In their first contest, the Hawks eked out a 2-1 victory over the fast improving Islanders. The local boys in their last appearance here made a big impression with fans as they thumped the high-flying Ramblers 5-2.

Saints And Welshmen Start Series With Scoreless Draw

The Saints and the Welshmen yesterday opened the 1954 junior intercollegiate rugby series as they battled to a scoreless draw at Memorial Field. It was the fourth straight tie that these teams have played in series competition. Last year in the final game of a scheduled three-game series, which went six games without a winner being declared, they were also scoreless.

Winnipeg Team Continues To Win In Hoop Series

RIO DE JANEIRO (CP)—A last-second free throw by Ralph Watts climaxed an uphill surge Thursday night and gave Winnipeg Canadians a 67-66 victory over Uruguay in the second game of the round-robin world basketball championship finals.

The victory, Winnipeg's second in as many starts in the eight-team tournament, was a blow to the powerful Uruguayans who had led 35-29 at half time by displaying a solid defence interspersed by deadly breakaway attacks.

Canada switched to an effective man-to-man defence in the second half and wore down the lead. With three minutes left, they tied the score and the teams matched points steadily.

The Canadians, who defeated Israel 50-43 in their opening game Wednesday, still must face Brazil and the United States, the tournament's co-favorites. Uruguay, also highly favored, suffered virtual elimination after an opening night loss to France.

English Horses Arrive In The U.S.

LAUREL, Md. (AP)—Landau was the centre of interest anyway, since he belongs to Queen Elizabeth II. But the English thoroughbred put on extra show Thursday by balking at being unloaded from the airplane which brought him for next Wednesday's International race.

The three-year-old caused concern by acting up from fright. By contrast, two travelling companions, King of the Tudors, also from England, and Northern Gleam, from Ireland, clomped quietly down a ramp into a truck.

Only King Ranch's High Gun now is missing from the scene of the mile-and-a-half turf race. High Gun, one of the two U. S. entries, still is at Belmont, N. Y.

The three trans-Atlantic arrivals joined two from France, Normar and Banassa, who had been flown over Monday. Stanley Mickel, Brush Burn, the other U. S. horse, has been at Laurel some time.

The seven horses will race for a first prize of \$50,000.

The air trip started in London Wednesday at noon, EST and ended 22½ hours later after stops at Shannon, Ireland, and in New Brunswick.

A.L. Rejects Sale Of Athletics Team
 NEW YORK, (AP)—The American League Thursday turned down the bid of an eight-man Philadelphia syndicate to buy the Athletics and keep the club there.

The owners adjourned their meeting for one week to allow the Mack family to make a new deal in an attempt to sell the club.

There was no immediate clarification whether the turnaround of the syndicate was to be regarded as definitely eliminating Philadelphia as a site or strictly a refusal to accept the individual members of the combine.
