Reporting on some of the achievements of the organization she recalled that in 1956 she had visited the headquarters of the United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund and had heard reports that Yaws (a skin disease) had been practically wiped out. Malaria and Yellow Fever in Afghanistan was wiped out, 20 million children had been vaccinated against TB, millions of cups of milk, vitamins and other health builders distributed yearly, along with many other beneficial results that had been achieved. Converters' reports presented during the day included Citizenship by Mrs. Anthony Gaudet of St. Nicholas, United Nations and Letter Friends by Mrs. Harold Laird, Kensington, Agriculture by Mrs. Charlie Jones, Pownal and publicity by Mrs. William Aylward, Morell.

### RETARDED CHILDREN

The convention endorsed a strong resolution asking the government to give more assistance to mentally retarded children, provide some measure of educational and institutional facilities for mentally retarded children. It asked that more classrooms, such as are now functioning in West Keir School, with specially trained teachers be provided at regional centres. They asked that grades nine and ten be taken from ungraded schools, and transportation be provided to regional high schools. It was suggested that provincial Board of Education examinations be held earlier in June, so that students could get away earlier for summer employment. Other resolutions asked that a family allowance payments be continued past the age of 16 years to pupils who intend to continue their education; that local institutes support institute projects before outside ones, that the Maritime Electric be asked to lower rates for churches, halls and schools, asked the government to provide an instructor for civil defence in the Province; that the government be asked to provide a proper dumping ground in every community. (The request was a made in view of the fact that garbage dumping is so prevalent now). Each institute member is asked to subscribe to a fund toward sending officers of the Institute to the National convention at Ottawa in October. A resolution asked the Red Cross to supply better quality yarn and adjustments to pattern instructions.

### Court Cases At Alberton

A man from O'Leary pleaded guilty to common assault before magistrate R.S. Hinton at Alberton Wednesday, and was fined \$25.00 and costs and \$28.00 damages. A resident of Tignish received a fine of \$20.00 and costs for being intoxicated in a public place and a second Tignish party was fined \$25.00 and costs for possession of liquor not purchased from a vendor (moonshine). An Alberton South fisherman was fined \$11.00 and costs for possession of undersized lobsters and a Casumpee fisherman received a fine of \$35.00 and costs for a similar infraction of the fishery regulations. A Sea Cow Pond party was fined \$35.00 and costs and \$40.00 and costs on two separate charges for possession of undersized lobsters. An Alberton South fisherman was fined \$75.00 and costs for willfully obstructing Alberton town policeman E.R. MacDonald in the performance of his duties.

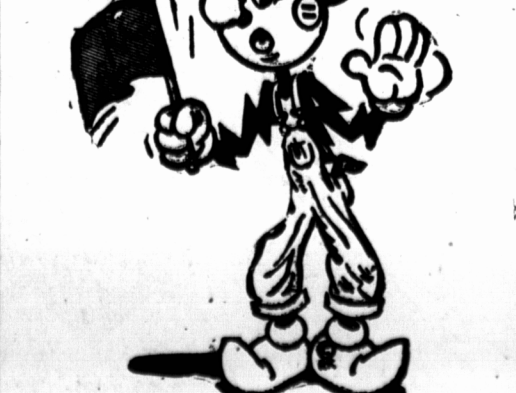
