

# Registration Of Youngsters For Little Leagues 9.30 This Morning At Memorial Field

All youngsters interested in playing little league baseball in Charlotteville this summer are asked to report to Memorial Field this morning at 9.30 where they will hand their names in to Little League coaches.

The Little League, which has had a decided success in the few years in which it has been in operation in Charlotteville, will most likely be increased to four teams this year, one more than the number of teams in operation in other years.

In establishing Little League Baseball, Charlotteville has fallen into line with many other centres all over North America. Since the Little League was introduced by Carl E. Stoltz at Williamsport Pennsylvania back in 1939, Little League has grown by leaps and bounds until now there are almost 3,000 leagues operating and well over 200,000 youngsters have been given a chance to play baseball in either the Little League or the "farm teams."

**LEAGUE OBJECTIVE**  
The objective of Little League baseball is to provide healthful recreation for boys, with adherence to this aim is undoubtedly the reason for its popularity in thousands of communities. The boys participating in the game, the adults contributing their services and the fans rooting for the team get something out of little league — and it is considerably more than recreation.

The real benefits lie in intangibles which become evident as the program establishes itself in the community. As the teams are formed the manager has but one thought "can a boy pitch, field, run or bat." With this we find teams formed from every section of the league's area, and this helps to eliminate boyish gangs and cliques. Ideas such as that a boy who attends another church is "different" are greatly eliminated. Beliefs that a youngster who comes from a different race is not a person with whom to be associated will be corrected.

The boy's interest in their teammates parallels that of their manager as batting, fielding or pitching ability is the only yardstick. What more can a town want than the installing of the fine principles of sportsmanship, tolerance and understanding in its youngsters. The essential qualities are brought to the community as one of the intangibles of little league ball.

**NO CURE-ALL**  
Little League makes no pretence of a cure-all for juvenile delinquency but it has been found that in the towns in which a program has been established, the boys behave and make their towns better places in which to live. One of the reasons for this is that all teams must be uniformed and the players take pride in their uniforms and know that should they engage in malicious mischief they would lose this privilege.

There are no financial rewards to the persons who contribute time and money to see the results of their efforts in the form of youngsters who are developing into fine adults. They are the residents of their community being welded together with a more tolerant understanding of each other's problems.

This is the reward which comes to little league workers. These are the dividends they receive.

**DOWN THE BACK STRETCH**

The Federal Department of Agriculture assisted by personnel of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police will be supervising the wagering at Tracks in the Maritimes this year. CHICAGO (AP)—Paul Miner, left-handed pitcher for Chicago Cubs, will be in a plaster cast for three or four months due to a fracture suffered in a baseball game last June 15.

Whether the career of the 35-year-old Miner has ended as a result of his accident was unknown, but an x-ray examination Thursday disclosed Miner has a fracture of the second vertebra in his back.

Miner, acquired from the Boston Red Sox in 1950, had a major league record of 14-4 with a 3.00 ERA.

# Lowly Cubs Beat Braves 8-4; Dodgers And Yankees Gain Wins

CHICAGO (AP)—The hot Milwaukee Braves were cooled off by the lowly Chicago Cubs, 8-4 Friday as three unearned runs in the fourth and homers by Ernie Banks and Pete Whisenand backed Bob Rush to his seventh victory.

Rush scattered nine hits, including a triple and homer by Johnny Logan, to hand the Braves their third defeat in 14 games under new manager Fred Haney. The loser was Lew Burdette, who lasted four innings before yielding to a pinch hitter.

Although the Braves never were ahead, thanks to Banks' No. 17 homer after Gene Baker singled in the Cub first, Burdette saw a 2-2 tie ruined in the fourth on a throwing error by second sacker Danny O'Connell which opened the gate for four Bruin runs.

**BROOKLYN (AP)**—Brooklyn Dodgers came from three runs back on consecutive ninth-inning home runs by Duke Snider, Rand Jackson and Gil Hodges Friday night to bomb Philadelphia Phillies 6-5 Snider and Hodges each had two homers for the game.

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# COOPER OUSTED AT WIMBLEDON

WIMBLEDON, England (CP)—Ashley Cooper, the youthful Australian who is rated as the most promising newcomer, world tennis, will have to wait another year to achieve top ranking in the all-England championships.

Cooper, considered the world's Aussie hit come-uppance Friday, in the week to be moving up in class when he knocked out Sven Davidson, the third-seeded Swede. But a 24-year-old unknown who ranks no better than 17th in the United States rankings gave the young Aussie his come-uppance Friday.

Allen Morris of Atlanta dropped his first set to Cooper 6-1, winning only four points in the first five games. But then rain interrupted the match and Morris was a different player when the downpour ended.

Uncorking a booming service, the crew-cut blonde punched powerfully at his opponent's weak forehand and eventually wore him down, 1-6, 12-10, 8-6, 3-6, 6-3.

**Fred Perry Invited To Visit Russia**

LONDON (Reuters) — Fred Perry, who won the Wimbledon lawn tennis singles championship last year, has been invited to go to Russia to organize coaching there, it was revealed Friday.

Perry was approached by the head of a 21-man Soviet delegation now in Britain to see this year's championship.

"They are tremendously impressed by what they have seen," Perry said, "and if they get into the international federation they will send a team to Wimbledon next year."

"As well as organizing the coaching they want me to give them a full idea of what Wimbledon is so that they can join in and do everything correctly."

**Rich Canadian Derby Slated For Monday**

WINNIPEG (CP)—The Canadian Derby, richest racing stakes in western Canada at \$10,000-added unfolds for the 27th year at Polo Park here Monday with an eastern horse from Toronto expected to carry the favorite odds.

Argent, owned by Ben Steen and second to Canadian Champ in this year's running of the Queen's Plate in Toronto, is likely to be the standout entry in a field of 12 that will go to the post on Dominion Day.

Final entries for the western classic, for three-year-olds foaled in Canada and over a distance of 1 1/4 miles, have not been decided. A total of 62 horses were eligible but the field will be whittled to no more than 10 or 12.
