CATTLE INSPECTED.—The Pioneer reports that Mr. Jas. McDonald, veterinary inspector, was at Tignish last week examining some cattle supposed to be affected with tuberculosis. He found one animal in a herd owned by Mr. Richard Kehoe, of Norway, which gave evidence of being affected.

STEAM YACHT.—The steam yacht Ituna arrived in port on Saturday evening, and remained until yesterday morning. The Ituna is owned by Mr. Allison V. Armour, of New York, who is on board with Mr. and Mrs. Jordan L. Mott and Mr. Harry Holbrook, all of the same city. They have been up the Rest gouché fishing salmon for the last three weeks and are now on their way back.

CHATHAM MAN SCALPED.—A Chatham man who imbibed too freely on Diamond Jubilee day had a narrow escape from death on Tuesday night. He became stupid lay down beside the track to sleep and a passing train cut the crown out of his hat and also took off a small piece of the scalp. The man was discovered later on by the train hands' still in a drunken stupor but fortunately practically unharmed. He had a close shave, however, and one that he is not likely to want repeated.

A METEORIC STONE.—Mr. David Rogers, of Summerside, was exhibiting a rare curiosity on Saturday. On the evening before during the lightning he observed something fall near his dwelling, and on a closer observation he saw something smoking on the grass. It turned out to be a stone which had partly buried itself and which was found to be quite warm. The stone is of irregular shape and about four or five inches square and three-quarters of an inch thick, while fastened to it are other pieces of a different composition, and resembling whitish shelly cinders. The stone itself is of a light brownish dull color, although here and there are glazed spots. Evidently it came from the heavens, but from what unknown realm is a matter of great speculation.—Pioneer.

AT THE BUTTS.

The fourth and final competition of the League series was shot on Saturday throughout Canada. In Charlottetown the teams could not begin till late in the afternoon as the camp men were using the range for musketry instruction, and it was almost eight o'clock in the evening before the firing was finished. A light wind prevailed during the shooting at 200 and 400 ranges, and some good scores were made. 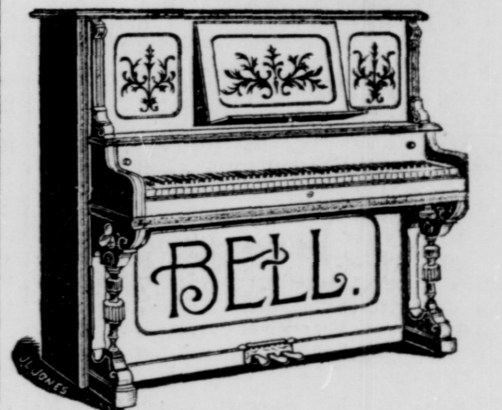
