The bride's mother chose for her daughter's wedding a dress of grey, hammered satin, with black accessories. The groom's mother wore navy blue with black accessories.

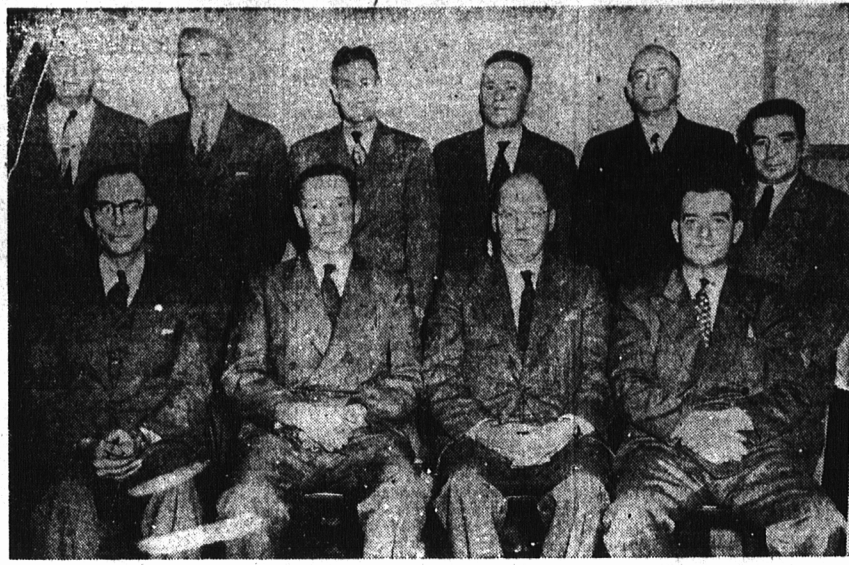

Anything that Mr. Belvedere sets out to do is accomplished with verve, finesse and a plethora of laughs. That's the superlative way of saying that "Mr. Belvedere Rings the Bell," which opens today at the Capitol Theatre, is a delightfully funny picture. And who can be anything but superlative in reviewing Clifton Webb's polished performances on the screen, not forgetting, of course, "Cheaper by the Dozen" and "Sitting Pretty." In his newest film escapade Mr. Webb as Belvedere decides to prove to the inmates of an old folks home that life can be full and beautiful without a dull moment. In the course of rejuvenating the doddering ways of the place, he trifles with the affections of Joanne Dru, the pretty young nurse in charge of the inmates, and ends up stirring the slumbering romantic urges of her fiancé, Hugh Marlowe, who plays the role of an inhibited minister.

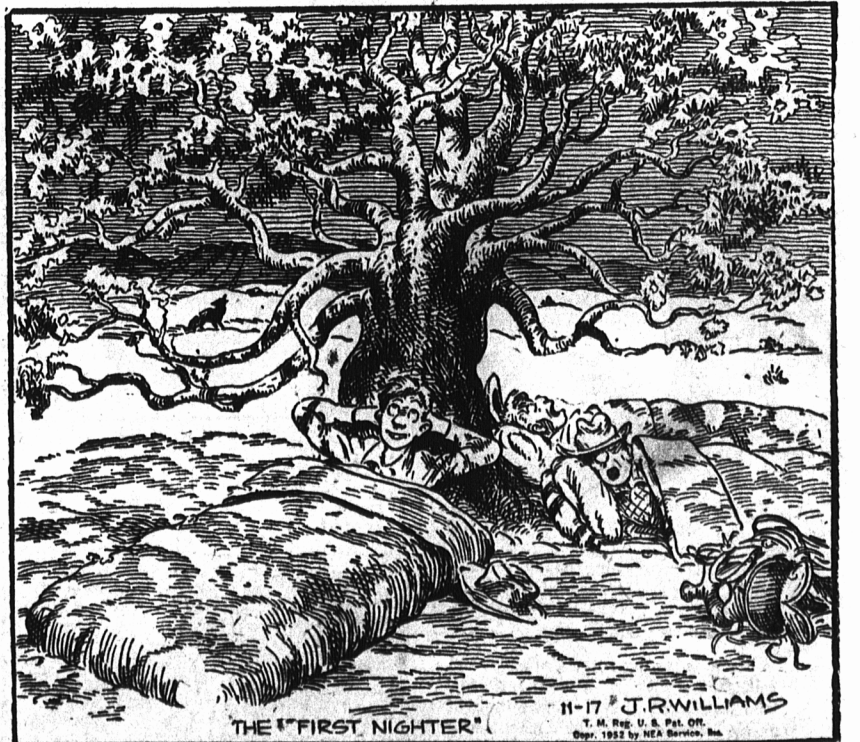

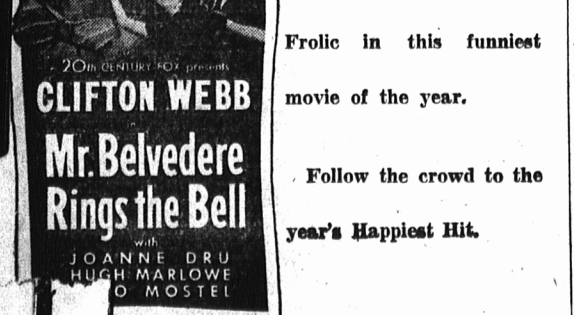
