HOWLING SITUATIONS, UPROARIOUS DIALOGUE IN LIVELY NEW COMEDY

Although an old and honored saying insists that a little knowledge is a dangerous thing, in Paramount's "Dear Brat," which opens today at the Prince Edward Theatre, is happily demonstrated that a little knowledge can also be a matter for exceptional merriment.

Starring Mona Freeman, Billy De Wolfe, Edward Arnold and Lyle Bettger, the hilarious film traces the explosive repercussions following the attempt of a teen-age schoolgirl to apply a course in social science to the unpredictable world beyond the school walls.

Expertly directed in a style that makes the most of the rollicking situations and sharp-edged dialogue, the film picks up the brat as she is hiring a paroled kidnapper for a family gardener and man-about-the-house. Her intentions is to convert him into a pillar of society. But when her father, who is running the scheme, he reacts violently. Though he has publicly spoken in favor of criminal rehabilitation, he doesn't want the reform staged in his own garden.

With the town in an uproar over the presence of a violent felon in their midst, the Senator desperately looks for a situation that will please both his constituents and his conscience. The brat's boy friend isn't pleased at all. He thinks that her designs on the young parolee are sentimental, and the confusion reaches an uproarious high when the police, the parole board and the town banker all try to settle the problem to their own satisfaction.

This merry mix-up is resolved in a howling climax that approximately restores peace. But there is also the suspicion that things will never be quite the same for the Wilkins people and their friends.

As the teen-ager whose experiment in reform has side-splitting consequences, Mona Freeman is perfect. Edward Arnold also extracts the maximum humor from the role of distracted father. Billy De Wolfe as the town banker who runs afoul of the brat, and Lyle Bettger as the hapless parolee, also help keep the fun rolling in this bright and breezy comedy.

The Right Honourable Lord Beaverbrook has most generously provided five entrance scholarships to be awarded each year for courses at Mount Allison University. An applicant holding a Senior Matriculation certificate should submit it with his application.

In addition to the scholastic requirements the selection committee will take into consideration moral character, industrious habits and financial needs of the candidates.

These scholarships will be awarded only to students who will enter upon a regular course leading to one of the following degrees and for the time indicated: Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science, Bachelor of Music and Bachelor of Fine Arts, four years; Bachelor of Education, five years.

The scholarship will continue from year to year to the completion of the course provided the progress of the student is satisfactory.
