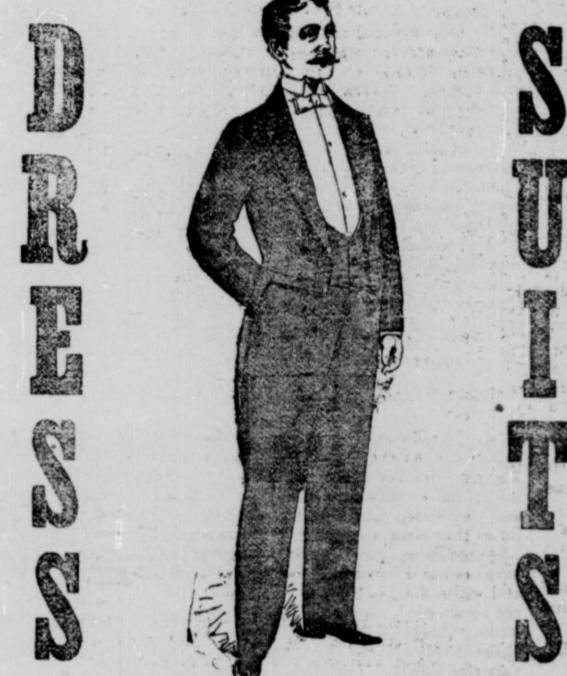

Was a Sad Accident—A correspondent at Rustico gives the following additional information regarding a recent fatal accident at Rustico to which THE EXAMINER made reference at the time: On Saturday evening Oct. 27th, a fatal accident happened at the residence of Joseph Peters, merchant and postmaster at Rustico. Two of Mr. Peters' children, F. Rudolph and Josephine, aged two and four years respectively, were around the table as it was prepared for tea. As the table was spread out they tripped it by reaching and pressing down one of the legs of the table. The lamp on the table was broken and the oil spilled on the children's clothes and also on the baby in the cradle. The oil on some kindled the light of the lamp having not been extinguished in its fall. Mrs. Peters took the baby from the cradle and her servant covered it with a mat which saved it from serious injury. But on account of the blaze the other two had to be transported outside. Mr. Peter who happened to be at some distance from the house came home to find his children on fire. He quickly killed the flames by covering them with his coat. The services of Dr. Gallant were immediately procured, but all unavailing. The dear little children could not have been recognized, so much were they disfigured. Their pains seemed to be very great, but death soon put an end to their sufferings. Rudolph died on Sunday night at 10 o'clock and Josephine on Monday morning at 8. The funeral took place on Tuesday, and a large number of sympathizing friends of the parents followed the remains of the little ones to the graves. Mr and Mrs. Peters have the compassion and sympathy of all their friends and acquaintances in their sad bereavement.
