A zipper is a little like an automatic elevator - it's a wonderful invention until it happens to get stuck.

If you have trouble with a zipper refusing to close, even though the slider pulls up and down, here's what to do:

Draw the slider to the top and hold the teeth immediately in front of it firmly with your fingers, so that the teeth lie parallel to each other and almost touch. Keeping the teeth in place, push the slider forward with a little jerk. Don't force it. When it has gone as far as it will move, (perhaps half an inch), stop, then push the slider back and repeat the action. Each time you do this, the slider should gain half an inch or more. This system will usually work on all zippers except the "open" type, such as those used on the front of wind-breakers.

Once you get the knack of feeding the teeth into the slider, you can also replace sliders that come right off zippers. The main thing in this job is to keep the teeth flat and in an even line, so that they feed easily into the slider.

Perhaps this all sounds easier than you will find it to be the first time you try it. But that's the way with a good many cleaning jobs, too. It takes experience and know-how—two things that we pride ourselves on here in our shop.
