3/4 lb. tender veal, sliced 1/4" thick  
1/4 c. olive oil  
1/2 stick butter or margarine  
1 peeled section garlic, pressed or 1/2 tsp. garlic powder  
1 peeled large onion, chopped-coarse  
2 tsp. flour  
1 tsp. salt  
1/4 tsp. pepper  
1/4 tsp. brown gravy powder  
2 seeded green peppers, cut in 1/4" strips  
1 (4 1/2 oz.) can sliced mushrooms and liquid  
1/4 c. dry sherry
