Harness Radio Waves From Sun

CEDAR RAPIDS, Iowa (AP) — Radio waves from the sun can now be harnessed by an electronic instrument to do all-weather navigation work for ships and planes, Arthur Collins, president of the Collins Radio Co., of Cedar Rapids, disclosed today.

The instrument is the first radio sextant, an electronic successor to the hand-held sextant used for centuries by marine navigators. But where its predecessor required a clear sky to obtain "position fixes," the radio sextant relies only on the sun's radio waves which penetrate rain, snow and cloud cover.

Developed for the U. S. Navy bureau of ships, the radio sextant has undergone tests on a naval vessel. The U. S. Air Force also has sponsored an airborne version of the instrument.

The project has been under security wraps for several years. Using a sensitive radio receiver, the instrument uses a small dish antenna to detect micro-waves from the sun, thus supplying data by which a navigator can readily pinpoint his craft's precise latitude and longitude.

To Erect Laurier Monument in Quebec

QUEBEC, (CP)—A monument to Sir Wilfrid Laurier, French-speaking prime minister of Canada prior to the First World War, will probably be erected in October in a lower town park.

Emile Brunet, Canadian sculptor who has been commissioned for the work visited Lt.-Col. Oscar Gilbert, chairman of the monument committee, during the week-end and said the bronze statue will be shipped from Paris to Quebec in September.

Mr. Brunet is the sculptor of a statue of Sir Wilfrid erected in Montreal a year ago. The sculptor has a studio in Paris.

Erection of a monument to Sir Wilfrid was prompted by a committee of business men headed by Col. Gilbert, publisher of the daily newspaper L'Evenement—Journal and Le Soleil. The Quebec legislature voted \$20,000 toward the monument. Funds were also raised by public subscription.

Site of the monument is still under discussion.

Markets

New York Stocks

NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market punched ahead last week to new bull market peaks. There was a general rush to buy on the part of traders, speculators, investors, and the public at large, as business boiled up to the greatest totals in the last 3 1/2 years. It was the fifth, straight weekly advance for the market.

In the last 10 months there have been only a few downward corrections along the way. That is unusual for the stock market. The usual thing is for the market periodically to retrace one-third to two-thirds of its previous rise in a reaction in order to consolidate its gains for a new push ahead.

Last week volume hit a total of 12,826,000 shares, the greatest amount of business for one week since early in February of 1951. PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

"There has been increasing public participation in the market in recent weeks contrasted with professional trading as mutual funds or insurance companies and banks. Furthermore, trading emphasis has shifted from the investment-type blue chips to the more speculative and lower priced stocks.

But words of caution are coming from many Wall Street brokers. That doesn't mean a crash is just around the corner. But it does mean that some of the signs of a general reaction are in the making. The one broker explained, the more the public becomes aware of the possibilities of a reaction, the greater are the chances of weathering the blow with sound stocks.

SURGED AHEAD A week ago the market surged ahead in its final session to a high for the year, but on Monday and Tuesday the brakes were set. Wednesday's market was higher again, and volume was the best of the week.

The Thursday market brought one grand rush of trading at higher prices that sent volume to 3,000,000 shares, greatest in the last 15 months.

Friday's market found trading short of the previous day. Prices sagged a little despite a late rally and closed on average only a shade below the peaks of '29.

ACTIVE ISSUES The five most active stocks last week on the New York stock exchange were: Curtis-Wright up 1 1/2% at 11 1/2; International Telephone up 1/4 at 20 1/2; Burlington Mills up 1/4 at 15; Pan American World Airways up 1/4 at 13 1/2; and North American Aviation up 6 at 40 1/2.

The five most active issues on the American stock exchange were: Claude Brindage Clark up 1/2 at 5 1/2; New Idria Mining unchanged at 2 1/2; Pressed Metals of America up 2 1/2 at 15 1/2; Equity Corp. up 1/4 at 3 1/2; and Ford Motor of France up 1-16 at 13-16.

International Nickel gained 3/4 and Canadian Pacific fell 1/4 among Canadian stocks, which closed mixed.

On the American stock exchange higher Canadian issues included Lake Shore and Giant Yellowknife, both up 1/4.

MINER KILLED SUDBURY, (CP) — Wolfgang Dams, 33, Falconbridge nickel mines worker was fatally crushed Saturday between an engine and a driftpost as he worked underground. Dams and his partner, A. Melychuk had just finished filling an ore train on the 2,450-foot level when the accident occurred.

Record Grain Shipment

MIDLAND, Ont. — The largest shipment of grain ever carried on the Great Lakes — 731,000 bushels of No. 2 Northern wheat — was unloaded here into the Canadian National Railway elevator for transportation by rail to the Atlantic seaboard.

First Lubricating Oil Plant For Western Canada

EDMONTON (CP)—A few days ago, a field of ripening hay stood amid the silvery towers of the Imperial Oil Ltd. refinery in Edmonton municipality, just east of Edmonton.

In a few days, the same field will be alive with the lustrous activity of bulldozers and other equipment tearing up the ground for western Canada's first large-scale plant for the manufacture of lubricating oils.

Today, surrounded by bales of newly-cut alfalfa, Reeve A. M. Adamson of Strathcona turned the symbolic first sod on the plant site. Construction is expected to be completed by Sept. 1 next year. Production is scheduled for early 1956.

The \$14,000,000 plant will add 150 more workers to Imperial's present payroll here of about 300. It will cover about 13 1/2 acres of the company's total 360 acres.

The plant will be second in size and capacity only to Imperial's lubricating oils operation at Sarnia, Ont. It will make areas west of the Lakehead independent of eastern Canada except for specialized oils for which there is only a limited demand.

About 750,000 barrels of automotive and industrial oils will pour annually from the plant—about 2,000 barrels, or 70,000 gallons daily.

Oils will be "finished" under a new company-developed process known as hydro-finishing. Previously, lubricating oils were filtered through clay in the final stages of manufacture to remove any impurities. Hydrogen gas will now be passed through the oils for the same purpose.

This will be the first commercial application of hydrogenation to lubricating oils.

The hydrogen will come from another new unit—a catalytic reformer. This will take 2,000 barrels a day of heavy naphtha oil from the refinery's crude still and crack it down in the presence of a catalyst. The unit will yield both hydrogen and a high octane gasoline.

Raw material will be supplied from the refinery's vacuum distillation unit.

Block Communist Move in Israel

NAZARETH, Israel (Reuters) — Local Communists today lost a fierce three-month struggle to dominate the biblical city of Nazareth by capturing the post of mayor.

The 15-man municipal council, in which six Communists from the largest single party, today voted down a Communist-supported Moslem candidate and elected a Greek Orthodox Christian as mayor of the little town where Christ spent his youth.

The new mayor is Amin Jarjurah, a former Israeli parliament member.

The six Communists were elected to the council in a hard-fought contest last April. Joint efforts of Moslem, Christian and Jewish voters barely blocked a Communist election sweep to a council majority.
