ISLAND STEAMER IN BOSTON.—The Boston Post says: Among the vessels to arrive Wednesday was the 227-ton wooden steamer Elliot, built at Charlottetown, P. E. Island, about four years ago, and from whence she came with the first steamer cargo of 3,274 bags of potatoes to reach here this year. She is unloading the potatoes and some lobsters, hides, etc., in the jig, at Commercial wharf. She ran in the summer between Nova Scotia and West Indies with cargoes of fish, etc.

SUDDEN DEATH.—The Guardian reports the sudden death of Mrs. Samuel Kennedy, of Bradalbane, in the 55th year of her age. It seems that Mrs. Kennedy had enjoyed excellent health up to Friday last. Mr. Donald Matheson, who lived a few hundred yards distance, had died a day or two previous, and on Friday evening Mrs. Kennedy walked over to sympathize with the bereaved. She had scarcely entered the house when she was stricken with apoplexy for the second time, having had a previous stroke several years ago. She sank at once to the floor and never regained consciousness. Two physicians were at once summoned but were unable to grapple with the dread destroyer. Mr. Kennedy had started a short time previous by train to Charlottetown. They at once wired from Bradalbane station, stopped him at Wiltshire and he returned home with all possible speed. By the assistance of kind friends Mrs. Kennedy was taken to her home where at one o'clock Saturday morning her spirit passed away. She was a sister of Mr. Daniel McKinnon, station master at Hunter River. Seven sons and five daughters are left to mourn the death of one who was highly respected by the whole community. The funeral took place yesterday morning and was largely attended, notwithstanding the bad condition of the roads. To her sorrowing husband, family and friends THE EXAMINER extends its sympathy.
