It is a pleasure and a great privilege to welcome you to this 38th annual meeting of the Provincial Auxiliary of the Prince Edward Island Protestant Orphanage. As we are due in Charlottetown quite early this afternoon my remarks will be brief.

"Our Auxiliary has again completed a very successful year. The total net receipts were \$14,216.81, while many boxes of clothing and gifts of all kinds were sent in to the Home.

"As many of you cannot attend the Annual Meeting of the Orphanage I will speak very briefly

on a few features of the work. The Orphanage had its humble beginning in 1902. The purpose of the Founders was to provide a real "Home" love and care for our needy Children and to teach and train them in Christian surroundings. This your Trustees have always endeavored to do, at all times striving to deserve the confidence of our people.

"Today, with the Home really lovely, with the Children healthy and happy, we realize more and more how important this work is, realize too that the Workers of the days gone by did not labor in vain.

"We are happy to announce that the past year was exceptionally successful in every department of the work.

"The sympathy for orphaned and neglected Children has not diminished and we are blessed with the service and devotion of a great number of people. This has enabled us for the 30th consecutive year to close our books with a small surplus.

"The total Maintenance Receipts reached an all-time high \$26,827.54, only an outstanding amount. The Endowment Fund is increasing rapidly and the grand total-Bonds and Estates-is now \$200,144.82.

This rapid increase indicates our people are fully aware of the value of, and have confidence in, the work of the Orphanage. Once again I emphasize that without the interest from the Endowment Fund the Orphanage could not carry on successfully at the present time and certainly this large Fund is the safe-guard of the future.

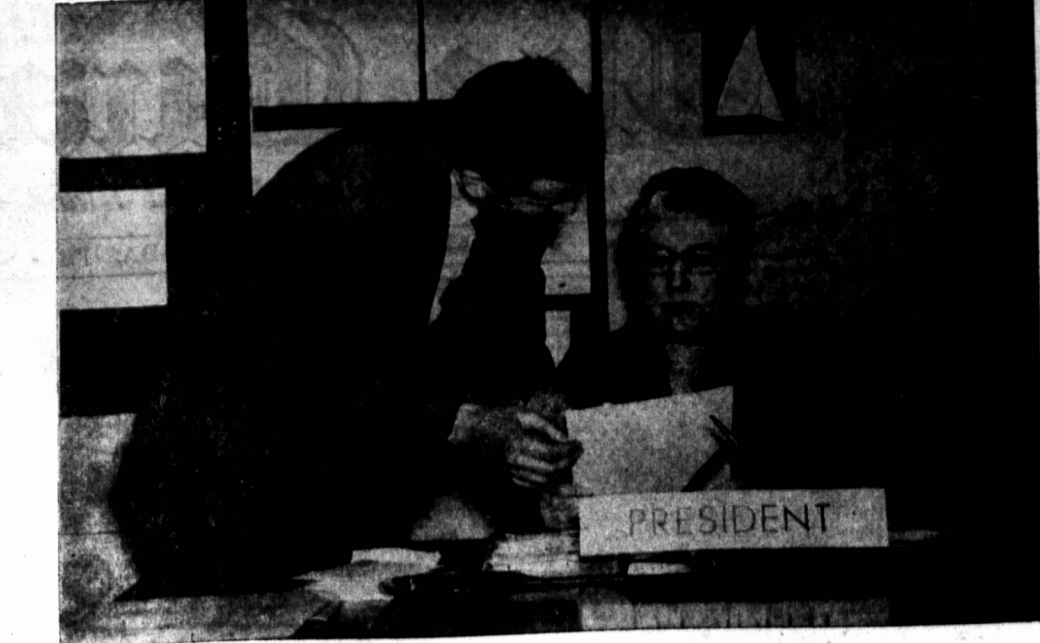
