He will accompany the officer to Toronto. Rev. J. Hutchinson, M. A., (D. V.) officiated on Sabbath first the 14th inst. at North River at 10.30 a. m., at New Glasgow Road, at 2.35 p. m.; and at Hunter River, at 6.30 in the evening, if the hall is not engaged. The April issue of the Westminster Review will contain a paper by Mr. J. G. Bourinot, Clerk of the House of Commons, Ottawa, giving a historical review of the "Fishery Question and its Imperial importance," since the time it became an international issue. In Clarion County, Pa., on the morning of the 9th inst., the wife of John S. Everhart, overseer of the poor, and her mother were found dead with their throats cut, the house ransacked and \$300 taken. Mr. Everhart was away at the time. No clue to the perpetrators of the crime. At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon, two young men, charged with fighting in the Market House last Tuesday, were remanded till to-morrow; two drunks were fined \$1 each, and another discharged; while the adjourned Scott Act case was further postponed for eight days. Cardinal Tscherean is a grand uncle of the wife of Joseph Pope, Esq., Private Secretary of Sir John A. Macdonald. The London Graphic of the 23rd ult., contains fac-similes of the medals to be presented by the Imperial Government to the volunteers who took part in the last rebellion. The face of the medal contains the Queen's head and the words "Victoria Regina et Imperatrix," on the obverse side is a wreath of maple leaves, and in the centre the words "North West, 1855, Canada." The ribbon is red and blue. No means has been taken by the manufacturers to push the sale of their "Myrtle Navy" tobacco, except giving from time to time a simple statement of the facts connected with it in the public press. The large and rapidly increasing demands for it has been the result of the experience of smokers which these statements suggested. TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.] Another Strike. NEW YORK, March 10. Last night the street railway drivers and conductors formed themselves into an assembly of the Knights of Labor. This morning about sixty of the men were notified that their services were dispensed with. The others therefore refused to start work and about three hundred struck. The company cannot get men, as they are afraid of the strikers. Labor Troubles in England. LONDON, March 10. A procession of British seamen marched from the docks to the city this afternoon to make a demonstration against the Government for neglecting to take steps towards relieving trade of its depression. The men behaved in an orderly manner, and were loudly cheered along their route. An Insane Husband Kills his Wife. RICHIBUCTO, March 10. A sad occurrence is reported from St. Mary's, Kent Co., which resulted in the death of Mrs. Stephen Leblanc. Her husband, while laboring under a fit of insanity, dealt her three blows in the face with a sled shoe iron. Dr. Lamotte did all in his power, but the victim died in a short time. Indescribable Distress. LONDON, March 10. The Government has placed gunboats at the service of Mr. Tuke, in his work of relieving distress among the inhabitants of the islands along the Western Irish coast. Indescribable distress has developed among the people inhabiting the Arran Islands, off Galway. Attempted Assassination. AMIENS, France, March 10. An attempt was made to-day to assassinate Jules Verne. Two shots were fired at him from a revolver by the author's own nephew. One of the bullets struck him in the leg, inflicting a slight wound. Railway Collision. LONDON, March 10. A collision occurred yesterday on the railway between Monte Carlo and Menton. A number of carriages were smashed and fell into the sea. The number of deaths is unknown, but it is believed to be at least twenty. A Huge Defalcation. VINCENNES, Ind., March 10. The examination of the books of County Treasurer Hollinsworth, shows a shortage of \$78,278. It is supposed the money was squandered in gambling on margins, and in women affairs. Steamer Lost. SAN FRANCISCO, March 10. Intelligence reached Hong Kong Feb. 12, that the Douglass Steamship Company's steamer Douglass, on the China coast route, ran ashore in a fog and was lost. Insured for \$200,000. Not Heard From. NEW YORK, March 10. The British steamer Southgate, which left Palermo on Jan. 27th, and Husula on Feb. 9th for this port, has not arrived, and it is feared she has foundered. Fire. VALPARAISO, March 10. This morning the entire block, including the principal shops in the city was burned to the ground. The loss is estimated at \$10,000,000. No Sitting. OTTAWA, March 10. To-day being Ash Wednesday there was no sitting of Parliament, and the Public Departments were also closed. Billiard Tournament. NEW YORK, March 10. To Guard Against Accidents.

Mr. Curran, in the House of Commons, Ottawa, and Senator Plumb, in the Senate, have presented a petition signed by nearly all the ship-owners of the Dominion, requesting an amendment to the Canadian Shipping Act, assimilating our law to the Merchant Shipping Act of Great Britain in so far as it is compulsory on all vessels to carry inextinguishable lights as a means of saving life. 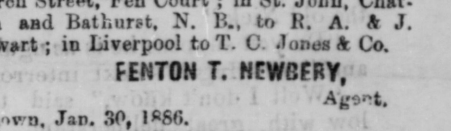
