Possible Paper Combine Will Be Investigated

OTTAWA, June 16 — (CP) — An investigation has been launched by the Government's combines branch into a possible combine in the paper industry, it was learned Friday.

The investigation takes in fine and coarse papers, but it does not include newspaper.

While combines inquiries are secret until they have been reported upon finally, informants indicated this one has developed into a full-fledged investigation before the Combines Commission.

It was understood closed hearings are to be held here next week before Combines Commissioner T. D. MacDonald.

Purpose of the investigation is to determine whether or not a combine in restraint of trade exists in the paper industry. The Commissioner reports his findings to the Government, which may launch prosecutions if a combine is found to exist.

The paper case, so far as is known here, is one of two major combines investigations in progress. The other is an inquiry into the rubber industry. This was launched originally by Fred M. McGregor, former combines commissioner, and continued by Mr. MacDonald.

Apart from the paper and rubber inquiries, the combines branch — a section of the Department of Justice — was understood to have preliminary inquiries operating in interest in their work. Following the judging, they wrote the third test on their study material.
