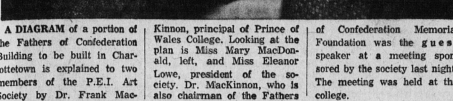

Confederation Memorial Delayed By Legalities

The Fathers of Confederation Memorial Building in Charlottetown will be financed by each province paying a certain amount of money for three years.

Dr. MacKinnon was speaking to a meeting sponsored by the Prince Edward Island Art Society at Prince of Wales College.

He did not reveal the amount of each payment but stated each province had written of the decision and that all but three of the provinces have agreed.

Dr. MacKinnon said that the construction of the building under all legal aspects have been cleared out.

It is hoped, he said, that tenders will be called in the middle of November; the awarding of contracts in December and the start of construction in January.

"Charlottetown is pretty well used for such a building from a memorial standpoint and just as important it has no major theatres; no permanent playhouse or provincial art gallery or museum," he said.

The chairman of the memorial foundation said the main focus point of the building would be the memorial hall, but would also be used for other purposes.

Talking to reporters after an inquest into her son's death, she said: "I'm once did a ton myself, seated on the back of my son's motorcycle and I'd do it again anytime. It was a thrilling experience."

Queen Charlotte Home and School members are reminded that the next meeting date will be Nov. 1, the first Thursday in the month.

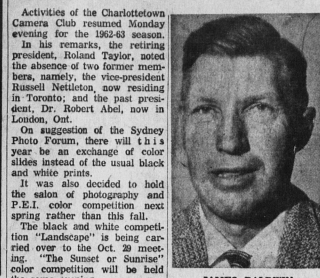

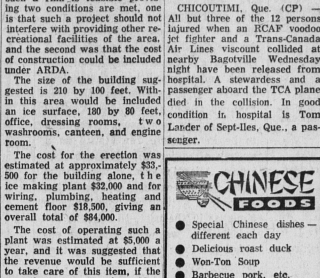
