

New Drugs For Treatment Of Arthritis Described

TORONTO (CP) — New drugs and new combinations of drugs for the treatment of rheumatoid arthritis were described Tuesday by several physicians attending the ninth International Congress on Rheumatic Diseases.

None of the drugs reported to the more than 1,000 delegates at the week-long congress was a positive cure, but they all hold some promise of relief for arthritis.

The most promising drug described was chloroquine, used in the treatment of malaria and chemically related to quinine and stibaine.

Dr. Arthur W. Bagnall of Vancouver said 70 per cent of a group of 125 patients treated with chloroquine received good relief. Professor I. Bruckner of Bucharest, Romania, noted good and excellent results among 32 of 36 patients treated with it.

BEST YET

Dr. Bagnall said the evaluation of his patients showed results "better for long-term chloroquine therapy than for any other treatment published to date."

The chief advantage of chloroquine was that it did not produce any of the side-effects of cortisone and cortisone-type drugs.

"Long-term cortisone therapy is accompanied by many hazards," Dr. Bagnall said, "such as the appearance of high blood pressure, diabetes, soft bones, inhibited function of the patient's own adrenal glands, and susceptibility to infection."

Dr. Bagnall said chloroquine does not reduce inflammation and swelling immediately, as do the other drugs, but seemed to act on the disease itself.

est drugs was described by Dr. John H. Talbot of Buffalo, N.Y. He reported that colchicine, used for more than 3,000 years in treating gout, was successful when combined with benamid, a recent development.

He said colchicine provides relief from the pain and swelling of gout, while benamid eliminates the uric acid crystals which accumulate in the blood joints of gouty persons.

UNUSUALLY SUCCESSFUL

Dr. Pedro Barcelo of Barcelona, Spain, said he found that a combination of prednisone, one of the cortisone family, and phenylbutazone was unusually successful in treating acute rheumatoid arthritis.

The side-effects normally expected from the use of prednisone were not present because it was administered in smaller doses, he said.

Patients received the benefit of both drugs. Phenylbutazone was another of the newer drugs developed in recent years to circumvent the effects of cortisone and cortisone-type drugs.

Aspirin, used in the treatment of arthritis for more than 50 years, was put forward by four specialists as the cheapest and safest drug for long-term therapy. Although it did not noticeably reduce swelling and inflammation, they found it just as effective in reducing pain as other drugs.

Home Destroyed By Fire At Dundas But No One Injured

A fire at Dundas, completely destroyed the home of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Acorn early Tuesday morning.

The fire is thought to have been caused from the kitchen stove. Mr. and Mrs. Acorn arose as usual and went to the barn to do the morning chores. They first noticed the flames on returning to the house where their two younger children were still sleeping. They were able to remove the children but their household effects were a total loss.

Judge J.S. DesRoches of the Red Cross Disaster Relief committee accompanied by Mr. A. F. Campbell both of Montague, journeyed to Dundas to determine if assistance was required by the family. On arrival they were informed that due to the immediate response and assistance of neighbours and friends, temporary quarters had already been completed for the entire family, even to the electrical wiring. Neighbours rushed rough lumber to the mill to be planed and soon had quarters available, making a garage suitable for Mr. and Mrs. Acorn and two of the younger children. Another smaller building was made useable for the two older boys.

The members of the Disaster Relief Committee felt that the example set by this community in time of disaster is highly commendable.

The loss was partially covered by insurance.

Name Committee On Cerebral Palsy

TORONTO (CP) — A national Easter seal committee was appointed Wednesday at the annual meeting of the Canadian Council for Crippled Children and Adults. Also established was a special committee on cerebral palsy.

The national Easter seal committee is to promote and publicize the 1958 Easter seal campaign. J. C. Preston of Brantford was appointed chairman.

The cerebral palsy section is designed to enable cerebral palsy associations and federations in Canada to unite as a national group to study and work on the problems of the crippling disease. W. E. MacLure of Montreal was appointed chairman.

Fisheries Minister MacLean Occupies New Office Space

OTTAWA (Special) — Fisheries Minister J. Angus MacLean has completed moving from his office on the fifth floor of the centre block of the Parliament Buildings to his ministerial office in the west block. He has not yet taken over the second Fisheries Minister's office in the centre block itself.

Mr. MacLean's new office is located in the base of the Mackenzie tower, a tall sandstone and metal spire shooting 180 feet in the air. The office is large and comfortable within ornate carvings and a private circular steel staircase running down to the ground floor.

There has been a legend current for years in Ottawa that his office had originally been used by Sir John A. MacDonald, Canada's first Prime Minister and that the circular staircase was used by Sir John A. to avoid visitors when he did not wish to see, or to receive other visitors in utmost privacy.

This legend was exploded some time ago when Dr. Kaye Lamb, Dominion archivist and National Librarian was unable to find any evidence that Sir John had ever occupied the office or any quarters in the west block. Mr. MacLean considers it considerable improvement over the rather cramped office which he formerly occupied with Tom Bell, M.P. for Saint John-Albert.
