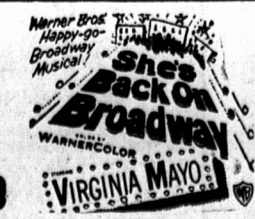

The goose and duck shooting season which closed last Saturday was certainly not the most successful one on record from the gunners' standpoint. Nevertheless, in this area at least, it will long be remembered as having provided one or two outstanding events. First and foremost of course was the record kill of three geese with one shot made by Dot MacInnis of Point de Roche a record which likely will stand for generations to come.

Then there was the strange unflecked bird shot by Mr. Harold Affleck, well-known business man here. Mr. Affleck had been hunting geese at Savage Harbour when he noticed this strange looking bird. It was all white and its neck considerably longer than that of a goose. After killing the bird Mr. Affleck began to wonder just what it was and when he presented it before expert birdmen in Charlottetown, they after much thought and book-hunting declared it to be a Snow Goose. Mr. Affleck took the bird and departed for home, no doubt with eager expectations of a delicious goose dinner. However, the experts were apparently still somewhat dubious and phoned Mr. Affleck shortly after he reached Mt. Stewart asking him to bring the bird back to the City. On the second post-mortem with keener thoughts and more book-hunting it was declared to be a Juvenile Whistling Swan the second ever known to have been shot on Prince Edward Island. It weighed 15 pounds and had a wing spread of about 15 feet.

IN MEMORIAM St. Columba and Vicinity

ARCHIBALD HOLMES CHAPPELL The death took place at Hunter River on November 26, of Archibald Holmes Chappell, a highly esteemed resident of that community, in his 83rd year.

Mr. Chappell was born in North Granville, the son of William Chappell and Jane Champion. Until four years ago he resided on the Chappell homestead.

A man possessed of a cheerful disposition; he was a good neighbor and particularly fond of children. Mr. Chappell served his community as a local veterinary and on numerous occasions he travelled day and night to farmers who needed his services.

In 1895 he married Janet Walker MacFaden of North River, and to this union were born a son and daughters, Lester who predeceased him in 1925 and Ethel (Mrs. Leslie Sherren) of Hunter River.
