ENCOENIA WEEK AT KING'S COLLEGE

Convocation Held Yesterday Afternoon

MR. JUSTICE FITZGERALD, REV. J. T. BRYAN, AND MR. WALTER COTTON

Respectively Receive Degrees of D. C. L., M. A., and B. A. With Honors.

Each day of Encoenia week, from Monday until Thursday something of interest in connection with King's College, Windsor, annually takes place. This year a large number of friends and old graduates are in attendance.

On Monday evening the annual dinner of the Halibut Club was held. At this dinner Mr. W. L. Cotton, of THE EXAMINER responded to the toast of the press.

On Tuesday the cricket match for the Cogswell bats was played between the College team and a team from the Leinster Regiment, Halifax, the former winning by seven runs.

The meeting of the associated Alumni, which arranges the business of the university, took place on Wednesday morning. At this meeting Mr. Justice Fitzgerald, Charlottetown, and Rev. J. W. Godfrey, Georgetown, were elected members. The Board of Governors have under consideration the alteration of the B. A. course from three years to four. This would involve a shortening of the college year and enable a considerable reduction in fees to be made.

The conversation was held on Wednesday evening.

But the great event of the week is convocation at which the degrees, etc., are conferred. This was held yesterday afternoon. Among the degrees conferred were:

Mr. Justice Fitzgerald. Honorary degree of D. C. L.

Rev. J. T. Bryan, of St. Paul's. The degree of M. A., in course.

Mr. Walter Cotton. The degree of B. A., with honors in classics.

Among those who addressed the convocation were Dr. Hodgson, Chancellor of the University, and Mr. Justice Fitzgerald.

The proceedings were brought to a close last evening with the students ball. This is Windsor's great annual social event and is always a very brilliant affair.

In connection with the closing of the college a meeting of a number of King's graduates took place on Tuesday to form a Graduates Association to be called "Sons of King's." The object of the association is two-fold; first the bringing of old graduates together in social intercourse and secondly the discussion in an informal way of matters pertaining to the well-being of the college. Rev. C. W. Vernon was elected Secretary, and among the names of those present we notice Rev. E. A. Harris, of Mahone Bay, and Rev. Mr. Scovill who was at St. Peter's Cathedral several years ago.

A steel plant will be established near Sydney, C.B., equalling the largest concerns in Pittsburg or Birmingham.

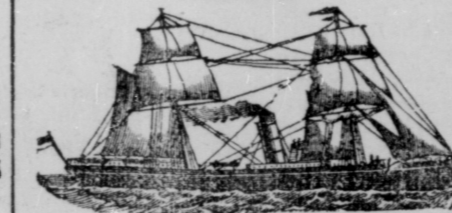
NEW FRENCH CABINET

A PRESENT FOR SIR WILFRID.

His Admirers Raising a Fund.

WILL PRESENT HIM WITH \$25,000.

And Invest \$75,000 for Him in Good Securities

MONTREAL, June 23.—L. David, who has active charge of the movement for the presentation of a hundred thousand dollars to Sir Wilfrid Laurier, yesterday received a letter from Lord Strathcona enclosing a check for ten thousand dollars towards the fund and offering to double the amount if necessary.

It has been decided to present the premier with \$25,000 at once and to invest the balance of \$75,000 in good securities, so that it may bring him in a steady income.

SEWERAGE MATTERS.

SIR,—What's wrong in sewerage quarters? Grave whispers are in the air. There is too much money at stake to permit laxity of attention and the public should be taken into the confidence of the sewer office. The work is stopped it is said for the want of pipe, but a new \$4 a day hand is employed in the office I suppose to help the others at doing nothing. By the way why send our own young men away for want of work and then employ an Australian to do the work and eat the bread of our citizens and taxpayers. Mr. F. De C. Davies was competent to take charge of a squad of men in the Dominion surveys but had to leave home to look for work. Mr. J. P. Nicholson, a competent and licensed surveyor in our midst, who saved the city some thousands of dollars both in last year's contracts and in this is overlooked by the sewer office and a foreigner of unknown experience imported to do his work. It looks much as if the sewer office was manipulated entirely by foreigners and outside wirepullers. If some great bogus or bungling work is found to be the result where will you look for the author of the mistakes. Our citizens should see to it that some one from home be placed on this work so that we will have at least one supervisor interested in the welfare of the city.

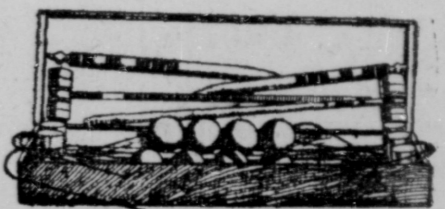
