

## Bruins Try To Hold Jinx Over Fourth Place Toronto

Boston Bruins appear to have stolen a page from the book of New York Rangers and are hitting Toronto Maple Leafs over the head with it.

One of the major reasons Leafs finished fourth in the National Hockey League last year was an unimpressive record against the second-division Rangers. Toronto had its share of victories over the top clubs, but when it came to Rangers—it flopped.

This season, when it appears the Leafs may have finally overcome the New York jinx, along come the Bruins and the Leafs are right back where they started.

The two clubs clash tonight at Toronto in one of six weekend games. Other matches tonight have Detroit Red Wings at New York and Montreal Canadiens playing host to Chicago Black Hawks.

Sunday's schedule has Montreal at Chicago, Toronto at New York and Detroit at Boston.

GOALS ARE RARE  
The Leafs must be somewhat embarrassed when they look at the statistics. Bruins have yielded 88 goals in 20 games this season, but Toronto has scored only three times in three games.

Boston has twice defeated the Leafs—2-0 and 2-1—and gained a 2-2 tie.

At the same time last year, the clubs had played four times with Toronto winning two, losing one and tying one. An interesting note is that Leafs outscored the Bruins 13-8 in the four games.

In looking at only the first three games between the two clubs in 1964-65, the Leafs still had the edge. Each had won one game and tied one, but Toronto held a 10-7 margin in goals.

So, Boston is one reason Toronto is floundering in fourth place. But there are other reasons.

Leafs are the lowest scoring club in the league after 20 games with 44 goals, two fewer than Boston. But the Bruins are in sixth spot and Leafs fourth.

Last year, after 20 games, Toronto had 53 goals.

Leafs are the lowest scoring club in the league after 20 games with 44 goals, two fewer than Boston.

But the Bruins are in sixth spot and Leafs fourth.

Last year, after 20 games, Toronto had 53 goals.

Running down the list, the top Leaf goal-getters are Dave Keon and Eddie Shack with seven each and Bob Pulford with six. Frank Mahovlich, supposed to be the heart of Toronto's scoring power, has four.

"Okay, we're not scoring enough," says Toronto coach Punch Imlach. "Every one knows that. But the only way to play is to hit people and that's exactly what we haven't been doing."

In Leafs' victorious years—three consecutive Stanley Cups—they were noted more for their bumping, rugged style of play than anything else.

"Our guys need to fight at the drop of a hat," says Imlach. "This is no longer true and can be attested to by the fact that the Leafs are the only team in the league without a major penalty for fighting this year."

DEFENCEMEN OUT  
Leafs have their other problems as well, like losing rugged defenceman Bob Baun for six weeks because of a knee injury and defenceman Carl Brewer's unexpected retirement prior to the start of the season.

Defenceman Al Arbour of Rochester Americans, Leafs' farm team in the American League, will be making his first appearance in Toronto when the clubs take to the ice tonight.

"I could never understand why Al didn't stick in the NHL," says Marcel Pronovost, who will team up with Arbour for the first time since they both played for Detroit in 1957-58.

"I'd have to rate him ahead of a few guys who have been drawing regular pay cheques in this league."

Forward Wally Boyer will be getting his first shot in the league after 502 games in the minors. He, too, was called up from Rochester.

OTTAWA (CP)—Coach Frank Clair was given a "unanimous" vote of confidence by directors of Ottawa Rough Riders Friday at a meeting which "resolved" differences between him and assistant coach Bill Smyth.

## Junior Habs Looking Good

Well... the Prince County All-Stars took it on the chin last evening 10-4 and although this observer was not able to be at the game in person I understand that it was a rather well administered licking. At no time was the outcome of the match in doubt but the game gave rise to some rather interesting observations.

Contrary to the usual give and take style of the PCHL pucksters the spectators saw a clean fast game in which only five infractions were called. The Junior Habs showed a great deal more polish than they did earlier in the season against Charlottetown and the effects of the pre-season slate of exhibitions showed through.

The Canadians had a good edge in skating power and the All-Stars just were not able to make up for the conditioning that they spotted the Halifax club. The visitors showed a polished style of play and a good brand of positional hockey sunk Summerside. The All-Stars were very disorganized for the greater part of the evening and when a club is playing a team with the strength of Halifax it can not expect to make mistakes without some repercussions. In this case it was goals.

The three Islanders on the club made excellent impressions and if reports from the Summerside Journal are correct the baby Habs could soon be sporting yet another P.E. Islander. Kevin Smith played his usual outstanding game on the blue line while both Jackie MacEachern and Paul MacWilliams picked up one tally for the visitors. MacEachern and MacWilliams have both been doing excellently with the club, putting goals regularly, although the latter recently left the club for a brief period for some unknown reason. However he is making the return trip with the Habs to Halifax and coach Leo Bossey feels that MacWilliams could be playing the Junior OHA circuit next season should he exhibit the right attitude from here on in.

## SOME QUESTIONS

However there are some rather big questions in the minds of knowledgeable hockey observers in the Maritimes as to just how much the Montreal Habs are backing the juniors. It has been learned by a very reliable source that any team in the NHL apart from the Habs can sign any member of the Halifax club. If this is the case then there has to be some question as to just how far the Habs are willing to commit themselves if the Halifax club runs into difficulty.

Surely the club is not taking the full burden of Halifax's financial burden on their back for if it was then no other team would be able to touch the Halifax team. One can not help but observe that the Junior Habs are more than a bit worried about their finances. They have played an abnormal number of exhibition matches against a variety of competition and rest assured that all of these were not only for physical condition.

According to one astute observer both the Detroit Red Wings and the Chicago Black Hawks are looking to set up clubs similar to the Junior Habs in the Maritimes and Fredricton has been a name heard mentioned. It would be a great thing for a Maritime League to come into existence with the best hockey players in the Atlantic provinces doing battle regularly. Coach Bossey feels that his team is on par with the Quebec Junior League now and will be able to skate with the Ontario clubs in less than three seasons. Should a Maritime league come into existence it is a reasonable assumption that they could be on par with any junior hockey league in Canada given a few years to strengthen.

## Jackie Robinson Tells Of Frick

NEW YORK (CP) — Jackie Robinson says he was stunned by the first question general manager Branch Rickey asked him when he was called into Rickey's Brooklyn Dodgers office in 1945.

"He asked me if I had a girl," Jackie said. "I replied, 'Yes, sir.'"

"Tell me about her," Rickey said. "I did, and then he took off his glasses, looked at me solemnly and said, 'Then, marry her. You're going to have some trying times before you're through. You'll need somebody by your side.'"

Robinson recalled the incident Friday as he joined the baseball world in mourning the death of the man who, among other things, was instrumental in breaking the color barrier in organized baseball.

Rickey, who would have been 84 Dec. 20, died in hospital Thursday night in Columbia, Mo., where he collapsed Nov. 13 after being inducted into the Missouri Hall of Fame.

"When I got word that Mr. Rickey wanted to see me, I thought he was going to talk to me about the Negro Baseball League," Robinson, now a greying banker, said. "I had no idea he intended to have me break into baseball."

Robinson was signed to play with Brooklyn's Montreal International League farm team Oct. 23, 1945, and then on April 10, 1947, came the shattering announcement—Jackie was being brought up by the Dodgers to become the first Negro to play in the major leagues.

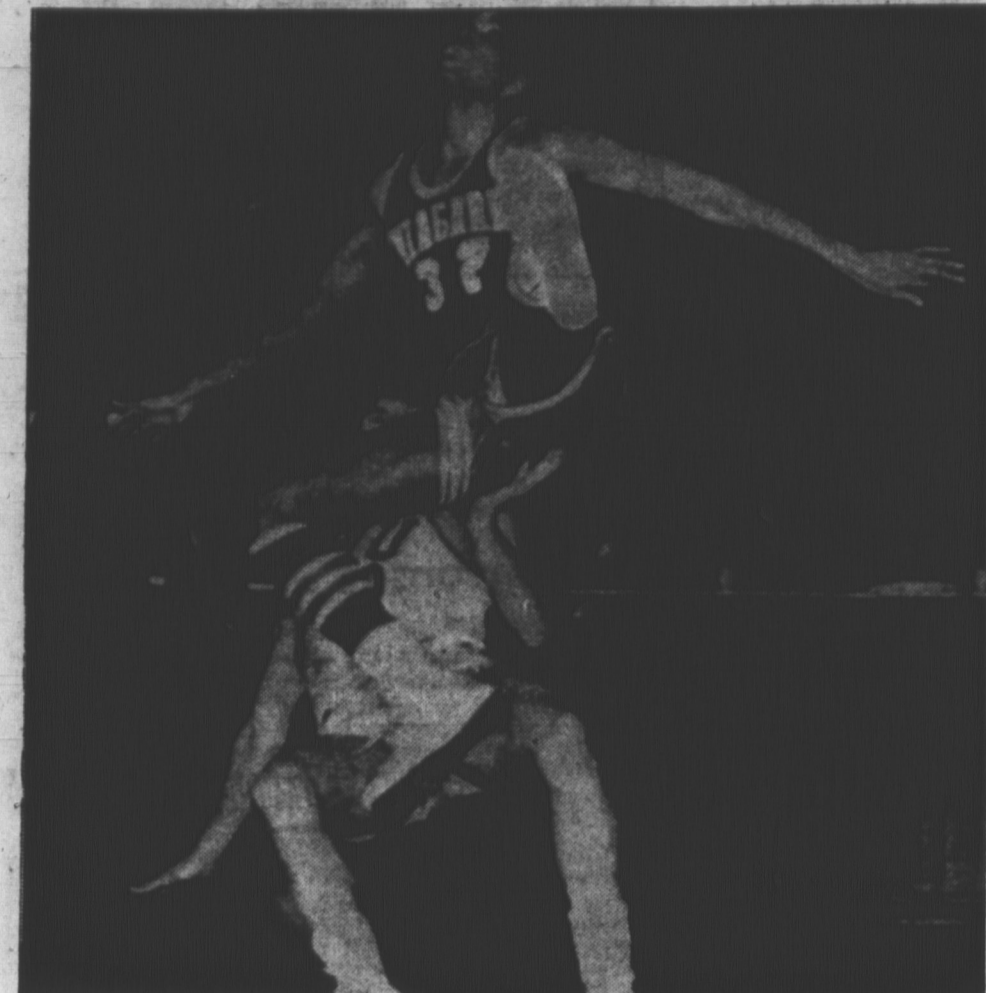
"Mr. Rickey foresaw that would be running into obstacles, and he did everything possible to make my load light," Jackie said. "He was one of the warmest, most considerate and most dedicated men I have ever met."

"If it hadn't been for his remarkable foresight, for his constant counsel and help along the way, I'm not sure I could have made it!"

Rickey met with Negro leaders in various major league cities. A code of behavior was laid down for Robinson. He must not talk back to umpires, get into arguments with other players or make a scene of himself during the off hours.

Gonzales was pushed down in

the fifth after he handed one of his few solid punches, a right to the jaw. It was no knock-down.

A crowd of 12,146 paid \$72,502 to see the uneven contest at Madison Square Garden and hooted the two fighters through the final rounds.

Let Me Call You Sweetheart and the strains of Deep in the Heart of Texas echoed through the arena.

Gonzales, 146, had beaten Griffith, 146½, in a Jan. 26 non-title 10-rounder in Houston.

The champion, born in the Virgin Islands but now a resident of New York, landed the heavier punches and even out-jabbed the Texan who flicked and ran all night long.
