TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

UNITED STATES.

El Paso, Oct. 9. Passengers via the Southern Pacific Railroad report that, on Thursday night, when the train was passing Wilcox, Arizona, a fight was in progress between the citizens and Indians. The bodies of five line repairers were seen near the track, shot through the head. This is the second party of telegraph men murdered in the last few days.

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

LONDON, Oct. 9. Parnell delivered an address at Wexford to-day. Alluding to Gladstone, he said many of them had studied the words of the great man and great orator who until recently had desired to impress the world with a good opinion of his philanthropy and hatred of oppression, but who stood to-day the greatest coercer and most untrivalled slanderer of the Irish nation. Parnell characterized Gladstone's speeches as unscrupulous and dishonest. He (Gladstone) had maligning the Irish people, Bishops and Dillon. No misrepresentation was too low or too mean for him to stoop to.

LONDON, Oct. 9.

Archbishop Croke, in replying to an address from a branch of the Land League, said the Land Act far surpassed, in breadth and variety, and in the value of its provisions, any Land Act ever passed by Parliament. He advised the enormous assembly present to give the Act a fair trial.

LONDON, Oct. 9. A fire occurred last evening at Bristol in Messrs. Jeffries large printing and stationery store, which, with adjoining buildings, were burned down. The damage is estimated at £20,000.

EUROPEAN.

WARSAW, Oct. 8. Active preparations are making here for the coming interview between the Emperor of Austria and the Czar. A great sensation has been caused in Hungary by the news of the projected interview. The secret has leaked out that the meeting is connected with the violent suppression of the Eastern question by the arbitrary annexation of European Turkey to Austria and Russia, with the promise of neutrality to Germany in the event of war next spring with France. Constantinople is to become a free city.

TUNIS, Oct. 9. One hundred and fifty French *gend d'armes* have arrived to preserve the public security here.

It is rumored that a new treaty between the Bey and France will be concluded.

PARIS, Oct. 9. France has been asked to join England to take measures to protect their subjects in Egypt. France has consented. England and France will forthwith dispatch iron clads to Alexandria.

MADRID, Oct. 9. At Caeceres, on Saturday, the Kings of Spain and Portugal were present at the bull fight. At the banquet in the evening King Alfonso proposed as a toast "The health of King Luis, and the fraternity of the two countries and prosperity of Portugal." King Luis acknowledged the honors with similar cordial sentiments.

General Prendergast has been appointed Governor of Cuba in place of Gen. Blanco. He will start for Cuba on the 23th.

BERLIN, Oct. 8. Twenty pupils of the Constantine Military School have been arrested. Many Nihilist proclamations were found on them. The Russian authorities, in view of this fact, are adopting the severest measures. Markets and fairs are prohibited wherever there is the least suspicion that Nihilists intend to use them for their own purposes.

MEXICO.

CITY OF MEXICO, Oct. 6. The remains of ex-President Artista have arrived from Portugal and are lying in state in the School of Mines. They are being visited by immense throngs of people. Congress has ordered three days of national mourning.
