The Franco-Chinese Difficulty.

LONDON, Aug. 13. The Times has the following despatch from Foo Choo: The American Admiral in command of the Asiatic Station has arrived here. The French assert that further navy action has been ordered. The situation here remains unchanged.

LONDON, Aug. 14. The question is whether in the event of future negotiation, the imposition of a tax on grain would operate in our favor. Fancy a Commissioner delegated by this Government, and sanctioned by the British Government, sent to Washington to negotiate a treaty of reciprocity. The question might be asked what he desired, he replies: "I wish to have a free market in the United States for the products of our forest, fields and mines." Then the United States Commissioner might ask: "and what will you give us in return?" Our representative replies: "The free use of our markets for similar products of our country." The astute American would naturally say: "We have that already. I do not see that you offer us anything." We must remember we should have something to offer when we attempt to open up anew the Reciprocity Treaty.—WILLIAM PATERSON, M. P.

The Scott Act Contest.

MONCTON, August 14. Much interest centres in the Scott Act election to-day. It is believed the vote will be large. The Temperance people count on carrying Salisbury, Packville, Moncton, Westmoreland and Botsford; Shediac and Dorchester are expected to give majorities against the Act. Both parties are sanguine of victory in the whole County.

A Scott Act Election.

SACKVILLE, N. B., Aug. 14. An election brought on to repeal the Scott Act in Westmorland County, takes place to-day. The indications are, that the English speaking electors, will give a large majority in favor of the Act. It is reported that the French who are about one-third of the vote, are against the Act, in which case it would probably be defeated.

Cholera Victims.

MARSEILLES, Aug. 13. Several fatal cholera cases have appeared at Cette. Three soldiers died yesterday, here. There was one death at Toulon. Many deaths have occurred at various small places. There were three deaths from cholera at Italy yesterday.

TOULON, Aug. 13. There were two deaths from cholera here last night. The heat is moderating.

A Political Rumor.

OTTAWA, Aug. 13. The latest political rumor is that Lieutenant Governor Robitaille is to run for Bonaventure, and be taken into the Dominion Cabinet, vice Caron, who will become Lieutenant Governor of Quebec.

Another Election.

OTTAWA, Aug. 13. The writ for the Dominion vacancy in West Ontario has been issued. Nomination is August 22nd, polling 29th. J. D. Edgar (Liberal) is the only candidate in the field so far.

Universal Suffrage in France.

PARIS, Aug. 13. The Versailles Congress resumed its labors to-day. Proposed amendment providing for the election of Senators by universal suffrage was rejected by a vote of 418 to 327.

An Arctic Tragedy.

PORTSMOUTH, Aug. 13. Lieut. Greely, of Arctic fame, in an interview to-day acknowledged the shooting of Henry for stealing food, but denied, in toto, cannibalism.

A Deficit.

LONDON, Aug. 13. The Budget shows a decrease in revenue receipts during the year of £1,439,172, and a decrease in expenditure of £2,917,688.

Going up the Nile.

CAIRO, Aug. 13. Gen. Sir Evelyn Wood, the commander of the Egyptian forces, has started up the Nile, to inspect the forts and camps.
