

Yankees Defeat Tigers Baltimore Beats Chicago

New York Yankees, finally come alive, swept Detroit for their seventh consecutive victory, 3-1, Thursday to set up a four-game showdown for first place this weekend with Chicago White Sox, whose American League lead was trimmed to 1 1/2 games by a 4-1 defeat at Baltimore.

The National League lead changed hands—temporarily any way—as Milwaukee Braves lost to New York Giants 4-3 in 12 innings. That put the Braves, who have lost four of their last five, three percentage points behind St. Louis Cardinals, who had a night game with Pittsburgh.

A Cardinal defeat would put Milwaukee back in first place, by a half game and seen percentage points.

Brooklyn was at Cincinnati in another night game. Philadelphia pulled past Cincinnati into a temporary third place tie with the Braves, 1 1/2 games behind, by defeating Chicago's Cubs 7-2 in the only other day game.

TWO IN A ROW, games, Boston made it two in a row over Cleveland, 9-7, and Washington cut its losing string at four games with a 9-4 job on Kansas City.

The second place Yankees, who have won nine of their last 11, gain 4 1/2 games on the White Sox, swept the third place set from the Tigers as Bill Skowron doubled and Gil McDougald singled for the deciding run off loser Frank Lary in the sixth inning.

Bob Turley won his third with a six-hitter, striking out eight and walking only one for his first com-

plete game against a first division club since September, 1955. It was his first complete game against Detroit in seven starts since Aug. 7, 1955.

Unpredictable Billy Loes, once Brooklyn's protom righthander, seven-hit the White Sox while the Orioles scored two in the first two in the second off rookie Bill Fischer. Singles by Bob Boyd, Al Pilarcik and Jim Busby counted for the first-inning runs.

A triple by Gail Harris and a sacrifice fly by Johnny Abtonelli off reliever Taylor Phillips did it for the sixth-place Giants, who have won seven of their last nine. Antonelli, winning his fourth in relief, Danny O'Connell and Bobby Thomson—all ex-Braves—each drove in a run while Milwaukee cut-hit New York 15-12 but left 14 runners stranded.

Gran Hamner smacked a bases-loaded triple in a four-run sixth inning that led it for the Phils. Southpaw Harvey Haddix, who drove in two runs, won his fifth, striking out seven and walking but one in a seven-hitter. Ernie Banks hit his 13th home run, his third in two days, for the Cubs.

Billy Klaus, Jackie Jensen and Sammy White each drove in two runs in two games in two days, with relief help, gained his sixth victory in seven lifetime decisions against the Indians. Sieler, returning from a two-week bout with the gripe, now is 5-3 for the season. Early Wynn lost his eighth.

The Senators came from behind the fifth in the seventh, with Art Schult hitting a two-run pinch

double and Pete Runnels lining a single for two. Pete Ramos won his fifth, with relief help, after falling behind 4-3 on loser Matur McDermott's home run—the 18th of Ramos in the last 49 innings. The young righthander leads the majors with 23 gopher balls.

ST. LOUIS (AP)—The crushing St. Louis Cardinals moved a half game in front in the fast-shuffling National League race Thursday night with a 7-4 victory over Pittsburgh Pirates behind 40-year-old Urry Dickson.
The Redbirds, winners of 26 of their last 28 games, had replaced Milwaukee as the leader by three Braves were beaten Thursday by New York Giants. Now they're 19 percentage points ahead.

St. Louis hasn't been in first place this late in the season since 1950.

CINCINNATI (AP)—For the second straight time, Cincinnati Redlegs Thursday night used one explosive home run inning for enough runs to defeat Brooklyn Dodgers 6-1. The five-run fourth inning was marked by a homer by Wally Post with the bases loaded.

Gus Bell also got a homer for the Reds in that frame.
The victory served to boost the Reds past both Philadelphia and Washington into third place in the National League. It also gave them an even split in the four-game series here with the Dodgers.

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
