Fisheries Minister Clarifies Stand Upon Coastal Waters

OTTAWA (CP) — Fisheries Minister MacLean Thursday cleared up what he described as a "misconstruction" of his recent remarks about Canada's intentions on extending its jurisdiction over coastal waters.

He said he recently expressed the personal view in the Commons that, because of the many interests involved, the problem of jurisdiction over coastal waters might require some compromise among countries.

But he added, in reply to a Commons question from H. J. Robichaud (L—Gloucester), that he had not intended to indicate any possible position Canada might take at future conferences on the law of the sea.

The Canadian government has previously expressed the desire to have the current three-mile limit of jurisdiction over territorial waters extended to 12 miles, at least for fisheries regulation.

Mr. Robichaud had asked whether Mr. MacLean's earlier statement indicated a change in the government's attitude. He also asked External Affairs Minister Smith about reports that Danish islands in the North Atlantic intend to extend their rights to 12 miles, from the three-mile limit now recognized internationally. He said Iceland has already

taken such unilateral action. Mr. Smith said Iceland expressed its intention of doing so last Sept. 1, but had taken no action yet to do so. Therefore, Mr. Robichaud's question was hypothetical and he could not answer it.

HALIFAX (CP) — The city board of works has eased up on a project to demolish 28 dilapidated buildings for fear of displacing too many people in too short a time.

The board decided Monday to defer consideration on 16 buildings, but ordered a dozen others torn down immediately.

A total of 658 persons, half of them children, have been displaced by demolition orders so far this year.

Sessions Continue Of United Church Maritime Conference

SACKVILLE, N.B. (Special) — Rev. H.E.D. Ashford, a former minister of Trinity Church, Charlottetown, is representing the general church offices of the United Church at the 34th annual sessions of the Maritime Conference being held here.

Dr. Ashford addressed the conference this morning and stated that from 20 to 25 per cent of all ministers in the United Church come from the Maritimes. He later spoke to the court during the report of the missionary and maintenance committee report and noted that twice as much is being spent yearly at the rate of \$100,000 for all church projects.

In an unprecedented move, the conference expressed a warm vote of affection to Rev. G.M. Young of Fredericton, N.B. who this year is attending his 70th annual meeting of a Maritime church court. Dr. Young was ordained into the Methodist church in Moncton in 1888. Note was made in conference that Dr. Young is eaving the sessions today to conduct a wedding, and that despite the fact that he is past his 91st birthday he will be driving back to Fredericton in his new car.

Dr. Ross Flemington, president of Mount Allison University, reported that the Church University, is presently involved in an extensive building program. The new physician and engineering building is to be dedicated at the summer vacation in August. Construction of a new humane economics and geology building has just started, and during the summer the library will be enlarged. As well as extra residence accommodation provided.

This building program is made possible, said Dr. Flemington, because of a number of large bequests and gifts in recent months and years, as well as support from Maritime Governments. New Brunswick and Nova Scotia in particular, and from grants from the Canada Council.

Dr. Flemington also noted that a gift of from between \$40,000 and \$50,000 has been received from the Rev. C.H. Johnson and his sons' Paisley to provide a new and enlarged chapel, and that students of recent years have started a fund to provide for a new gymnasium.

The Maritime Optometric Association will hold its annual convention at the Charlottetown Hotel with business sessions beginning on Monday morning through to Tuesday afternoon. Registration will take place from two to five Sunday afternoon.

The Association's primary purpose is to promote better optical education among its members and through its meetings to keep abreast with modern trends of the profession by interchange of ideas and opinions.

Speakers at the meeting will be Dr. Arthur March, Jr., president of the Massachusetts Society of Optometry, Concord, N. H., and Mr. E. B. Higgins, managing director of the Canadian Association of Optometrists, Toronto.

Seeding Wheat Crop Completed

OTTAWA (CP) — Seeding of Canada's 1958 spring wheat crop was completed by May 31, the bureau of statistics reported Thursday in its first seasonal cross-country seeding survey.

This is slightly ahead of the 99 per cent completed at the same time last year.

Seeding of the five principal grains in Canada — wheat, oats, barley, flaxseed and mixed grains — was 94 per cent completed at May 31, unchanged from last year but considerably ahead of the 1956 season when 84 per cent was seeded.

"Spring came early to most parts of Canada this year and consequently full-scale planting operations were under way somewhat earlier than a year ago," the bureau said.

Despite dry weather in the latter part of May, the Prairies got all their wheat in the ground by May 31 and 95 per cent of their total grains, compared with 94 per cent last year.

The East didn't fare so well. Eastern Canada got 88 per cent of its major grains in the ground by May 31, compared with 91 per cent last year.

Sunday Sport Becomes Legal In Vancouver

VANCOUVER (CP) — Commercial Sunday sport in Vancouver has finally become legal.

The British Columbia Court of Appeal ruled Thursday that an amendment to the city's charter permitting limited commercial sport on Sundays is valid.

The five justices were split 3-2 in favor of the ruling, which ended five years of plebiscites, legislative manoeuvring, prosecutions, petitions and spates of angry voters.

Vancouver city council asked for the amendment after voters last December approved it for a second time. The provincial cabinet asked the court to decide whether the amendment was valid.

The amendment permits commercial sports on Sundays between 1:30 p.m. and 6 p.m. Russell J. Baker, Vancouver corporation counsel, said city council will probably pass a covering bylaw Tuesday.

"But it won't be a wide open Sunday," Mayor Fred Hume said. "Regulations will be written into the bylaw and they will have to be lived up to."

Officials of the Vancouver Mounties baseball club, major sporting group affected by the decision, were jubilant. The Pacific Coast League club and some officials were fined last year for playing games on Sundays.

"Now we can get down to running a ball club and get Vancouver the publicity it deserves," said president Nat Bailey.

Court actions had cost the Mounties "a lot of potential profit." He estimated that apart from the missed gate receipts of 1957, the club had lost \$20,000 and "it's hard enough to make ends meet at any time in a ball club."
