

Intimidation.

A most wicked attempt is now being made to harass and annoy the Council for the prisoners in the riots, because they have, while conducting the defence, offended the susceptibilities of Orangemen.

A small number of members of a semi-ecclesiastical organization, whose liberality and fairness is in inverse ratio to its numbers and wealth, has agreed to insult Mr. Palmer, the next time he addresses them, by leaving the room. A more infamous attempt to destroy the independence of the Bar we never heard of; henceforth no barrister who is a member of this institution will be allowed to accept a retainer for any prisoner, if this Association pleases to object to it.

The Association lays no claim to any jurisdiction over Mr. Hodgson; in fact, we believe that his exegesis of Holy Scripture would be distasteful to them, upon grounds quite independent of his defense in the riot cases. They are quite convinced that he is a heresiarch and they leave him in peace. Not so the Orangemen; they have taken him under their special charge.

Sir,—You thought fit, during these last trials, to accuse Orangemen of everything bad, and to call them all the names that your very imaginative brain is capable of imagining. Now, sir, I warn you, give up this course, or you will be sorry for it; Protestants are far the most powerful in this country, and they will make you feel their power if you don't change your line of policy at these trials.

FOUND DEAD.—An old woman named Mary Young was found dead in a house on Kent Street on Saturday morning. The circumstances which attended her death are unknown, but will, no doubt, be well investigated. When found the body was lying on an old lounge in a back room, and over the body lay her daughter in a beastly state of intoxication.

OUR obituary to-day contains the announcement of the death of John Walsh. He died yesterday, at the early age of 32. By dint of hard labor and industry, his success in business was great. He rose to wealth rapidly; but the very energy which carried him forward so quickly undermined a constitution never very robust, and after a long illness, brought him prematurely to the grave. He was generous and ready with his purse in the cause of religion and charity. He leaves a widow and one child, to whom we offer our condolence.

At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this morning, William McPherson was committed to jail eight days for being drunk and incapable. Thomas Fennessy, for the same offence, was fined and paid \$2.88. B. McAree for fighting on the street, forfeited the same amount. Thomas Rison, drunk and incapable, was fined \$3 and costs or fourteen days. Edward Holland was fined \$3 or fourteen days for furious driving. James Millner and Ronald Steele, for the same offence, were fined the same. David Cullen, drunk and incapable, was fined \$2 or eight days. In the case of the City of Charlottetown vs. Augustus Coombs for selling liquor without license, eight witnesses were examined, but the evidence was not at all clear and the matter was postponed till Wednesday.

WAR NEWS.

New York, Feb. 18. Gold 102½. Exchange 82½ to 84½.

LONDON, Feb. 18. It is announced that the Russians will not occupy Constantinople, and also that orders were sent to Russian headquarters not to occupy Gallipoli.

A peace congress is to be held at Baden-Baden, and Russia wants the United States represented.

England also wants Greece represented. The Times' Berlin dispatch says Russia's action is regarded as at variance with the understood programme for the liberation of Christians, and nothing more.

Two French ironclads left Smyrna for the Dardanelles.

The Greeks have captured Platamozna.

OUR OTTAWA DESPATCH.

(Special Despatch to Daily Examiner.) OTTAWA, Feb. 18.

Mr. Goudge said Nova Scotia had not been benefitted by Confederation, and would not submit to an increase of revenue for protection, but hoped for low tariff.

Mr. Perry said the only reaction on Prince Edward Island was against Conservatives; the Island was against Protection, which meant higher prices for the consumer.

Mr. Blake said the Opposition charge should be made before Commissioners, and substantiated; he would not withdraw his confidence from the Government on such charges. Look at the record of the men who would succeed.

On the second paragraph of the Address Dr. Tupper referred to Mr. Young's condemnation of old stale charges, and said he appealed to the charges against him; he had shown that Mr. Jones and the Government disagreed on the Pacific Railway policy; that Mr. Jones had expressed sentiments inconsistent with his place in the Dominion Cabinet, and no explanation had been given. The old stale Hollis Street, Pictou and Spring Hill charge being repeated, and Doctor Tupper repeated his defence on these charges, and defied any evidence of their truth. His son was not a minor when the house was given to him—he accepted Mr. Jones' invitation to revisit Halifax next election. It is time for the Government to revise the auditing of accounts, when large sums are paid contrary to law—\$69,000 paid out illegally during a recent contest and \$24,000 paid to two members of the Government in violation of the law—the Government seem anxious to canonize corruption. He challenged any evidence that public money ever came improperly into his pocket. The only man who made money by Parliament was Mr. Fleming, who had a right to it. He could prove just as clearly that Mr. Jones robbed his partner as Jones could prove his charges. The Minister of the Crown means himself with such old stale charges.

Jones replied that difference of opinion on trade, when no principles were involved, did not prevent his joining the Cabinet. When a sacrifice of principle was required, he would withdraw. Tupper sacrificed national policy rather than resign. Sir Wm. Young was always a violent partisan. He misled Sir Hastings Doyle and made a base use of the letter. He dared not use it when Sir Hastings Doyle was in the country. Dr. Tupper might explain and prove what he liked, but suspicion always attached to him. Whenever public money was going, Tupper got his share.

Sir John A. McDonald said Jones' speech was most unparliamentary and full of unparliamentary slang. Tupper had formulated certain charges against the Minister which the Minister was bound to answer. Instead of answering, he assails Tupper about Pictou and Spring Hill. Mr. Jones had called all who sanctioned the flag story slanderers; the first was Sir Hastings Doyle. Mr. Jones said everyone who repeated it were slanderers.

Sir John asked, is the lamented Vail a liar also? Hon. Alexander Mackenzie said the abuse began with Tupper, who is noted for his abuse of public men, whose attack was unjust, and it failed—the country would believe the charges all the less, because of their being made by persons whose words were worthless.

Sir John said their words were worth as much as your words.

The Military Philosopher, Grumbler and Theologian.

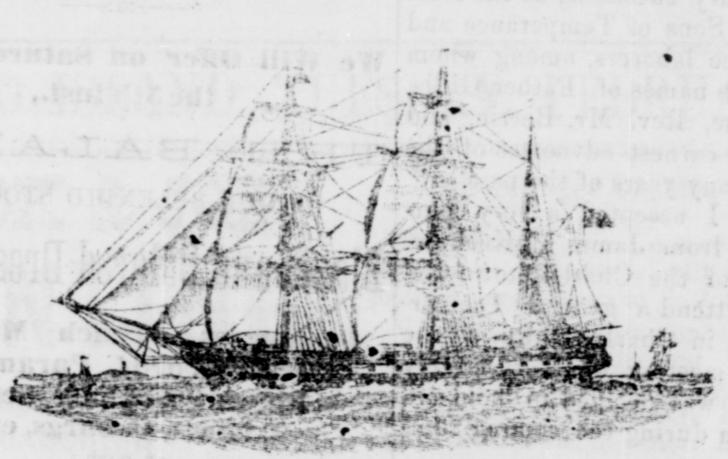
To the Editor of the Examiner:

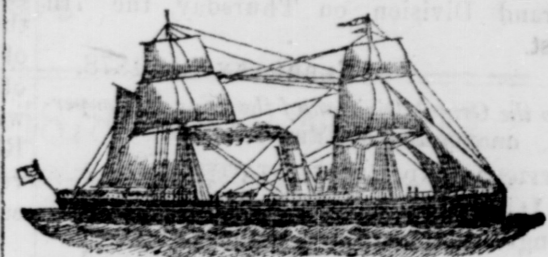
