## Present-Day Japan Is Intellegently Presented

Picture of Japan by Colin Simpson (Angus and Robertson Ltd.) is reviewed in the magazine of the Port of London Authority. The book and the review are of special interest in that the W.M.S. of the United Church of Canada are at present making a study of Japan.

The review has this to say of Picture of Japan: This is an honest, intelligent and careful study of present-day Japan and its people. The author, a visiting Australian writer, has spared no trouble to get his background information and his first-hand pictures as complete and as accurate as possible. He has done well and his narrative is full and impartial. He shows a keen and sympathetic awareness of the people and his many encounters are alive with human interest; he is appreciative of the scenery and of the Japanese feeling for beauty.

Colin Simpson approached Japan with misgivings, sharing with the majority of his countrymen a wish to turn his back on the former enemy. He felt, however, that there was a need to know and understand the Japanese. But even as he flew to Tokyo, he wondered, as an author with

a living to earn who is Australian at least would want to read a book as he would write, could be well on the way, he thought, "to becoming one of the best-travelled bankrupts in the Southern Hemisphere."

When he reached Japan he became absorbed and, fortunately for us, forgot the public he might not reach. He travelled widely and examined most aspects of Japanese life: the big cities with their complex mixture of neon lights and old traditions; the springtime beauty of the pale pink cherry blossom and the autumn reds and golds of the maples; the incomparable Fujiyama; the temples and the shrines; the hard way of life of the ordinary people; the tragedy of Hiroshima; and sandwiched in, a pleasant but irrelevant interlude on the Philippines.

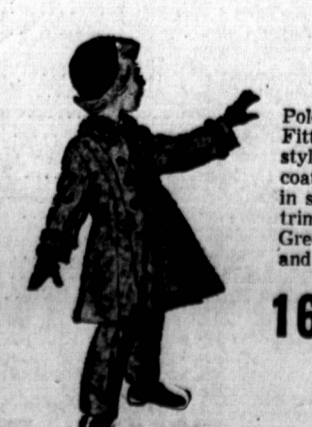
