

Former Champ R. Turpin Found Murdered In Home

LEAMINGTON, England (Reuters)—Randy Turpin, who caused a boxing sensation when he won the world middleweight boxing championship from Sugar Ray Robinson 15 years ago, was found dead from a gunshot wound at his home here Tuesday.

His 17-month-old daughter Carmen was found seriously wounded.

She was reported to have gunshot wounds above one eye and in the chest. The girl taken from a hospital in this small Warwickshire town to another hospital in Birmingham, 20 miles away.

The incident took place in Turpin's Roadside Snack Bar, a cafe used by truck drivers and workmen.

The Turpin cafe stands between two empty houses in an area due for demolition.

The Briton dethroned Robinson

son in 15 rounds in London, July 10, 1951.

Robinson regained the title 64 days later in New York when he rallied from the brink of defeat to stop Turpin in the 10th round. The American was bleeding from deep cuts over his eyes when he unleashed a furious barrage of punches to halt the Briton.

Turpin retired from the ring in October, 1958, after he had been knocked out in the second round by Yolande Pompy.

Turpin, who won more than \$500,000 in the ring, was declared financially bankrupt in June, 1962.

In recent years, Turpin has been helping his wife run the snack bar. The couple had three daughters, Charmaine, 4, Annette, 9, and Gwen, 11.

Supreme Court Postpones Move

MILWAUKEE (AP)—The court order directing the National League to guarantee Milwaukee an expansion team next year or return the Braves from Atlanta was stayed Tuesday pending an appeal to the Wisconsin Supreme Court.

Circuit Judge Elmer V. Roller, who found that baseball violated Wisconsin's antitrust law by stripping Milwaukee of its only major league franchise, stayed the order which had set Wednesday as the deadline for the Braves' return, but he rejected a motion for a new trial.

He ordered the defendant senior circuit and its members to post a \$100,000 surety bond to cover interim costs if the state Supreme Court upholds his decision against baseball.

Ray T. McCann, an attorney representing the Braves, said the appeal would be filed as soon as possible, probably within a few days. The High Court already has set June 9 for oral arguments and has directed both sides to file written briefs.

Earl Jinkinson, one of baseball's attorneys, presented the motion for a new trial, citing 36 separate grounds, including all rulings by Judge Roller that were adverse to the defense.

DENIES JURISDICTION

Baseball is an interstate business and at this time all of baseball is outside the jurisdiction of this court," he said.

Jinkinson leveled sharp criticism at what he called "that kooky, nutty idea of the attorney general and his staff that baseball when played in Milwaukee does not violate the antitrust laws but when played outside Wisconsin it does."

McCann told Judge Roller that the acts which the state claimed constituted an unlawful abuse of baseball's monopoly—the National League's vote approving the Braves transfer and the denial of an application for a Milwaukee expansion club—occurred outside the state of Wisconsin.

But special state counsel Willard Stafford replied that "the place of impact of these acts is the significant legal point."

Judge Roller said that he intended to prepare a short memorandum on his denial of the retrial motion.

The way was cleared Monday for an early review of the case when justices of the state Supreme Court agreed to place it on the June calendar. Judge Roller had initially turned down a plea for a stay because the appeal would not normally have been heard until September. He agreed to reconsider the ruling when the date was advanced.

San Francisco Poses Threat

To resume the survey of major league baseball teams that was started in this column several days ago proves to be a difficult task because after the Los Angeles Dodgers come at least six more teams capable of winning the pennant: Atlanta, Cincinnati, Houston, Philadelphia, Pittsburgh and San Francisco in alphabetical order.

However there have been numerous fans asking about the Giants and "Wonderous Willie" and seeing as how they are currently on top of the National loop it might be a good idea to have a look at their chances. The pennant chances of any team revolve around a lot of "ifs" and the Giants have more perhaps than any other contender.

The big problem facing the Giants at the beginning of the season centered around their pitching staff, but so far they seem to have resolved most of them. Juan Marchal was a question mark in that observers were worried about his ability to throw off the psychological shock of his bat attack at John Roseboro but he has not shown any signs, this season anyway of slackening off. So far he has a 7-0 record and still is going strong.

Bobby Bolin, Bob Shaw and Gaylord Perry were the other three regular starters as the season opened but the Giants were taking no chances on lacking on pitching strength. They traded off their big hitter for Orlando Cepeda in a trade that returned most casual ball fans but no one in the know. The Giants had been rumored to have been trying to trade Cepeda all winter. This trade reinforced a Giant sore spot, that of left handed pitchers, where they have been weak in the past. They also picked up veterans Andy McDaniel and Joe Gibbons while rookie Mike Davison and Ron Herbel also figure to be pitching factors.

The Giants perhaps do not have the pitching staff that the Dodgers boast but then who does? However they are strong and pose a big threat to win the pennant.

SOUND IN INFIELD

Big Willie McCovey, who took Cepeda's spot at first last year and then proceeded to hit 39 homers in the first base-man and he is joined by Hal Lanier on second. Lanier is noted as being one of the best defensive infielders in the loop but hit only 22 last year and is not a good runner.

Veteran Dick Schofield managed to beat off a bid for the shortstop position by young Tito Fuentes, but the former has since been traded to the Yanks. Jim Hart is the slugger owner of the "hot corner" spot and he can be spelled by Jim Davenport, the jack of all trades for the RF club.

As far as fielding goes the Giants have more than adequate personnel. Willie Mays, greatest star in the game today patrolling in center field but he is one of the question marks. What if his health fails as it has been doing on and off for the past few seasons? Jesus Alou who enters his fourth year as the regular rightfielder hit a sound .289 last year and he has a strong replacement in the person of Len Gabrielson who is a southpaw hitter who comes up with the big hits. Jim Davenport plays in left.

The Giants are knee deep in good catchers, boasting Dick Bertell, Bill Haller, Bob Barton and Jack Hlat.

The only question remaining is whether the Giants can keep their poise under the great September pressure and it must be remembered that they blew the pennant last season when they all but had it wrapped up in the final month of play. In this observers opinion the Giants are a very strong contender but they will not end up on top of the loop.

Dave Boswell, provincial director of Physical Education and president of the Islanders Track and Field Club disclosed yesterday that two members of the Islanders Track and Field Club have been selected to attend a Royal Canadian Legion sponsored National Training camp for young athletes. The two selected: Andy Arsenault, Charlottetown and Adele Marshbank of Athena Regional High School have been picked to attend, on the basis of their performances for the Islander Track and Field Club.

The training camp will be held at the University of Alberta in Edmonton, Alberta beginning June 26 and ending July 2nd. It is interesting to note that these two athletes have been selected on the basis of their performances with no regard to geographic locations. Manitoba and Saskatchewan, hot beds for track talent, placed three and four members respectively to attend this camp, while Nova Scotia placed two, and New Brunswick one. Newfoundland didn't place any at the camp.

David Boswell, as president of the Islanders Track club is certainly proud of these two athletes, for he, himself, was quite a track star.

Boswell, a graduate of Dalhousie University, Halifax, was the only four-letter man in the history of the University. He was intercollegiate finalist in his weight class in boxing in 1949, and on many occasions won the 440 and 800 yard events in the Maritime Track and Field Championships. He also played intercollegiate football and hockey.

In 1951 he won the 440 and 800 yard events for the Abbies in a Maritime track meet staged at Memorial Field. Mr. Boswell was director of physical education at Crescent School, Toronto, in 1952-53, at Stanstead College, Quebec, from 1953 until 1957, and at Ashbury College, Ottawa, from 1957 until 1960. He was appointed provincial director of physical education for Prince Edward Island in 1960.

Yes, Dave Boswell is certainly proud of his athletes.

Seagren Sets World Record

FRESNO, Calif. (AP)—Bob Seagren sailed over the bar with distance to spare at 17 feet-5 1/2 inches in the West Coast Re-lays recently, to add to the world's outdoor pole vault record to his indoor mark.

After clearing a height one-half inch above 17 feet and already the vent champion, Seagren, 19, asked that the bar be raised well above the 17-foot four-inch record set by Fred Hansen of Rice in the United States-Russia meet of 1964.

Seagren missed twice and a majority of the 13,000 fans in Pacific Stadium had gone home when the 17-year-old youngster tried a third and final time. He cleared the bar with at least two inches to spare.

Seagren attends Glendale College, a two-year institution, and plans to enter the University of Southern California next fall.

Field Set For Preakness; Nine Starters Expected

BALTIMORE, Md. (AP)—The field for the 91st running of the \$150,000-added Preakness Saturday shaped up as nine Tuesday with trainer Hirsch Jacobs deciding his wife's silks will be carried by Understanding in the richest of the three races comprising the triple crown for three-year-olds.

The veteran trainer had been undecided between Exhibitionist, who showed little while running ninth in the Kentucky Derby, and Understanding, who closed from last place to finish fourth, beaten nine lengths, in last Saturday's Withers Mile at Aqueduct.

But Tuesday he made up his mind and went in search of a rider. Eddie Belmonte, under suspension rode Exhibitionist in the Derby and Bobby Ussery was astride Understanding in the Withers. There were reports that John Govaani, one of Pimlico's leading riders, was trying to get the mount.

Although he'll not start in the 1.316-mile Preakness, Exhibitionist will make the trip from New York Wednesday. Jacobs said the gray colt would go in the \$25,000 - added Woodlawn Handicap, one mile on the grass Thursday.

Be Suspicious also will be a part of the Jacobs contingent with the \$40,000 Black-Eyed Susan for three-year-old fillies on Friday as her objective.

As Kentucky Derby winner Kauai King remained the staunch favorite for the middle leg of the triple crown, three of his rivals arrived on the scene. They were Mrs. Ada L. Rice's Advocate, runner-up in the Derby; Mrs. H. C. Phipps' Stupendous, beaten by less than two lengths while finishing fourth at Churchill Downs, and Robert Lehman's Rehabilitate, who wound up sixth in the Derby after a slow start.

In addition to the Jacobs representative, Mrs. Edward Lasher's Indio, the Withers winner, is scheduled to arrive by van from New York.

With nine starters, the Preakness will gross \$181,500, with \$129,000 going to the winner, \$39,000 to second, \$15,000 to third and \$7,500 to fourth.

Amberoid, called by his trainer, Lucien Laurin of Montreal, the best horse in the Derby even though he finished seventh, went out for a gallop Tuesday and will have a more serious workout today.
