Farm Prices And Products

The following market report has been prepared by the P. E. Department of Agriculture. The Deputy Minister, Mr. S. C. Wright states that he would like to mention the Course in Sheep Husbandry, and some practical work in shearing, that will be held under the auspices of the County office on March 28th to April 1st. "It is our hope," he said, "that we will receive applications from those who are interested in sheep raising, and who are anxious to learn something more about sheep raising and shearing. The Course will be conducted by the Field Staff of our Department assisted by Mr. James Mundy of the Canada Department of Agriculture. We are hopeful of securing the services of Mr. S. B. Williams, Superintendent of the Experiment Farm at Nappan, to lecture to this class on Sheep Husbandry. Mr. Williams is an outstanding authority on all phases of sheep raising, and will have a very interesting message for those in attendance. If this Course is successful we are planning to conduct another one in the Eastern section of the Province somewhat under the same lines."

DAIRYING

Butter prices on the St. John and Halifax markets continued rising during the past week, with the wholesale price of first grade, one and two-pound prints, being quoted at 63 cents, local jobbing 65 cents.

Local jobbing in this Province is also 65 cents, and the wholesale price is that of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, less freight and handling charges.

Montreal butter, current receipts 61 cents, wholesale 61 1/2-62 cents, 60% to 61%.

The production of butter for the week ending March 12th amounted to 40,534 lbs., compared with 47,324 lbs. for the same week last year. This is a decrease of 6,790 lbs., or 14.3%.

On March 1, 1955 there were 99,000 lbs. of cheese in storage in this Province, which is 100,000 lbs. less than at February 1st. This amount may easily be sold within the Province before the production season begins. Retail merchants should, therefore, purchase their requirements early.

EGG MARKET

The egg market remains about steady and unchanged from last report. Surplus supplies continue to clear to other Atlantic Provinces under a fair to good demand. Production is steadily increasing. General quality is good.

Some carelessness in grading has been noted recently in gradings shipments arriving in Charlottetown from rural stations. With markets at the present just steady, a carelessly graded pack could have a very upsetting effect. Therefore, every effort will be made to check all shipments on delivery or prior to shipment out of the Province. In future all eggs found below grade marked will be placed under detention and returned to the owner. So grade according to Government Standards and, hold your Markets!

POPTOES

Since our last report there have been 41,150 bushels of seed potatoes shipped from the Province. The demand for tablestock is light to fair at the present time, and shipments have been considerably lighter the last three or four days. The price in general is \$1.45 for the contents of a 75 pound bag delivered to the car, with a few places paying \$1.50.

Turnips are in fair demand at 50¢ per bushel at the car, but here again a few buyers are paying up to 55¢.

LIVESTOCK

Trading in steers was a bit slow on the Montreal market. Good cows were in steady demand, and up to 50¢ higher, particularly the better ones. Mixed Good and Choice Steers brought 20.50 to 21.00; Medium 17.00 to 19.50; with Common down to 14.50. Good Beef Type Cows were 15.50 to 14.50, with a few at 15.00; Good Dairy Type Cows were 12.50 to 13.00.

On the Maritime markets hog and sow prices are down \$1.00 at all places, but all other livestock, but all other livestock prices, Monton and Charlottetown, are steady with last week.
