about 3.30 where he separated from  
Solomon and Miss MacDonald.  
Witness did not see them again  
until about five o'clock when they  
met at the truck. From there they  
went to the vendor's where they  
purchased a bottle of liquor.  
They returned to the truck be-  
tween 5.30 and 6 and left slowly  
over the Hillsboro Bridge and that  
there was no traffic on the bridge.  
Later they struck a bump on the  
road and he looked around and saw  
that the tail gate was out of place.  
He then told Solomon to pull up  
and stop the truck.

"We worked at the tail gate for  
a while and Solomon went to the  
cab for a hammer", witness said.  
"Then we continued working with  
one person holding the tail gate  
and the other tying it."  
Foreman Thomas White asked  
how long they were working on  
the tail gate, to which witness re-  
plied, "About five minutes". In re-  
ply to a further question from Mr.  
White, he said he did not know  
whether the truck lights were on  
or not at the time of the accident.

**Position of Truck**

Witness said they met one car at  
the bridge and one or two cars on  
the road. Asked by Mr. White why  
Solomon did not pull over on the  
shoulder of the road, he said that  
as far as he knew he was over on  
the side. "The wheels were on the  
dirt, I thought, and I thought he  
was safe there", he added.

Asked if he had had any warning  
of the oncoming car, he replied,  
"Only a split second".

Dr. MacGuigan asked witness  
how he got injured and he stated  
that it happened so quickly he did  
not know. In reply to questions by  
the doctor he stated that he was  
not knocked unconscious although  
he was in a daze, and that he re-  
membered being struck.

Mr. White asked him if there  
was any traffic passing while they  
were fixing the tail gate or were  
the two men too busy to notice it.  
"No, I did not notice any," re-  
plied the witness.

Asked by Mr. J. P. Nicholson,  
who represented the Crown, if he  
had consumed any of the liquor  
purchased in the Vendor's, he re-  
plied that they had two or three  
drinks in the truck.

Asked what he was doing at  
the time of the accident, he re-  
plied, "We were both working at  
the fixing of the tail board. We  
had the tail board in place, I was  
holding the rope tight and Solom-  
on was tying it."

He stated that it was not particu-  
larly dark at the time, and  
judged it would be between dark  
and daylight.

Questioned by Mr. Nicholson  
he stated there were lights on the  
truck before it stopped and that  
he did not remember seeing the  
tail light on. The only warning  
he had of the other car was the  
"split second sound of brakes".

Juryman Leo Bradley asked  
him if he attempted to jump in  
that split second. Witness replied,  
"Yes." "And something caught  
you before you got away," asked  
Mr. Bradley, to which the witness  
replied in the affirmative.

Mr. Nicholson again asked about  
oncoming traffic, and witness stated  
there was none coming. Asked  
if he would miss the traffic  
if he were working close to the  
rear of the truck, he replied that  
it was possible but not probable.

**Other Witnesses**

Dr. C. A. Coady, physician at  
the Charlottetown Hospital, who  
treated Mr. Gardiner, outlined  
the extent of the man's injuries.  
These included a fractured left  
ankle, fairly deep lacerations on  
both thighs and a small abrasion  
on the back. He estimated that  
he first saw the patient about

8.15 or 8.30.

Walter MacNeil, Charlottetown,  
secretary to the Superintendent  
of the C.N.R., testified that he  
left Charlottetown about 6.45 on  
the evening of April 14 and short-  
ly after meeting Mr. Vernon Gay  
he noticed some vehicles stop-  
ped on the road.

"I dimmed my lights, stopped  
the car and asked Whiston  
Smith what had happened," he  
stated. "Mr. Smith replied that  
young Solomon had been killed  
so I pulled my car ahead about  
two automobile lengths and walk-  
ed back to the scene of the ac-  
cident."

"On the side of the road I met  
a girl crying near a man. I asked  
her if she was Mrs. Raymond  
Solomon, and she said no, that  
she was the girl friend of Gerald  
Solomon who had just been killed.  
I stayed around for a consid-  
erable length of time, about  
15 or 20 minutes."

In reply to a question by Mr.  
White, witness stated that he ar-  
rived at the scene of the accident  
about 7.30. Asked if it were dark,  
he said he had his bright lights  
on and that it was very nearly  
dark. Witness saw Mr. Tweedy  
at the accident.

"Was there any traffic ahead  
of or behind you?" asked the  
foreman, Mr. White. "I cannot  
say. I do not remember meeting  
any," he replied.

In answer to questions by Mr.  
Nicholson, witness stated that  
nearly all cars stopped at the  
scene of the accident. He thought  
he arrived very shortly after it  
had happened and was not sure  
whether there were other cars  
present at the time.

He stayed at the scene of the

accident 15 or 20 minutes and re-  
membered the chimes striking  
eight o'clock when he entered  
Charlottetown. Witness did not  
see any cars being stopped and  
did not see Mr. Edilson Sheldow,  
who was also one of the first at  
the accident.

He stated that it was 34 miles  
from Georgetown to Pownal and  
that he turned his car lights on  
in Pownal. "It was not dark, but  
it was getting dark," he said, "it  
was dark enough to put on head  
lights while in Pownal."

Edison Sheldow, Millview, testi-  
fied that he left home about 6.45  
that evening. He was driving to-  
wards Charlottetown at a fairly  
slow rate of speed.

"I did not have the lights on  
when I left home, but put them  
on in Pownal, not because it was  
dark but because it was a vil-  
lage and some youngsters might  
be running across the street."

"I was going down the grade  
at Gay's when I saw the head-  
lights of a car behind a truck.  
A man came out and stopped me.  
It was Judge Tweedy. He asked  
if I would take a passenger to  
the City, and I said yes."

"When he was talking another  
man said, 'Would you take this  
injured man to the City.' I said  
no, it was a case for the ambu-  
lance. I saw another man lying  
there with a coat over him. I was  
not stopped any more than five  
minutes. We put a lady in the  
car and kept on going."

"Did you say you did not need  
your lights?" asked Mr. Nichol-  
son. "They were no good to you  
at that time," replied the wit-  
ness.

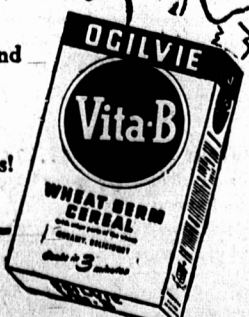
