DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

House of Commons.

Division on Redistribution Bill

A. C. Macdonald "Goes For" Davies.

OTTAWA, June 15.

In the debate on the redistribution bill Davies complained that while dual representation was allowed in New Brunswick and elsewhere, it was taken away from P. E. Island and the counties were carved with a view of electing Government supporters. The people of those counties had been working together for thirteen years. Discrepancies which took place between counties in Nova Scotia as regards population did not seem to justify the cutting up of county lines for representation purposes, and why was not some system followed in P. E. Island. It was with the idea that himself and his friend Yeo would be legislated out of the House.

McDonald, of King's Co., P. E. Island, said it was not the first time that gerrymandering was introduced in the Maritime Provinces by Davies and his political friends, who did so to keep themselves in power in Provincial matters. He (McDonald) concluded that redistribution in that province was as fair as it was possible to make it under the circumstances. To make fair redistribution it was impossible to adhere to county lines. The local Government in their redistribution bill did not stick at breaking county lines, but they even crossed township lines to secure political advantage. He would not designate a party by the name of a Government who held power by a majority of one. He held up a map to show how the Provincial Government had gerrymandered the Province. There was not a township broken up in the bill now before the House of Commons. The bill all through was a fair and just one. He would never consent to the breaking up of township lines. He was not opposed to the breaking up of county lines.

McLean showed that by dividing the city of Charlottetown Davies could have easily gerrymandered out of his seat. That was not done. There was no other way of dividing the Island, if representation by population was adhered to, than the way it was proposed to it. The bill was a fair one as far as the Island was concerned.

After some remarks from Perry against the bill, the House divided on amendment, which was lost by 59 to 95. The House then divided on the motion that the bill be read a second time, which was carried by 97 to 60.

The Presbyterian Assembly.

MONTREAL, June 15.

In the Presbyterian Assembly it was directed that a layman committee consider the enlargement and revision of the hymnal, and confer with the churches of Scotland in favor of same, with the view to the same hymns for all Presbyterian churches. The Assembly will meet next year at Brantford, Ontario.

Edward Blake Offered an Irish Constituency.

OTTAWA, June 15.

A cablegram says Edward Blake has been offered a seat in the Imperial Parliament for the Irish Constituency. He is said to have the matter under consideration.

The Storm in Nova Scotia.

HALIFAX, June 15.

One of the heaviest thunder and lightning storms ever experienced in these parts, passed over here last night. Much damage is reported through the province.

Stairs, the Explorer, Dead.

HALIFAX, June 15.

A cablegram from London says that Capt. Stairs, of Halifax, the explorer, has died near the mouth of the Zambesi River.
