It is also necessary that we examine the purpose of any project seeking support. With this we hope to maintain a high standard of organization and efficiency.

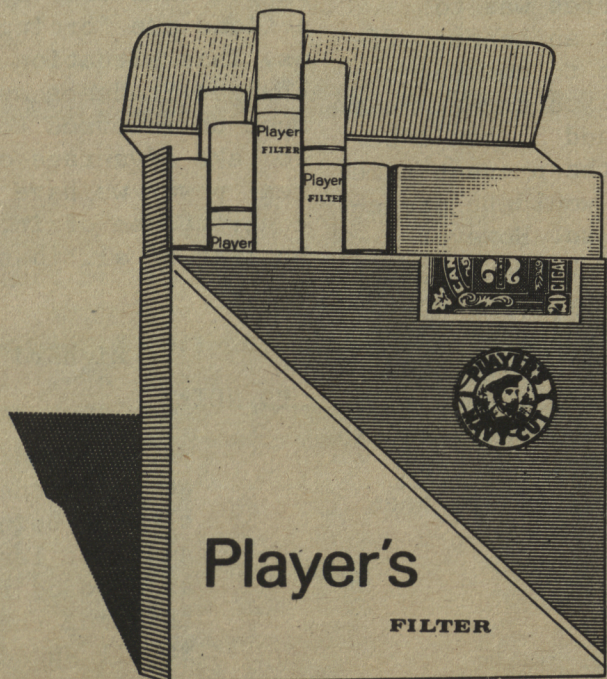
Because of the structure of the Union and the thinking of many students, we see a need to emphasize the responsibility and nature of student leadership in integrating student affairs into community life.
