Report R.C.M.P. To Take Over Fish And Game Protection

The Southern Kings Fish and Game Association held its pre-annual meeting on Tuesday night at the Bison Restaurant, Montague with the president, Gilbert A. Clements, presiding. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved and the financial report presented.

The president gave a brief report on the Maritime Wild Life was attended by three members of the Southern Kings Association.

The nominating committee, consisting of Kenneth Clements and Louis Cantello, was appointed to bring in a slate of officers for the October meeting.

Mr. Ralph Jenkins, president of the Provincial Association addressed the meeting and discussed a proposed arrangement for game protection, including badges for specially appointed game wardens who would be unpaid and have a limited amount of authority. Names of four such game wardens are to be selected at the next meeting. These wardens will work in conjunction with the R.C.M.P. who are to take over game protection within the next six weeks.

Some discussion took place re the Moore sanctuary and a suggestion was put forth that the sanctuary should be more definitely marked as to boundaries for the protection of the hunter. Also the opinion of some of the members present was that the birds should not be fed during the open season.

Following the regular meeting, coffee and doughnuts were enjoyed.

Appeal Cases At Georgetown

The adjourned sitting of the July Supreme Court was held at Georgetown yesterday with Mr. Justice Mark MacGuigan presiding. Two appeal cases were heard.

In the first case, Thomas A. Harris of Elmira was appealing a conviction by the Kings County Magistrate for driving while his ability was impaired for which he was fined \$60.00 and costs in Magistrate's Court. In the appeal, the Queen was represented by Crown Prosecutor Ian M. MacLeod with Mr. M.J. MacQuaid for the appellant. Following the completion of the evidence, judgment was given dismissing the appeal and the conviction and sentence was confirmed.

In the second case, Chester George MacIntyre of Souris was appealing a Magistrate's Court conviction for possession of unlawfully manufactured spirits, contrary to section 163, sub-section 1, paragraph a of the Excise Act. In the lower court he was fined \$500.00 and costs and six months, with a futeher six months in default of payment of fine and costs. Mr. S.S. Hession, Q.C. represented the Crown and Mr. L.P. O'Donnell represented the appellant. It was agreed by counsel to accept the evidence taken in the Magistrate's Court and the appellant was allowed to call a new witness.

Following the completion of the evidence and argument by counsel, the case was adjourned to Charlottetown for judgment at a date to be fixed. The court adjourned sine die.

Two-day Teachers Convention Begins At Montague High

The Montague local two-day teachers convention opened at Montague Memorial High School with 109 in attendance. The president, Mr. Cecil LeLachur, welcomed the convening teachers.

In the absence of Miss Hickox, Mr. H.B. MacPhee was appointed secretary. The minutes of the last fall convention were read and approved.

Miss Estelle Bowness, general secretary of Teachers Federation, dealt with Federation matters including changes in the policy regarding Teacher's Aid. She asked for more contributions to the Educational Horizon. Miss Bowness also read the report of a seven-man committee which recommended that extra remuneration be given for marital status and to teachers supporting dependents.

Mr. Louis Herring, supervisor, addressed the assembled teachers. He stressed the responsibility which teachers must have to their school work, to being punctual, and to their need for professional growth.

A discussion period followed after which the meeting adjourned.
