Blake's New Honor.

The unprecedented offer which has been made by the Irish party to Edward Blake is an honor of which he and his friends may well be proud.

"Probably this offer from the troubled and divided Nationalists means more than a simple title to a seat in the Imperial Parliament for an Irish constituency. What they want is a leader, if possible a Protestant, whose religion takes the sting out of the cry that 'Home Rule is Rome Rule' without unfitting him for the leadership of the Roman Catholic Irish."

Why Those Cheers.

Sir John Thompson announced that the proposal to gerrymander Clarence township had been abandoned. (Liberal cheers.)

The above appeared recently in the Patriot's telegrams. But why those Liberal cheers? The minister of justice, we presume, was led by the opposition of the Liberals to see an intended mistake and to correct it. So far it was creditable to both parties. But when the announcement was made the Liberals broke into cheers which anyone who knows anything about politics knows must have been flavored with a certain amount of crowing and derision. There is too much of this in parliament on both sides of the house. The correction of a mistake is always treated by opponents as an acknowledgement of wrong or an ignominious back down and is treated accordingly. Once an opinion is expressed in a certain direction a man is said to be "committed to it," and if he changes that opinion, even tho' by so doing he corrects a mistake, parliament and the press ring with derisive laughter. No wonder wrong words and acts are adhered to so tenaciously by public men.

The Philadelphia Item and the New Haven Leader, referring to an associated Press despatch to the effect that the Editor of the Charlottetown GUARDIAN predicted the annexation of Hawaii to the United States in less than a year, asks the question, "Shall we annex Canada or Hawaii first?" In the first place, by way of answer, we may say, the Editor of the GUARDIAN predicted nothing of the kind. What he did say was that unless present signs fail annexation at no distant date was very probable. As for the annexation of Canada—well, if they want another prediction, Canada will at least wait till the Item and the Leader are dead and gone.

It is something new for Canada to be visited by a genuine Yankee cyclone. If the Americans cannot divilize their climate they should keep it at home.

THE LEGISLATURE

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL DEBATES.

Mr. CAMPBELL.—I do not know that this House has any right to step in between individuals in regard to the rights of property. The sum of \$275 was awarded to this man Smith, but the money has not been paid yet, and would it be right for the Legislature to pass a law to order the judge to give up this money when \$275 of it is payable to Smith, and the balance liable for the expenses of the court. If this is handed over what course is Smith going to take to get his money? He would have to go to court again, and incur more expense in order to get his rights. Are we justified in passing a law to give a corporation an advantage over an individual. It appears these arbitrators were ordered to reconsider their decision and one of them refused to do so.

A message from the House of Assembly by Hon. Mr. Peters with a Bill to be intitled "An Act to allow Louisa M. Hobbirk and others to transfer certain lands in Prince County."

The said Bill was read a first time and ordered to be read a second time to-morrow.

Debate resumed on the Bill to authorize the payment out of the Rolls Court of certain moneys, to the Water Commissioners of the City of Charlottetown.

Mr. CAMPBELL.—The Water Commissioners should have paid Smith his money before they came here asking for an act to authorize the refund of this money.

Mr. DODD.—The Water Commissioners found it necessary to lay pipes through this piece of land and the owner objected. Judge Peters ordered the commissioners to pay this \$400 into Court as security, and now they want to get the money back as it is lying there idle.

Mr. CAMPBELL.—Who will pay Smith?

Mr. DODD.—He has his remedy. Why did he stop them from going through his land?

House in Committee.

Mr. SCRINGOUR in the chair.

The first clause was read.

Hon. Mr. LAIRD.—I rather like the tone of the remarks of his honor at the other end of the table (Mr. Campbell), I never like to hear of any private party being injured by legislation. But this money was deposited as security, not for payment of the claim, and if it is refunded to the Commissioners, the Corporation is quite able to pay Smith his amount. It cannot be shown that Smith will be at all injured by paying back the money. At present Smith is kept out of his money as well as the Commissioners.

Mr. CAMPBELL.—The Commissioners are a Corporate body, and in their individual capacity do not lose one cent by that money remaining in the Court, but Smith is suffering loss. If we order that money to be refunded, Smith will have to go to law again to get his money.

Hon. Mr. LAIRD.—If the Bill is thrown out will Smith get his money?

Mr. CAMPBELL.—Yes, by order of the court.

Hon. Mr. LAIRD.—Who is to give the order? It has been shown that the Master of the Rolls and Judge Hensley are both disqualified from giving the order.

Mr. CAMPBELL.—I made it my business to enquire, and I was told that Judge Hensley was capable of making the order.

Hon. Mr. LAIRD.—If this Bill is thrown out, when will Smith get his money?

Mr. CAMPBELL.—If we pass this Bill it quashes all proceedings, and the expense falls on Smith.

Hon. Mr. LAIRD.—What clause in the Bill quashes all proceedings?

Hon. Mr. ROGERS.—This man Smith obtained an injunction to prevent the Water Commissioners from going on with the work, and in order that the work might proceed they got the injunction removed, having in the meantime paid this money into Court as security for the costs. The Master of the Rolls made a decree dismissing the case, and when that was done the \$400 should have been paid back, but the late judge did not make the order and it appears his successor could not do so. I do not see that the money was paid in for the benefit of Smith at all.

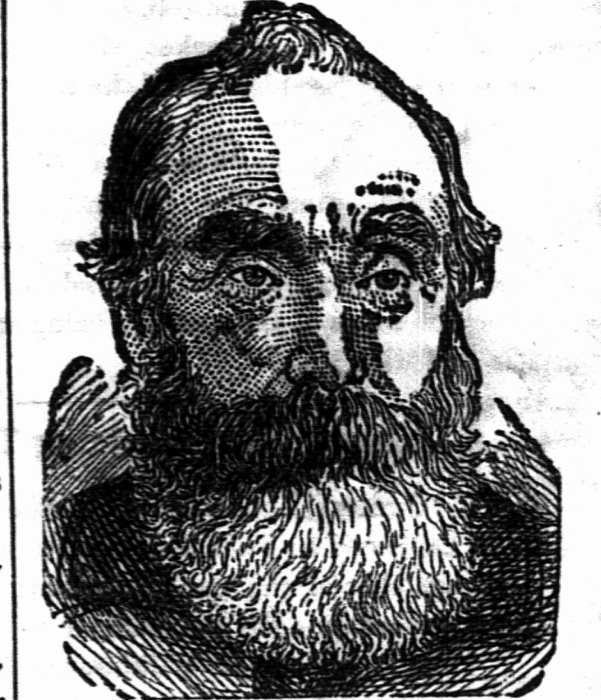
Mr. CAMPBELL.—I claim that money was deposited there to pay the land damages and also costs of the suit, and when the arbitrators gave their award it was at the command of the Master of the Rolls to pay Smith his money. I claim the present Vice Chancellor has the power to pay Smith and hand the balance of the money back to the Water Commissioners. The man was justified in not taking \$50 when the arbitrators gave him \$275.

A Novel Excursion.

A novel kind of excursion struck Ottawa the other evening and crowded the galleries of the House while the divisions on the second reading of the Redistribution Bill were taking place. It was got up by the North Lanark Farmers' Institute, and comprised about 1,000 farmers, and their wives, families and sweethearts, who had come for the purpose of seeing the Experimental Farm.

The Hallelujah Cavalry.

The Salvation Army in California has augmented its force with a body of musical troops known as the Hallelujah Cavalry, and during the months of June and July this cavalcade will sweep along the highways, arousing the unconverted. Flaming posters headed, "Bombardment of the Hallelujah Cavalry," have been displayed all over the State. The idea is a new one in the methods of the Army, and originated with "M. Joe" Kyle, the commander of the Salvationists on the Pacific Coast. No women are to be allowed to accompany the mounted warriors, for the simple reason that the horses pressed into service are Nevada broncos unaccustomed to the blare of trumpets and the boom of the big drum. A cow-boy concert has promised, however, to make the animals tractable after a fashion. The music of the cavalry will be furnished by tin brass instruments—bugles, drums, horns and tambourines. Regular cavalry saddles have been purchased for the men and will be set off with red-braided saddle cloths. The uniform will be white cavalry fatigue hats, loose red blouses, and cavalry boots tipped with long spurs, more for the clank they will make than to reveal the broncos. The leading riders will carry lances and fluttering pennons. The troops will camp along their route in regular army style. They expect to penetrate the mountain and desert parts of the State, where churches and meeting houses are not to be found. The cooking of the Hallelujah Cavalry is to be done by Lieut. Fong See, a Chinese convert.

PERSONS using the Telephone would find talking much more satisfactory if they would observe the following Rules:

- 1st. Speak with your mouth about four inches from the transmitter. 2nd. Speak in a moderate tone of voice, not too loud, and distinctly. 3rd. Place the Telephone so as to cover the Ear, just as if you wished to shut out all other sounds. Do not press too hard on the Ear. It is possible to talk and be heard when standing back two or three feet from the transmitter, if you shout loud enough, but it is not a pleasant mode of conversation, and is a useless waste of wind and lungs, he-ids being very annoying to all within range of your voice.
