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killer, who butchered at least five prostitutes in the gaslit slums of the East End 78 years ago, remains unsolved. But Prof. Francis Camps, one of Britain's leading pathologists, suggests the unknown assassin strangled his victims to prevent them from crying out, "a common practice of sexual murderers. He also suggested sketches indicate the killer did not have surgical skill. Camps' comments, along with diagrams of the murder area,

### SOCIETY'S PILLAR

In one of his poems, the assassin said: "I've no time to tell you how I came to be a killer, but you should know, as time will show, that I'm society's pillar."

The gnarled handwriting in his misspelled letters to the police and to a vigilante group suggests he may have been trying to add to his disguise; or it may be that he was not well educated. Some of the letters, diverting over police confusion and public fright, announced his forthcoming murders. In one he said: "The next job I do, I shall clip the lady's ears off and send them to the police, just for jolly, wouldn't you?"

In another, dated Oct. 13, 1888, and sent to "the boss, central news office," he accused Scotland Yard of being asleep, but added that he had to move from Whitechapel, scene of most of the crimes, because it "got rather too warm there."

In another, posted in Liverpool, he stated: "What fools the police are. I even give them the name of the street where I am living." That was Prince William Street in Liverpool.

### MANY THEORIES OFFERED

Many books and theories have been offered on the identity of the killer. Camps makes no comment on this question.

Last year, American author Tom Cullen claimed in his book *Autumn of Terror* that the murderer was a brilliant young barrister named Montague John Drutt, whose father and grandfather were surgeons.

Seven weeks before the 31-year-old Drutt's body was fished out of the Thames, he had been reported missing by his relatives. The date of their report was Dec. 8, 1888, three weeks after the most gruesome Whitechapel slaying. Cullen said the identity was contained in private notes of Sir Melville Macnaghten, head of Scotland Yard's criminal investigation office from 1903 to 1913. In one note, Macnaghten was reported to have stated Drutt was suspected of the Whitechapel murder by his own family.

All the murders took place in the September - November period of 1888. At one inquest, a witness stated that 10 minutes before victim Catherine Edmondson met her death, she was seen talking to a man about 30 years of age, five feet, nine inches tall, with a small fair moustache, dressed in "something like navy serge" and a deerstalker's hat. That may have been the killer.

### FLAG RIPPED DOWN

LONDON (AP) — An American flag was ripped from its pole in front of Westminster Abbey Saturday night. A group called Action Movement for Peace telephoned newspaper offices and said it had pulled down the flag as a protest against the Viet Nam war. The flag was flying to mark the appearance of the Washington Cathedral Choir at an Abbey service.

The bidding: Opening lead — ten of diamonds.

Your first aim, as declarer, is to select the method of play most likely to bring home the contract. Sometimes this choice involves the use of hairline good judgment, but in most hands the right line of play is clear, though it is not always apparent.

Take a case like this one. Let's say you're declarer at four spades and West leads a diamond. You win it with the ace, but what would you do now? The obvious thing to do is to try to ruff a club in dummy,

which would give you your tenth trick, but this is much easier said than done.

Thus, suppose you played a low club at trick two in an effort to obtain the ruff. East would win the trick with the nine, and since it would not be difficult for him to see what you are planning to do, would play back a trump. Your best chance now would be to finesse the trump, but since the finesse would lose and West would return a trump, you would wind up going down one.

However, this is not the right way to play the hand. The proper play is to lead the king of clubs at trick two, not a low one.

This unusual play is highly effective if West has the ace of clubs—which you can expect to occur about half the time. In the actual case, West would take the king with the ace, but he would then be helpless.

He could return a trump, which you would win, but when you now played another club, West would be faced with the unhappy choice of letting you ruff a club or losing his trump trick by taking the club and returning a trump.

Of course, it might turn out when you led the king of clubs that East had the ace, but that would certainly not mean that you had failed to give yourself the best chance of making the contract.

## POKEY THE WHALE DIES WITH 40 BULLET HOLES

CHARLES CITY, Va. (AP) — Pokey, the whale who lived briefly in the James River far from his native home in the Atlantic ocean, died Friday.

The 30-foot mammal, who touched the hearts of many in his fight for life, had about 40 bullet holes in his 3,000-pound body.

Pronouncing Pokey dead was Virginia's state commissioner of fisheries, Milton T. Hickman.

Word of the death came from the office of Governor Mills E. Godwin, Jr., which said Pokey's remains would be towed to sea, 70 miles away.

Pokey had been left for dead Wednesday night after he was tied to a tree along the shore and shot 12 times with a .30-calibre rifle. The rifleman intended to kill him

on grounds he was a menace to river fishermen.

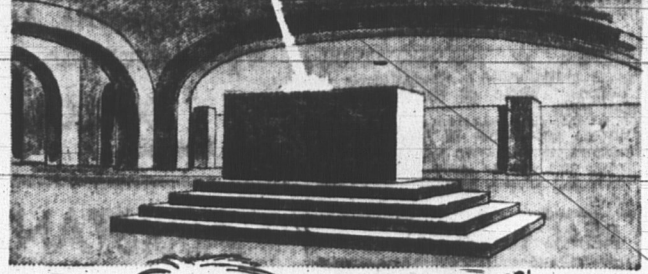
But when a commercial fisherman began towing away the body Thursday, Pokey came to life. He swished his great tail, snapped three nylon towlines and swam off.

And, even though he had previously been shot 25 or 30 times, Pokey seemed in excellent health, he spouted water defiantly.

Meanwhile, angry protests came from the public.

Since Monday, when Pokey was first spotted by the fisherman, Normay Haynes, callers have been asking for the intervention of the U.S. Army, the coast guard, Governor Godwin, the Virginia Institute of Marine Science and the U.S. interior department.
