Contract Bridge

A COMPARISON OF SKILL

Two declarers at the same contract in a team-of-four match, exhibited quite different degrees of skill on this board:

West dealer.			
North-South vulnerable			
♠	4 4 3	♣	Q J 5

Table 1 bidding:
West North East South

West opened the club king. South ruffed, laid down the trump ace, then led a second trump. East seized the opportunity to discard the deuce of diamonds, and West, in with the trump king, had no problem—he quickly shifted to the ten of hearts. Before South could regain the lead he had lost three heart tricks, and his contract.

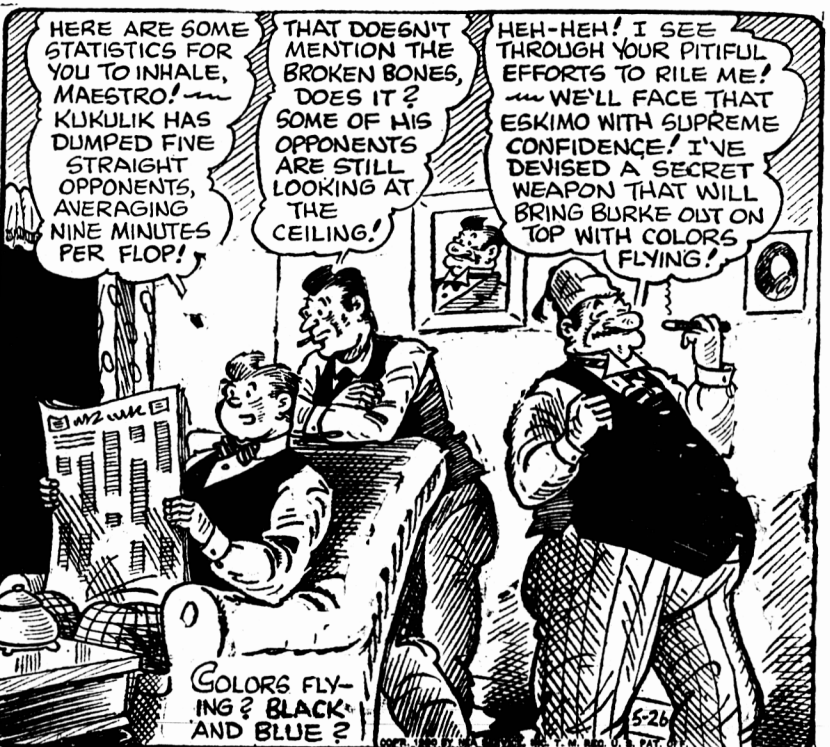

Here also, West led the king of clubs and South ruffed. At the second trick, however, South gave West a very unpleasant problem—South led a low trump! With all the cards exposed, it is easy to say that West should have put up the king and made the same shift to hearts—but West was not in such an enviable position! From his point of view, it was quite possible that South had bid three spades on the ten, with the ace of hearts and diamond strength, instead of the ace of his own suit. Remember, at this table West did not have the opportunity to see his partner's signal with a low diamond or to discover definitely which ace East held!

At any rate, after fruitless thought, West played low on the trump lead, and after that South was safe. East could not make a dangerous attack in hearts, and South, after capturing West's trump king, could discard a heart on dummy's fourth diamond.

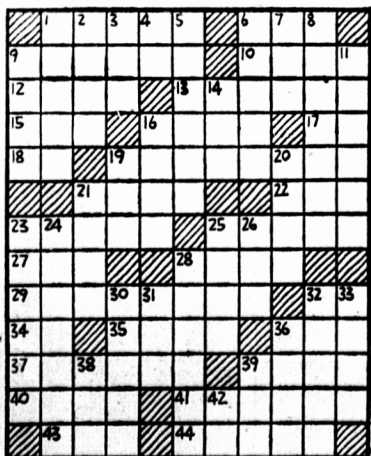

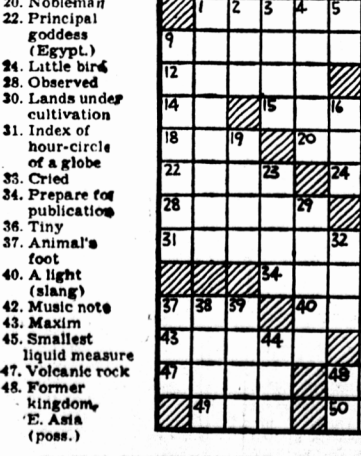
