## Severe Blow To OAS Seen By Many Latin Americans

 MEXICO CITY (AP)—In many Latin American eyes the Organization of American States (OAS), never robust at its best, has received from the Dominican Republic crisis a blow from which it may never fully recover.

Responsible Latin Americans in and out of government express the conviction that whether the OAS holds its scheduled meeting in August in Rio de Janeiro it will be attending its own funeral service, unless it is willing to submit to surgery.

Any effect the OAS may have had in the Dominican Republic knowledgeable Latin Americans are saying, was achieved only because of the giant force of the United States behind a facade of organization to which only four of its 19 other members gave even token military support. Critics say that unless the OAS perfects its machinery, it is finished.

But there are inhibitions and dilemmas in the way of perfecting the machinery. Originally it was conceived as a referee in disputes among American states. ### Prairie Seeding Behind Last Year

OTTAWA (CP)—Spring grain planting in the Prairie farm belt was 80 per cent complete at May 31, well behind last year, the bureau of statistics has reported.

The bureau noted that for Canada as a whole 81 per cent of the five grain categories had been sown by the end of May compared to 98 per cent at that point last year and an average of 87 per cent in the '59-63 period.

Quebec was 93 per cent completed compared to 70 last year and the 1959-63 average of 75.

In the Maritimes, where planting is normally later than the rest of Canada, 78 per cent of the grains were planted by the May 31 check, better than the 67 last year and the five year average of 62.

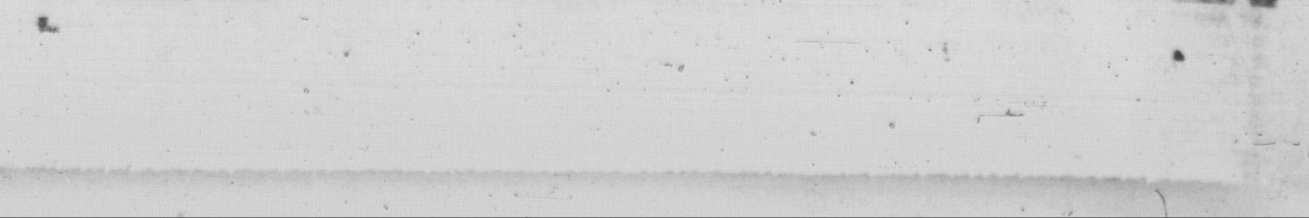
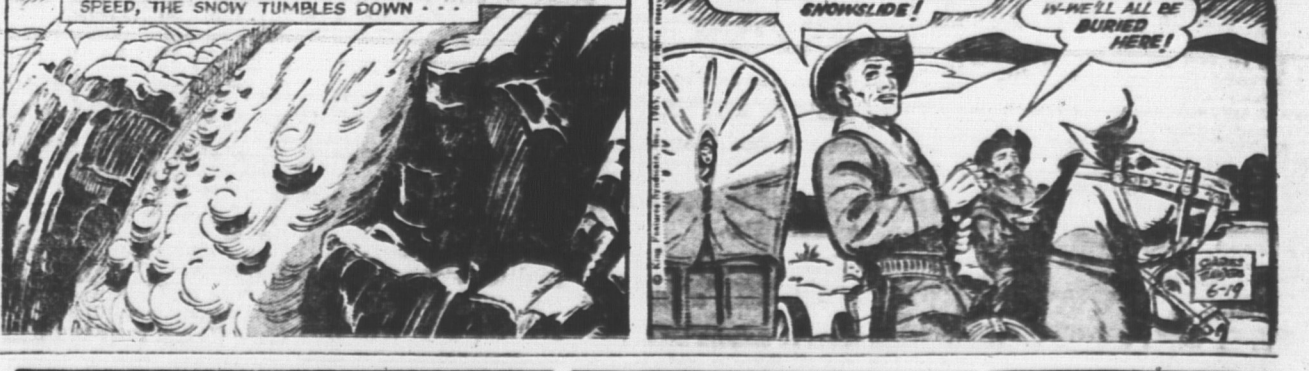
