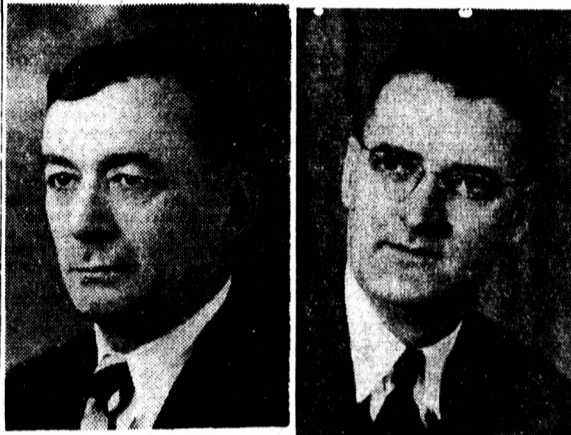

John Priestler was 24 and J.P. was 20.

SYDNEY, N.S., April 18 (CP)—J. M. Brown, 45-year-old commercial traveller from Armdale, a suburb of Halifax, was found dead in his bed in a hotel here early today. Acquaintances said he appeared in good health last night; but he apparently died in his sleep.

HALIFAX, April 18 (CP)—A hastily-assembled search fleet of ships and planes criss-crossed the Atlantic off southwestern Nova Scotia today without finding a trace of seven airmen missing after their planes crashed last night.

Refugees Flee Yugoslavia

GRAZ, Austria, April 18 (CP)—Police said six persons, including two Canadian citizens, all claiming to be anti-Tito, forced a plane flying within Yugoslavia into Austria today and landed at Graz.

Prisoner Talks Reopen

MUNSAN, Korea, April 19 (Saturday)—(AP)—Allied and Communist negotiators today reopen secret prisoner-of-war discussions that may settle one of the three major issues still blocking a Korean armistice.

More Arrests Said Pending At Petawawa

PEMBROKE, Ont., April 18 (CP)—The camp Petawawa case brought four civilians and an army captain to court today on charges of theft, fraud and conspiracy. More arrests were reported in the office.
