Perhaps the finest Scottish concert ever to be presented to a Charlottetown audience was heard last night at Prince of Wales College where a capacity house gathered to honour the Scottish Bard, Bobbie Burns. Mr. Walter R. Shaw who acted as master of ceremonies contributed greatly to the program by a series of snappy observations gathered from a seemingly endless repertoire of jokes, mostly in the Gaelic vein. The Burns Concert was under the sponsorship of the Zion Church Men's Association and was attended by His Honour, Lieutenant Governor Prowse and Mrs. Prowse; acting Premier Douglass MacKinnon and Mrs. MacKinnon and Deputy Mayor A. Walton Gaudet.

**LASSIES STEAL SHOW** Every number was deserving of the highest praise but it was perhaps two little five year old lassies who stole the hearts of the audience. Marlene Matheson drew tremendous applause for her rendition of "Roamin' in the Gloamin'" as did Elizabeth Kennedy who danced the Highland Fling in a manner well becoming a veteran of the stage.

The total receipts for maintenance reached an all time high of \$26,627.54. Due to necessary repairs and replacements, as well as the large number of children in the "Home", expenses were very heavy but, once again, there was a small surplus when all accounts were settled.

Before presenting her report Mrs. Henderson expressed gratitude to the ever-generous people of our Province, to the many out-standing workers who gave so freely of their time and to the Clergy, the Editors and C.F.C.Y.

Mr. W.A. Stewart, chairman of the Board thanked Mrs. Henderson for her excellent report. He stated that the Board was indeed fortunate in having some one as capable as Mrs. Henderson willing to accept responsibility for organizing our Provincial campaign from year to year carrying on the task with undiminished success.

## Seasonal Unemployment Figures At High Level

The Charlottetown National Employment Office reports that the figures for seasonal unemployment climbed to a new high since January 1st. Approximately 3000 people are now unemployed in Kings and Queens Counties, which is the area under the administration of the Local Employment Office.

Officials of the office attribute the mounting total to the unusually severe winter weather, which prevailed for almost three weeks, and which brought heavy snow storms and the long spell of below zero weather.

In mid-month, the office commenced its annual campaign against seasonal unemployment, at a time when the weather was seriously hindering the daily routine of business throughout the Province. Under normal conditions the campaign would be showing some evidence to success, and the re-employment of some of the many unemployed. But the handicaps imposed by one of the most severe winters in recent years, took the edge of the appeal to citizens, and it may be several weeks before any significant results are obtained.

**IN CHARLOTTETOWN** In Charlottetown alone, at the present time, approximately 900 men and women are seasonally unemployed, and any hope of securing work for a fraction of this number, will depend on a continuation of the more moderate weather which now prevails. Most of the unemployed are eligible for Unemployment Insurance Benefits but the money paid out to claimants only makes up in part the heavy loss in wages which seasonal unemployment brings about.

The Local Office will continue its campaign in the weeks ahead, and it's efforts are being staunchly supported by business people, who are planning to bring the campaign to the attention of the various service club meetings such as the Rotary, Kinsmen, Lions, Gyros.
