RASPBERRIES.
 (Experimental Farms Note.)
 At this season of the year continuous cultivation of the raspberry plantation should be practised, at least, up until the time the ripe fruit is hanging on the canes. During this season of the year some attention will need to be paid to insect control, occasionally the raspberry sawfly will cause considerable damage to the foliage an aphid noticed can be controlled by the use of arsenical sprays, such as arsenate of lead or arsenate of lime, used at the rate of two pounds of the powdered form to forty gallons of water, and sprayed on the bushes. A course of thorough sprayings will generally suffice to control this pest.

Every year there are numerous requests from growers asking why the tips of their young canes are wilting. Upon close examination it will be seen that the cane has been girdled at the point where it has commenced to wilt. This is the work of the raspberry cane borer and when this wilting is first noticeable is the time to institute control. Cut well below the wilted portion and destroy the cut portion. If these are not removed the young larvae hatching from the eggs laid in the girdle, will work down the cane and practically destroy it.

POP CORN FOR HOME USE
 A few rows of pop corn might well be planted in the farm garden for home use. A plot two rows square will be large enough to produce a good supply for one family. If more is grown than is wanted for home use, the surplus usually can be disposed of at a profit. It is for one's own family use, however, that pop corn should be grown primarily. It gives the children a direct interest in farm life and affords pleasant recreation for the long winter evenings. Pop corn has considerable value also as a food, and when properly prepared for the table it is superior to many of the breakfast foods now on the market.
 Almost any variety of pop corn will give satisfactory results if handled properly and by the careful selection of seed the chosen variety can be greatly improved. Pop corn can be planted earlier than sweet corn, and it should be planted as early as possible, so that it will have a long season in which to grow and mature. If there is a choice of location, select a place that is warm and well drained. The soil should be plowed or spaded to a depth of 18 inches or more and the plot thoroughly pulverized before planting. The rows should be about three feet apart. In nurseries two or three inches deep drop the kernels eight or 10 inches apart and cover it first only about one inch. Plant while the soil is moist in the furrow. If only a small quantity is planted it is better to plant a number of short rows than only one or two long ones, as better pollination of the silks will be obtained and better filled ears will be produced. If seed is to be saved for use the following year, do not plant too near field corn or sweet corn, as pop corn rapidly mixes with these and thereby becomes unsuitable for use as seed. Grass and weeds should be kept
