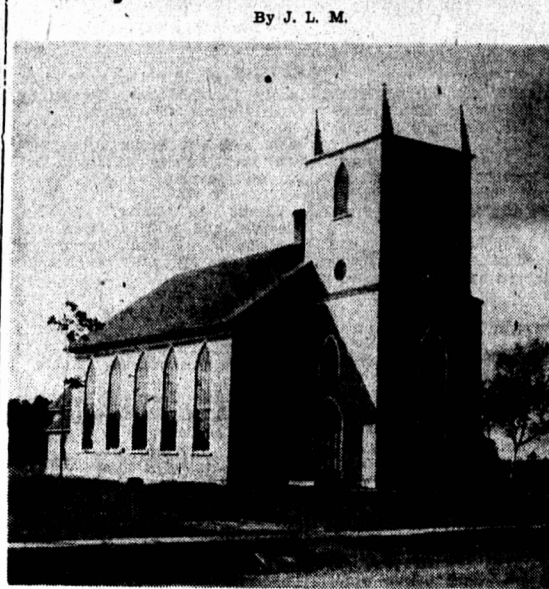

Martyr Missionaries of Island Church



—In looking backward over the years, we find that previous to 1771 a large number of Presbyterians who had come from different sections of Scotland had landed on the shores of this Island. From that heritage were born two noble missionaries, the first Canadian martyrs, who had chosen the South Seas as their field of labor.

A tablet on the east side and over the Gordon pew of what was formerly called "The Dock Presbyterian Church, now the United in Alberton (pictured above) reads: "In honored memory of two missionaries from the congregation of George Nicol Gordon, who with his wife, Ellen Catherine Powell of London, Eng-land, was killed by the natives of Erromanga, May 20, 1861, and James Douglas Gordon, who took his brother's place and on March 7, 1872, also suffered a martyr's death."

The church has a historic background. In 1829, fourteen of the following heads of families petitioned the Presbytery for a church and on July 20, 1831, they organized the Presbyterian Church in Cascumpec, now Alberton: John Gordon, (father of the martyrs), Alexander Bell, James Clark, Charles Craswell, John Forsyth, James Forsyth, Robert Hardy, James Hardy, James Hewitt, William Warren, James Wells, and John Wells. Their first Kirk session, ordained and inducted by Rev. John Keir, comprised the following: John Gordon, Robert Gordon, James Pocsythe, Robert Hardy and Charles Craswell.

Following the ordination of that Board of Elders, a church was built near what is known as the Dock cemetery and in which the congregation worshipped for approximately twenty years. As there was no resident minister, arrangements were made to give an occasional supply and to dispense the church ordinances, there being only five Presbyterian ministers on the Island at that time.

The first regular pastor, Rev. J. C. Sinclair, a man of unusual pulpit ability, was inducted in 1843 and continued his ministry until 1852. During his pastorate, elders were ordained to care for the spiritual interests of the western section of the congregation. The whole of Prince County, west of Lot 11, constituted one congregation and the people of Tignish, though only twelve miles from the nearest church, — the Dock Church, — took three days to go and return home. They started on Saturday morning and travelled around the shore until they came to Montrose River. Over this river they were paddled in a log canoe, their horses swimming after them. They then pursued their journey to the Dock, where the old church stood. Here they spent their Sabbath and on Monday retraced their steps.

As this church became outmoded, a larger one was erected in 1854, near the top of the hill where now is the Hillcrest cemetery, but the next year before the interior had been quite completed, it was destroyed by fire. Rev. Allan Fraser had been inducted as minister about this time and felt the loss of the church keenly. Another structure, the present one, was begun in 1856, on a site to the eastward of the previous one. No records can be found to show the length of time of completion but it can be assumed it took several years as the finances of the congregation must have been severely strained after erecting the church which had been burned.

The large bell which has been reconitioned may again be heard for many miles. The pulpit Bible, now in use, was donated by Miss Maud Wisener in loving memory of her mother and sister.

Over the years this church has given to the ministry the following men: The Gordon Brothers of Erromanga; Rev. Donald Gordon; Rev. F. H. Larkins, D. D.; Rev. J. K. Fraser, D. D.; Rev. D. J. Fraser, D. D.; Rev. George Arthur; Rev. J. Simpson Gordon; Rev. A. B. MacLeod; Rev. Walter Matthews; Rev. Charles Hardy.

The ministers in charge since Union and following Rev. George Christie, were: Reverends J. R. Miller; A. S. Weir; M. K. Charman; George Foss; G. N. Somers; J. Murdoch Fraser and P. A. Fitzpatrick, now in office. The present elders are Messrs. C. H. Weeks, H. D. Corbett and Herbert Matthews.
