NHL Governors Change Ruling

Hockey action in the National Hockey league gets under way in earnest this evening as the defending league champions Montreal Canadiens host the All Stars. Quite fortunately for various members of the "dream team", the NHL board of governors passed a resolution yesterday which allows any player nominated to the squad but not yet having signed a contract to play in this annual rivalry.

This action, however simple it may seem makes a great difference in the strength of the all star lineup. The Golden Hawks, Bobby Hull, has still a rather inflated view of his value to the Hawks and his teammate Stan Mikita is wisely waiting until Hull signs until he comes to terms. It's as one sage Toronto employee stated, "Any player who signs before Hull isn't a very good businessman. Imagine how many of us guys we're at least half as valuable to our clubs". A very wise point indeed.

In previous years Hull and Mikita would not be playing, and their absence would create some hard feelings among hockey fans from coast to coast, as well as noticeably weakening the teams strength. Another notable exception would have been Bobby Bau of the Leafs, but he too was saved the ignominy of sitting out this prestige filled match by the ruling.

This is probably one of the most obvious moves that the NHL board of governors has made to keep face with hockey fans but the opinion is here that it was a good one. The ruling allows both the average Mr. Fan and hockey players to obtain the utmost in pleasure from the contest and it saves off all feelings on both sides. Incidentally Montreal should win the game handsly as they will the league this year.

The Montreal Canadiens placed three members of the team on the All Stars but Hodge, Provost and Laperriere all will be donning the Red, White and Blue for this evening's encounter. Then too the Billy Reay coached all stars are minus the services of Carl Brewer who announced his retirement from the game Tuesday.

WILL TAKE THE WORKS

Canadiens just have too many horses for the rest of the teams in the league. In the training camp stage they have had the very agreeable problem of too many good players for the roster to be remembered that they took the marbles last year without their two star players, Gilles Tremblay and Jacques Laperriere. Tremblay broke an ankle midway through the season just as he appeared to be on the way to his best season ever and he is back in harness for the 'Habs' again this season as is big Jacques. Montreal has a youthful team with the average age about 25 and in my opinion they will skate most of the other squads in the loop into the ice as they have done in previous years. With one of the best defenses in the NHL and a potent scoring attack, the Habs will not be too hard pressed.

Second place in my books will go to the Detroit Red Wings, led by Crozier, Howe and Delvecchio. This is a great team when the pressure is on and they were the only team in the league last season to consistently beat the Montrealers. However if Crozier should have a mediocre season the tribe should end up in second spot.

It's a strange thing about these Black Hawks. With three of the real super stars in the league, Hull, Hall and Mikita one would think that the club would put up a better showing than it has over the past few years. However it could be that this is the perfect case of too many cooks spoiling the soup. Dissention is evident to most observers but if the management could ever clear up this problem then the Hawks could be quite a team. However they have proved themselves on non championship calibre in the past and there is no reason to look for them to take the Cup this season.

REAL DOGFIGHT

The real fight should prove to be for the fourth and final playoff position and I am not going to make any prediction on this except to say that the Bruins will not be sharing any of the playoff money.

New York has proven itself to be the hottest team in the pre-season grind but this doesn't mean anything in most peoples books. The same thing goes on in baseball's Grapefruit league when the Washington Redskins or some such team come up with an impressive streak and then gets walked over in regular league play. The Rangers have always played well against the Leafs but this seems to be the only club in the loop that they can defeat consistently.

The Leafs on the other hand have had their share of problems but the old master, Punch Imlach has always seemed to make things come out in his policy so far this year he has gone with experience but his policy so far this year has been to shape up or ship out. Example, Eddie Shack. Shack has still not signed but even so the Toronto squad will still have one of, if not the best defense in the NHL. If Imlach can get a scoring attack to jell then look for the Leafs in the playoffs. He has some youth in Ellis and Selby but not enough to carry the once powerful club to the world championship.

NHL Board Of Governors Approves Two New Sites

By AL McNEIL MONTREAL (CP)—The board of governors of the National Hockey League has approved San Francisco-Oakland and Vancouver as two locations for the league's new division, which may be inaugurated in the 1967-68 season.

Both cities chosen have applications from two separate groups and Clarence Campbell, NHL president, said Tuesday following a meeting of the governors that "in each city rests the potential for a real good partnership."

"We hope in both cases the groups will work together and establishment of a franchise can be made."

The approval of the two locations hinges on proper facilities, Campbell said. The San Francisco - Oakland approval was based on use of the new Oakland Alameda arena, scheduled for completion early in 1967, and the Vancouver approval assumed immediate construction of a proposed new arena in the Pacific National Exhibition grounds.

Los Angeles and St. Louis were previously selected to join an expanded league. Tuesday's choice brings to four the new locations chosen.

In the case of Vancouver, Campbell said the Canucks of the WHL headed by Cy McLean and a second group led by Frank McMahon of West Coast Transmission are the two bidders. The San Francisco bidders are the current owners of the Seals and a group headed by Barry Van Gerbig.

Campbell said the governors will convene again in February to discuss the situation further. He dismissed as pure speculation any attempt to set a firm date for the second division to get under way, but the 1967-68 season is generally accepted as most likely.

POSTED SUM Each bidder for a new franchise was required to put up \$10,000 in "good faith" on a non-refundable basis.

A sum of \$2,000,000 to cover the cost of purchase of 20 players is required from each applicant. Four cities are in serious contention for the remaining two second-division teams — Baltimore, Minneapolis, St. Paul, Philadelphia and Pittsburgh.

All these except Philadelphia needed substantial modifications of existing rink facilities. An entirely new rink was needed at Philadelphia.

Campbell said it is not likely any other applications will show up and that the NHL picked the cities on their own survey.

He said the Oakland Alameda arena belongs to seven counties and has a 19,000-plus seating capacity. Los Angeles has a 18,900-and-up seating arrangement.

The NHL president said the league is "making as good progress as can be expected" and is counting 100 per cent on box office appeal. He said there is no expectation of national U.S. television coverage.

"I am completely satisfied that a second division is the answer," Campbell said.

The league will run an interlocking 74-game schedule with each team meeting other teams in the same division 10 times, five at home and five away, and teams in the other division four times each, including two at home.

In other business, the governors ruled that all players named to play in the annual all-star game will appear whether or not they have signed their contracts.

"The basic consideration in this decision is that we are hurting our own image by having the game's top stars missing the all-star game," Campbell said.

He also said that Fred Corcoran, hired a year ago to build hockey in the United States, has been given another one-year contract.

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Unsigned Players To Go In Today's All Star Game

MONTREAL (CP) — Whether he comes to contract terms with Chicago Black Hawks or not, centre Stan Mikita probably will be absent from the spot reserved for him on the National Hockey League All-Star team.

The All-Stars are scheduled to take on Montreal Canadiens tonight in the Stanley Cup champions' home rink, the Forum.

Mikita is last season's NHL scoring leader, as a Chicago player he has the company of All-Star left-winger Bobby Hull.

Hull said he expects no difficulty in coming to terms with the Hawks. He said only final details remain to be ironed out.

Tommy Ivan, Chicago general manager, said Tuesday Mikita is still hampered by a groin injury he suffered in an exhibition game against Canadiens Saturday night.

"By the look of the injury, he might not even get into the opener against Toronto Saturday," Ivan said.

The Hawks open their regular season against the Maple Leafs there.

The Chicago general manager said contract negotiations with Hull are continuing and that Hull is scheduled to meet with Chicago management later in the day.

He'll be able to play tonight whether he signs a contract or not. The NHL board of governors announces Tuesday at its semi-annual meeting here that all players, signed or unsigned, will be able to play in the All-Star game.

Previously, unsigned players could not take part.

The All-Stars are coached this year by Chicago's Billy Reay, who earned the right because his club gained a berth in the Stanley Cup final series last spring.

The Hawks lost to Canadiens in the seven-game series. Canadian coach Toe Blake will go with almost the same lineup that won the cup.

Three Canadiens — defenceman Jacques Laperriere, right-winger Claude Provost and forward Charlie Hodge — will line up with their own club, although the three were selected as All-Stars.

Blake has won six Stanley Cups as coach with Canadiens. Of the 20 players Blake is expected to use, 10 have had previous All-Star experience.

Reay will have three rookie competitors on his squad. They are last season's rookie award winner, goalie Roger Crozier of Detroit Red Wings; defenceman Ted Green of Boston Bruins and Vic Hadfield, a left-winger with New York Rangers.

Ottawa Roughies Trim B.C. Lions

OTTAWA (CP)—Quarterback Russ Jackson threw three touchdowns passes to lead Ottawa Rough Riders to a 35-14 win over British Columbia Lions in an interlocking Canadian Football League game here Tuesday night.

The victory was the first in four starts for Riders and kept alive their slim hope of finishing first in the eastern conference.

Riders now trail the league-leading Hamilton Tiger-Cats by two points. Each club has two games remaining to play.

Lions remain locked in a third-place tie with Saskatchewan in the western conference standings.

Jackson, the big four's leading passer, threw his scoring passes to Ron Stewart, Ted Watkins and Whit Tucker.
