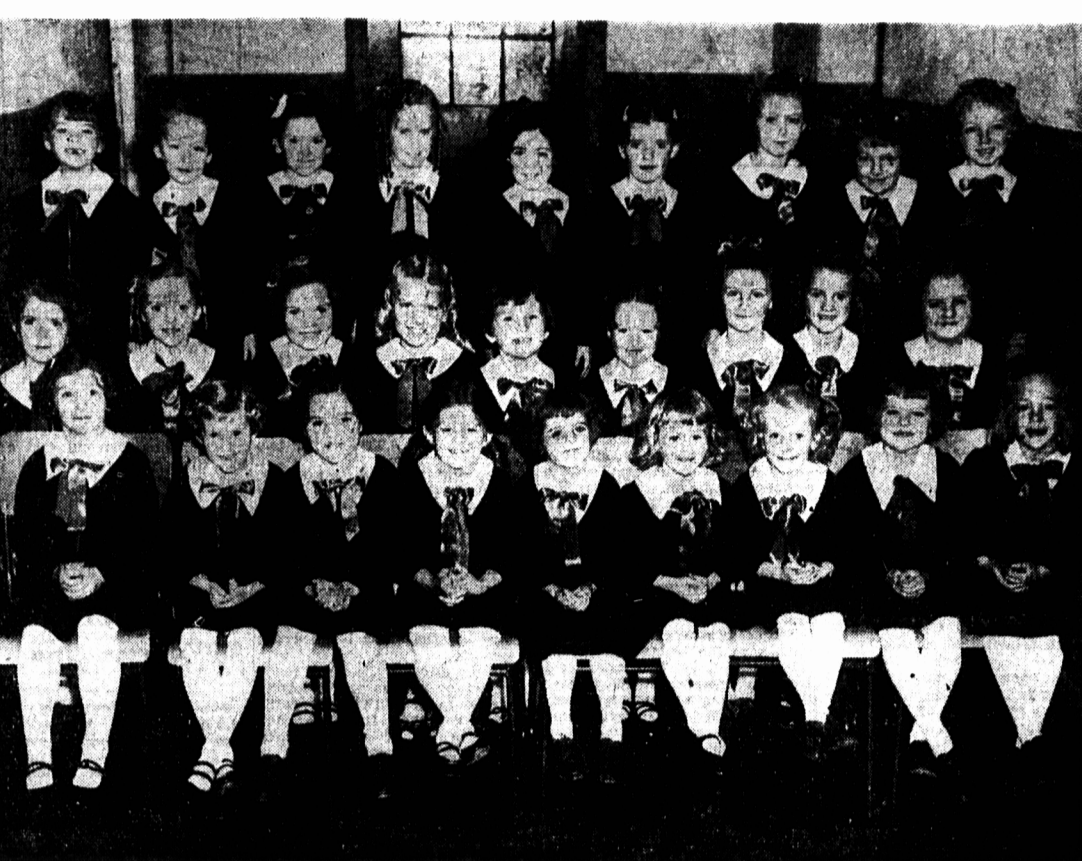

Parliament May Complete Work By Wednesday

OTTAWA, (CP)-Word-wary parliamentarians are looking forward to getting out of the capital by mid-week.

Guesses on the closing date of the long session vary, but Wednesday is a fairly general choice among members of all parties as they reach the home stretch.

For a time, there appeared a good chance of completing the session last week, and the first Saturday sitting of the session was staged in the hope of a clean-up then. But a miscellany of new debates slowed down the closing drive.

However, prorogation of the week is a certainty, and with it the end of the 21st Parliament except for the formal process of dissolution when the general election is called. The voting now is regarded as a certainty for August - perhaps Aug. 10 - and that is one reason why members are anxious to get home to attend to their political fences before the campaign steams up.

Another impetus towards prorogation is the Coronation which will be attended by a considerable group from Parliament. A Wednesday closing will leave Prime Minister St. Laurent just a week before his sailing date of May 20.

The anthem "Zadok the King" has been sung at British Coronations since that of Egbert, crowned in AD 827.
