Fines Of \$200 Each Imposed For Robbery

SUMMERSIDE — Fines of \$200 and costs or five days were imposed on Ivan Louis Green, 16, and Leigh Armstrong, 17, both of Charlottetown, when they appeared before Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDew yesterday in Prince County Magistrate's Court on robbery charges.

The two were ordered to enter into bonds of \$500 each.

Possible Answer Suggested For Strange Flying Object

The silver-colored, unidentified flying object, torpedo-shaped and with orange colored fins, as reported seen by two Alberton fishermen Wednesday night might have been the wing-fuel tank of a T-33 jet training aircraft.

The description of the flying object furnished by the fishermen seems to fit such T-33 aircraft equipment, a single turbo-propeller engine mounted on North Bay, Ont., and Flying Officer Bill Heslop, here on the island for speaking engagements, on NORAD. Both RCAF officers are attached to NORAD, S-1 Station at North Bay, and F.O. Heslop at Topsham Air Force Station, Maine, as information sources.

HALIFAX (CP) — The weather office says a southerly flow of warm, moist air clashing with firmly entrenched cool air over northern New Brunswick resulted in showers and thundershowers in that province Thursday. Some snow was mixed with the rain in Northern New Brunswick. Meanwhile, mostly cloudy skies prevailed over Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island.

A disturbance in southern Quebec will move through the Maritime today spreading showers to all regions. The cool air will sweep southward during the entire district once the disturbance has passed. This will bring clearing skies to the western regions.

Mostly sunny but cool weather appears likely for Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island Saturday, but more clouds will spread into New Brunswick.

Regional forecasts: South Shore, Annapolis Valley, Prince Edward Island: cloudy, clearing by evening; showers and chance of a thundershower ending by afternoon, cooler, mostly sunny to 50 shifting in the afternoon to northwest 20. High at Yarmouth a n d Kentville 50 and St. Charlottetown 50 and 55.

Outlook for Saturday—sunny with few cloudy periods and cool.

Reefer Shortage To Be Relieved

Provincial transportation director, Graham Rogers said Thursday the shortage of refrigerated railway cars carrying produce from the province should be relieved within a week.

Mr. Rogers said there is now a buildup of empty reefers at Montreal and Toronto.

He said the government has been advised by the Montreal office of Canadian National Railways that arrangements are being made to increase the eastward movement of empty reefers and "this should take care of our requirements, provided cars are loaded promptly and there is no delay in unloading at their destination."

It is estimated by Mr. Rogers that a daily average of 60 refrigerated cars will be needed by the province up to the end of November. Heavy shipments of onions, peas, fish, potatoes and turnips are expected from the province.

Local Gov't. Wants More Student Funds

Application has been made by the provincial government to the federal authorities for more funds under the Student Loan Fund program.

Dr. George Dewar, minister of education, said Thursday the federal allocation of \$230,000 for this province for the year has been used up.

Under the program, college students can borrow \$1,000 per year for five years, to finance their education. Repayment would begin after graduation.

Dr. Dewar said the province did not apply for any specific amount, he said, "perhaps if some other provinces did not use their full allotment, then a portion of that money could be made available to Prince Edward Island."
