Charlottetown's first day of the spring series of Red Cross blood donor clinics being held at the Confederation Centre in Charlottetown ended up 24 short of the day's objective of 375. 170 students at St. Dunstan's University were actual donors at the afternoon clinic held in the College Gym although 261 checked in for the blood donor competition carried on among the various classes. The Sophomores came out on top with a 53% attendance to take the trophy away from the Juniors who were last fall's winners. Stephen Joyce of Montreal was again the chairman of the blood donor committee at St. Dunstan's and was assisted with the many tasks in connection with the clinics by several volunteers from the student body.

N.S. House Prorogued

HALIFAX (CP) — Lieutenant-Governor H. B. MacKeen gave royal assent to 148 bills Tuesday night as the Nova Scotia Legislature officially prorogued following a seven-week session. The House passed a dozen bills during the day and finished its supply debate. Two of the bills to be cleared during the final day were proposals to force complete disclosure of consumer credit costs and more closely regulate commercial forest utilization and conservation practices.

3 Impaired Driving Cases Heard In Court

SUMMERSIDE — Milford Derek Robertson, East Baltic, Roy Matheson, Parkdale, and Charles Frederick Boyle, Inverness, were each fined \$75 and costs on impaired driving charges in Prince County Court yesterday. Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald fined George Horace Campbell, Bedouque, and Gordon Martin Arsenault, Miscouche, each \$10 and costs or five days for speeding.

Joseph Camille Casey, Egmont Bay, was fined \$100 and costs for possession of liquor and \$10 and costs for five days for failing to register his motor vehicle.

Charged with common assault in connection with an incident at a high school dance, Ivan Gallant and Desmond Galloway, both of Kinkora, were each fined \$25.

A Charlottetown resident, Alfred MacNeil, was found guilty on a charge of resisting arrest and fined \$50 and costs.

Testifying for the defence were Myron Bell of Charlottetown and the accused who was represented by Charlottetown lawyer Gerald R. Foster, QC.

Acting for the crown was George R. McMahon. The accused had pleaded not guilty to the charge at an earlier hearing. The charge itself had arisen from an incident in Borden some time ago.

Murder Trial Is Continued At St. John's

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP) — The capital murder trial of Kevin O'Neill, 17, of St. John's, in its second day Tuesday, heard Sgt. Donald Randall of the Newfoundland constabulary testify that O'Neill had admitted the killing of Mrs. Edith Maude Parsons, 67, at her home here last Sept. 17.

Sgt. Randall said O'Neill admitted the act shortly after he was arrested Nov. 17 in connection with another case—assault on Margaret Walsh, 17, of St. John's. Sgt. Randall said O'Neill talked freely about the Walsh case and when another officer told him his story sounded like a carbon copy of the Parsons case. "He flushed and moved about in his chair," he said. When asked by Sgt. Randall if he had anything to say about the Parsons case, O'Neill asked if he could have some time to think it over. Sgt. Randall said. He said O'Neill was given some time and a short time later he said "yes, sir, I did it."

The trial before Mr. Justice James Higgins resumes today.

DARTMOUTH, N.S. (CP) — The chairman of the Dartmouth city school board says it is the board's policy to engage competent teachers regardless of their race or creed.

Mr. Brownlow said all applicants for positions on the Dartmouth teaching staff were carefully screened by means of a qualification form which is sent to present or former employees. In many cases these were followed up by telephone calls and where possible the applicant was asked to appear for a personal interview.

In the case of one specific applicant Mr. Wedderburn had referred to, the teacher had not been accepted because of the information on the appraisal form. Mr. Brownlow said that the teacher was not discouraged by not being accepted and applied again to the board at a later date.

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Leaving Accident Scene Dismissed At Summerside

SUMMERSIDE — Two persons appeared before Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald in a night Prince County Court session here last night. One case was dismissed and the other was adjourned to Tuesday, April 6th.

The first case on the docket was that of Ingham William MacNeill, Kennington, charged with leaving the scene of an accident.

The charge was dismissed following the testimony of three crown witnesses, RCMP Constable Lindsey S. Robb, of Summerside, Town Police Constable Vernon Reeves of Kennington and the complainant, Michael MacKinnon of Kennington RR.

The defence called no witnesses. She accused was represented by J. Melville Campbell, George R. McMahon acted for the crown.

In dismissing the case Magistrate MacDonald stated that he had to give the accused the benefit of the doubt in that the evidence was just as consistent as to whether the accused knew or didn't know he had been involved in a collision.

The charge was laid on Jan. 9th following a complaint by Michael MacKinnon of Kennington police that his car had been struck. The incident is reported to have occurred in the parking lot of the Kennington Legion.
