A New Effort for a South American Union.

The South American republics are reported to be making a new effort to form a customs union, or, to speak more accurately, a confederation of States. The objects of a Congress which has been called together are thus set forth in the programme:—

- 1. To formulate a common law for Spanish America.
2. To fix the manner of deciding questions arising from conflict of law in the different States.
3. To place the citizens of the several States on the footing of native citizens.
4. To establish a uniform extradition system and postal convention.
5. To establish a uniform system of coinage, weights and measures.
6. To assimilate the laws of patents, contracts and bankruptcy.
7. To agree upon a uniform system of commercial legislation.

Some day we shall perhaps see established a general customs union of all the republics on the two continents of North and South America. Such an object is worthy of the best efforts of statesmen in all the American republics. Here is little doubt that it would secure the industrial and commercial development of the South and Central American States, which, with abundant natural wealth, have failed to make the advance which this and their position entitle them to, and it would insure a future of great and secure prosperity to their people and their own.

Political Meeting at Little York.

Pursuant to notice, a meeting was held at Little York on the 21st ult., for the purpose of nominating a fit and proper person to represent the Second Electoral District of Queen's County in the Legislative Council. Peter Stewart, Esq., being called to the chair, and the undersigned appointed Secretary, Robert Lawson, Esq., who contended that all candidates on the Island should be pledged to carry out the reforms which the people require, moved, and Donald Ferguson, Esq., seconded, that Lauchlin McMillan, Esq., Covehead, be the candidate of the people's party, to represent their views and guard their interests.

After the highest compliments were paid Mr. McMillan by these gentlemen, as to his ability and honesty, remarks were also made by Messrs. George Vessey, Donald Montgomery, M. P. P., and others, showing the necessity for the abolition of the Legislative Council and other retrenchments.

The question of nomination being put, the motion was carried unanimously in favor of Mr. McMillan.
