## EARL ROSEBERY MAKES A STIRRING APPEAL.

To the Loyalty of the British  
Empire—Forecast of the  
Twentieth Century.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

GLASGOW, Nov. 17.—Earl Rosebery was installed yesterday as Lord Rector of Glasgow University. His Rectorial address, on the subject of the British Empire, was a stirring appeal to the race to realize its responsibility and prepare to fight for its existence.

"Never," said the former Premier, "had the Empire so urgently required the strenuous support of its subjects because there was a disposition abroad to challenge both its naval and commercial supremacy."

"The twentieth century," he declared, "would be a period of keen intellectual and almost fierce international competition, more probably in the arts of peace than in the arts of war."

"Therefore," he added, "it will be necessary to undertake periodical stock holding, to remodel the state machinery, the educational methods, and to become more business-like."

Schooner Sunk.

HALIFAX, Nov. 17.—The schooner E. M. G. Harvey, from Sydney for Halifax, while entering Louisbourg yesterday struck a rock and sunk.

FREDERICTON, Nov. 17.—The Dalhousie College football team was beaten yesterday by the home team, 3 to 0.

Dr. Morrison's Report.

LONDON, Nov. 16.—Dr. Morrison, wiring to the Times from Peking, Tuesday, says:

"The Tartar general commanding in the province of Sze Chuan has been nominated governor general of Manchuria in deference to Russia's invitation to China to resume the government of that territory under Russian protection."

"The Chinese peace commissioners have received a telegram from the Empress dowager, dated Nov. 10, censuring their failure to prevent the despatch of foreign punitive expeditions into the interior. The empress dowager continues to issue decrees appointing officials to office. She is unable to realize her position, and has even appointed literary chancellors to conduct examinations in the provinces."

Lord Roberts Coming.

TORONTO, Ont., Nov. 16.—Captain Baker, speaking before the St. George's Society, of this city, states that Lord Roberts had expressed his intention of visiting Canada within a year's time and of renewing his acquaintance with the Canadian volunteers.

BRESLAU, Nov. 17.—The missile thrown at the Emperor yesterday was a short hand chopper. The woman is believed to be insane. She occupied a place in the front rank of the spectators on the side farthest from the Emperor. The chopper was so well aimed that it actually struck the carriage.

The crowd of people who witnessed the outrage threw themselves upon His Majesty's assailant, but the prompt interference of the police saved the woman from injury.

VRYHEID BESIEGED.

British Threaten to Blow it Up.

LONDON, Nov. 17.—The Vryheid garrison is practically besieged, says a Pietermaritzburg correspondent wiring on Thursday, and the town is evacuated, a position being taken on the hills commanding it.

Notices have been posted in the vicinity warning the Boers that if they attempt to re-occupy the town it will be blown to pieces.

QUEEN VICTORIA

Personally Thanks the Canadians.

LONDON, Nov. 17.—Queen Victoria received a detachment of Colonial troops, including a number of Canadians, at Windsor yesterday and personally thanked them for their loyal services to the Empire.

Boers Still At It.

LONDON, Nov. 17.—Boers have broken the railway in twenty places between Bloemfontein and Orange River. The line was cut yesterday between Kimberly and Belmont.

Plucky!

MONTREAL, Nov. 16.—Hon. E. J. Flynn, leader of the Opposition in the Quebec Legislature, arrived in town this morning and held a conference with the local Conservative leaders. The party cannot hope for success in the coming provincial election in view of the recent Liberal sweep in Quebec, but will make as good a fight as possible.

Showers of Stars.

NORTHFIELD, Mass., Nov. 15.—More than 70 meteors were noted during the night at the Goodsell observatory. During the early morning hours a number of Leonides were observed, together with a considerable shower from the constellation Gemini, the start being unexpected.

Kingston's Commandant.

KINGSTON, Nov. 16.—Col. Otter will not be the commandant of the Royal Military College. Major General O'Grady Haly stated that the new commandant had been selected but he could not remember his name. The officer selected is at present serving in South Africa.

Tendered a Banquet.

NEW YORK, Nov. 16.—The members of the Chicago Irish-American ambulance corps sent out to aid the Boers in South Africa arrived last night at quarantine on the steamer Trave, from Bremen. A delegation of members of Irish societies met them at the pier and escorted them to the Vanderbilt hotel, where they were tendered a banquet.

Bubonic Plague.

CAPE TOWN, Nov. 16.—An outbreak of bubonic plague is reported among the natives of Szinyoka, near King William's Town.

Precautions are being taken to prevent the spread of the disease among the whites.

Taking of Taxes.

WINONA, Wis., Nov. 16.—Congressman James A. Tawney of the ways and means committee, speaking of the meeting to be held in Washington Nov. 30, says:

"The object is to consider the extent to which the war revenue taxes can be removed and amendments suggested to make the law more satisfactory in administration. The problem as to what taxes shall be removed will be a perplexing one. I think, however, it is safe to say that the stamp tax upon instruments of conveyances such as notes, deeds, mortgages, inheritances for charitable and benevolent purposes will be removed; possibly the taxes upon proprietary medicines and some others.

"It will be the desire of the members of the committee to remove just as many of the stamp taxes as possible, but like the removal of the taxes under the old civil war revenue act this will probably have to be done gradually so as to avoid sailing too close to the danger of a deficit."

Off for the North Pole.

ST. JOHN'S, N. F., Nov. 15.—Evelyn B. Baldwin, who is a member of the Wellman expedition spent the winter of 1898-1899 in Franz Josef Land, and who was a member of the Peary expedition of 1893-94, arrived here today in search of steamers, men, dogs and other requisites for his projected North Pole venture next summer, backed by the purse of Wm. Zeigler. He will secure a sealing steamer prior to next spring's sealing voyage, if possible.

The Chinese Court.

SHANGHAI, Nov. 16.—There are continued rumors of the projected transfer of the Chinese court to Cheng Tu, but it is said that the viceroy of the province of Sze Chuan objects to such an arrangement. It is also rumored that a rebellion has broken out in the province of Kan Su. Chang Chi Tung, the Wu Chang viceroy, is said to be raising 100,000 troops and to have proposed to the Nankin viceroy that they should combine forces to oppose the allies.
